Roy Thompson, new Roseburg High School football coach, successfully completed a tough rebuilding job at Astoria High School.

Now he's ready to begin another large chore in football in Roseburg. The new Roseburg mentor has already begun the task with frequent trips to the high school and a players meeting. Next on the agenda, is a clinic for Roseburg High School coaches and for those junior high coaches who wish to attend the sessions.

MONDAY EVENING, Aug. 18, is the date of the first session, with three on tap, the last of which is set for Wednesday night. These will be 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. meetings.

Thompson also will conduct clinics for junior high and grade school coaches on Sept. 23-24. Another clinic will be handled by Thompson on Sept. 8, this one for the purpose of better informing the public and parents in particular, on the "football injury."

In this session, the Roseburg mentor will discuss the type of offense to be employed by Roseburg this year.

After these pre-season clinics, Thompson will move to the first turnout day for candidates for this year's Roseburg team. Next Friday and Saturday, equipment will be issued and the following Monday, Roseburg gridders will take to the field for the first practice session.

Daily-doubles will be the order of the day for at least the first week. Also under consideration is an inter-squad game which will be played Saturday night, Sept. 6, at Finlay Field.

FANS WILL HAVE an opportunity of seeing another top schedule this year. After the Indians open with Ashland here on Sept. 12, then come the Corvallis Spartans to Finlay Field on Sept. 19. The next two Friday nights, Roseburg is in Grants Pass and then at South Eugene. On Oct. 10, the Indians meet the Springfield Millers on the local field and the following Friday night, the North Bend Bulldogs meet the Roseburg eleven here.

Roseburg travels to Crescent City, Calif. on Oct. 24, and returns to Finlay Field the following Friday night for a battle with the Marshfield Pirates. The final regular-season game will be away, as Roseburg goes to Cottage Grove on Nov. 7.

SWIMMING IS ONE of Roseburg's top sports, and the local team proved this past weekend that it is one which can compete with the big teams in the state in any meet.

The fourth-place finish registered by Don Jacklin's club in the tough ten-team Southern Oregon Swimming and Diving Championship is testimony of this fact. A third place finish also might have been possible with a complete team.

Some members of the team were absent due to illness and injuries. Foremost in the latter category was the loss of Karen Wishart, one of the top swimmers on the Roseburg team. Miss Wishart expected the unpleasant feeling of having run through a plate-class door. The cuts inflicted were many, and she possibly will be lost to the team for the season.

The meet again displayed Roseburg's ability to conduct a swimming meet in top fashion. Junior Chamber of Commerce members were again kept busy during the two-day show.

ALSO, A LARGE AMOUNT of credit for the success of the meet is due Jacklin. As meet director, the Roseburg coach kept the swim show well-regulated and fast-moving. The prelims were handled smoothly and the results compiled and posted immediately with a complete event by event roster ready for use in the finals.

Credit too, is due starter Hod Turner, and public address announcer Walt Brittel. Sue Meredith was kept busy Saturday night rushing results to the scorers' table and Mary Backen presented ribbons to the top finishers in the two-day test.

The large chore of scoring the meet was put in the hands of Linda Backen, and no wiser choice could have been made. With point totals to be recorded for the teams, individual points totals to be recorded, and totals for both the boys' and girls' divisions, she handled the important job faultlessly.

It out for the year, White will be missed in that Roseburg backfield.

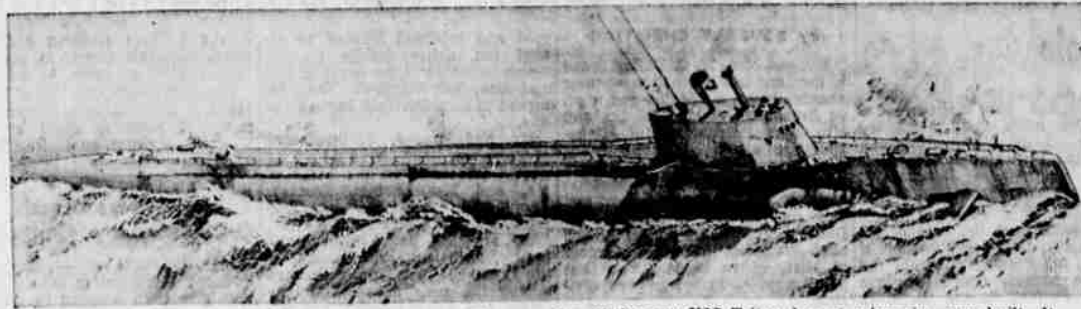
Meat Packers To Receive 7 1/2 Cent Hourly Raise

SEATTLE (AP) — Some 4,000 meatpackinghouse workers in Washington, Oregon and Idaho will receive a 7 1/2 cent hourly wage increase Sept. 1.

An official of the Amalgamated Meatcutters and Butcher Workmen said Monday the increase is provided automatically under a master agreement between the international union and employers.

Both employees of independent packinghouse firms as well as those in branches of the "big four" packers will receive the increase.

The new minimum hourly scales for men in the Seattle-Tacoma and Everett areas will range from \$2.23 to \$2.85. Women's scales range from \$2.13 to \$2.31 1/2. The packinghouse workers also received cost-of-living increases July 1 and Jan. 1.

Triton carries 13 officers and 135 men. It was built and launched at General Dynamics Corporation's Electric Boat Division at Groton, Conn.

Senate Passes Trade Agreement

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Monday sent to President Eisenhower a four-year extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreement Act—the longest extension of the 24-year-old law ever voted.

The bill gives the President substantially what he asked in the way of new authority to operate the tariff reduction program favored by Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

It permits the President to negotiate agreements making further 20 per cent tariff cuts. The administration has said it plans to use the authority chiefly to European common market now coming into effect.

The Senate completed legislative action on the measure by a roll call vote of 72-180.

The House passed it last Thursday.

The four years extension—continuing the law through June 30, 1962—is a compromise between five years originally voted by the House and three years voted by the Senate.

Under the trade agreements program, the over-all level of American tariffs on free and dutiable items has dropped from 38.4 per cent in 1934 to 5.9 in 1957. On only dutiable goods, the average has fallen from 47.6 to 11 per cent.

The new 20 per cent cutting authority in the bill applies to rates in effect July 1, 1958.

The bill permits the President to negotiate the full 20 per cent reduction in the last year of extension and to apply the cuts in the four-year period ending June 30, 1966. No more than a 10 per

Cashier Is Meted 2 1/2 Year Sentence For Embezzlement

PORTLAND (AP)—Claire Ritter stood stolidly in court here Monday and heard himself sentenced to 2 1/2 years in prison for embezzling \$99,072 from a bank.

Ritter, 32, earlier had pleaded guilty to five counts of embezzlement at the First National Bank of Halfway, Ore., of which he was a director and the cashier.

The sentence was pronounced by U. S. District Judge William East. The judge sentenced Ritter to 2 1/2 years on each count, and said the terms will run concurrently.

Each count could have carried a maximum sentence of 5 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. No fine was imposed upon Ritter.

East permitted Ritter to start serving the sentence Sept. 10. Ritter had requested the stay in order to get his personal affairs in order.

Assistant U. S. Atty. George Juba said Ritter had signed over all of his property and belongings to the bank. It appeared, Juba said, it would nearly cover the bank's loss.

The shortage at Halfway, a tiny Eastern Oregon town, was discovered last spring. The bank later was turned over to the U. S. Comptroller of Currency for liquidation.

Ritter appeared for sentencing wearing a neat business suit. There was no visible show of emotion as sentence was pronounced.

Glide Scouts Plan For Hike, Campout

Glide Boy Scout Troop 112 will start Friday on a nine-day hike and campout under Scoutmaster Ernie McDonald. Scouts and parents met last weekend at the Wolf Creek Camp to discuss the program. Hamburgers and coffee were served by the scouts.

McDonald said the hike was planned to give scouts experience in hiking, camping and scoutcraft. All meals will be cooked by patrols, each patrol taking turns cooking for the entire troop under adult supervision. This will insure proper diet and quantities of food.

The long term camp starts Friday at Glad to check packs, clothing and other gear. Parents are invited to enjoy a potluck dinner that evening. Transportation will be provided Saturday morning to Moore's Cafe at Steamboat for breakfast and then drive to Clearwater Road on the Diamond Lake Ranger District. The hike then starts with a three-mile hike to Clearwater Falls for an overnight camp. Sunday, they will hike four miles to Thielsen Creek to fish, play games and camp overnight.

Monday, a five-mile hike will lead to Lemley Lake for overnight camp. Tuesday, they will go six miles to Kelsay Valley and take a side trip of four miles to the camp ground. Parents are invited to attend the big troop campfire meeting the evening of Aug. 29 at Kelsay Valley. This event completes the first portion of the program.

Any of the younger scouts who are fatigued may return home as transportation will be standing by.

There will be a backpack trip Thursday, Aug. 21, with a 10-mile hike to Maidu Lake over Forest Service trails. Friday will be a day of rest, relaxation, swimming and fishing. Saturday, a 13-mile hike will take the boys back to Thielsen Creek Campground overnight.

Sunday, the group will walk five miles to Diamond Lake to be picked up by waiting cars for the return to their homes. The scouts who stay on for the entire trip will cover 50 miles with their packs.

Famed Tiffany's Yields Jewels To Burglars

NEW YORK (AP) — As the sun rose over Manhattan Sunday, burglars punched holes in two display windows of staid, world-famed Tiffany's and lifted out jewelry valued at \$163,300.

The arrival in New York of Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko helped the brazen burglars. A patrolman whose beat includes the 5th Avenue store was withdrawn to reinforce a guard detail for the Soviet diplomat.

It was the first burglary at Tiffany's in more than 50 years.

Police theorized that the burglars pounded at the shatterproof display windows with sledge hammers, making holes about five inches wide.

A man's arm could easily fit through each hole. The windows were not protected by a burglar alarm system.
