9 PICNICKERS DROWN

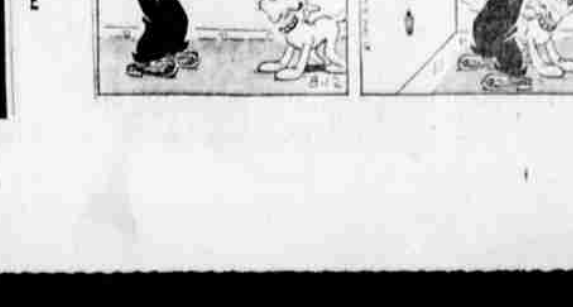

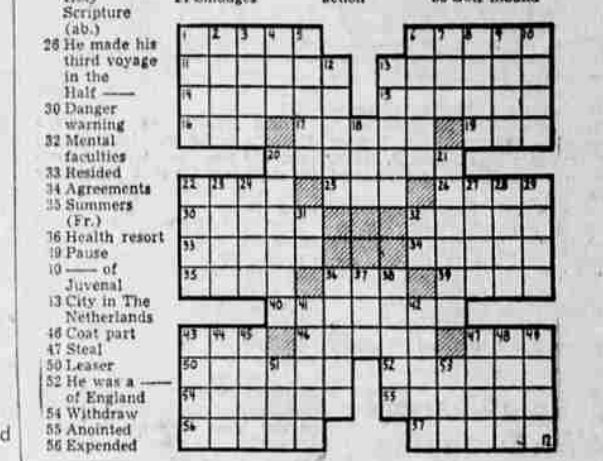
