

Conferees Agree On Indian Bill Covering Sale

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate House conferees were reported Tuesday to have reached agreement on a compromise bill covering sale of the Klamath Indian Reservation timber in Oregon.

Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore) said the agreement would be brought before the House Wednesday for a vote.

The bill amends existing procedures for sale of the tribal assets to require that the vast timber stand be offered first to private interests. The government would buy remaining stands, paying up to a maximum of 90 million dollars, for inclusion in the national forest system.

The compromise bill, Ullman said, provides that a condition of private purchase would require management of the timber "according to sustained yield procedures so as to furnish a continuous supply of timber."

Conferees accepted language of the House bill requiring such management to continue in perpetuity rather than for 100 years, as set out in the Senate version.

House language also was accepted, Ullman said, postponing until April 1, 1959, the sale of the timber to be offered under the bill to permit a reappraisal of its worth.

Purpose of the bill is to amend sales procedures originally approved by Congress in 1954 in enacting the bill for ending federal supervision over the Oregon tribe.

2 Oregon Areas Given Sewage Disposal Funds

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Sanitary Authority here was allocated funds for sewage disposal programs in the Klamath Falls and Portland areas.

The biggest sum, \$518,592, was appropriated for the joint Washington, Multnomah and Clackamas County sewer program.

In addition, the authority gave \$137,773 to the South Suburban Sanitary District on the outskirts of Klamath Falls.

The authority turned down fund requests submitted by Eugene, Lakeview, Ashland, Ontario, Prineville and Hood River.

The requests totaled one million dollars.

Macmillan Back Home From Visit To Cyprus

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Macmillan came home Tuesday from what he called encouraging talks in Athens, Ankara and Nicosia on the future of strife-torn Cyprus.

Macmillan told a news conference in Nicosia before flying to London that the main job now is to end violence which has taken hundreds of lives on the British Mediterranean island.

He said he could not tell what the next step would be but would discuss the problem with his Cabinet.

Senate Completes Action On Defense Funds Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has completed congressional action here on a bill providing more than \$9½ billion dollars in defense funds.

The Senate sent the measure to President Eisenhower shortly after the House had passed it on a voice vote. There was no objection or debate on it in the Senate.

The bill provides about \$15½ billion more than Eisenhower requested to run the defense establishment in the year that started July 1. Most of the additional money is ticketed for big bombers, long range missiles and missile-firing submarines.

Late Model Migs Seen Over Quemoy

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — Late model MIG jet fighters appeared Tuesday near the Chinese Nationalists' offshore island stronghold of Quemoy. It also came under Red Chinese artillery fire.

The Military Information Service said MIG jets flew 90 sorties in the vicinity of Quemoy throughout the day and antiaircraft guns opened fire on four of the planes.

A Defense Ministry communique said Red guns on Tatung island hit Quemoy with 51 shells. No damage was reported.

The Nationalists have put defenses both in the offshore islands and on Formosa on the alert, charging that the Communists are building up their air power at bases across the strait from Formosa.

Some Nationalist quarters showed nervousness over the appearance of the MIGs over Quemoy. Premier Chen Cheng, who also is vice president, declared a Red attack on Formosa could be launched at any time.

Towerman Confesses Failure To Halt Train

STERLINGTON, N. Y. (AP) — A towerman who admitted forgetting to stop one of two Erie Railroad passenger trains that collided Monday has been cleared of any culpable negligence.

Five persons died and 36 were injured in the head-on crash.

Towerman Fred Roth, 38, Glen Rock, N. Y., was cleared in his admitted lapse of memory by Rockland County Coroner R. J. Moses.

However, Dist. Atty. John F. Skahan requested county officials to continue their investigation.

Roth said under oath that he had been ordered to stop the west-bound train while an eastbound train bypassed a freight.

The train which was to have been held at Suffern, N. Y., four miles east of here, went through Roth's tower without receiving a signal to stop.

"I forgot it," he said.

Later, Roth said, he tried to warn the train by radio but received no answer. A freight train, Roth said, heard the call and answered before the crash.

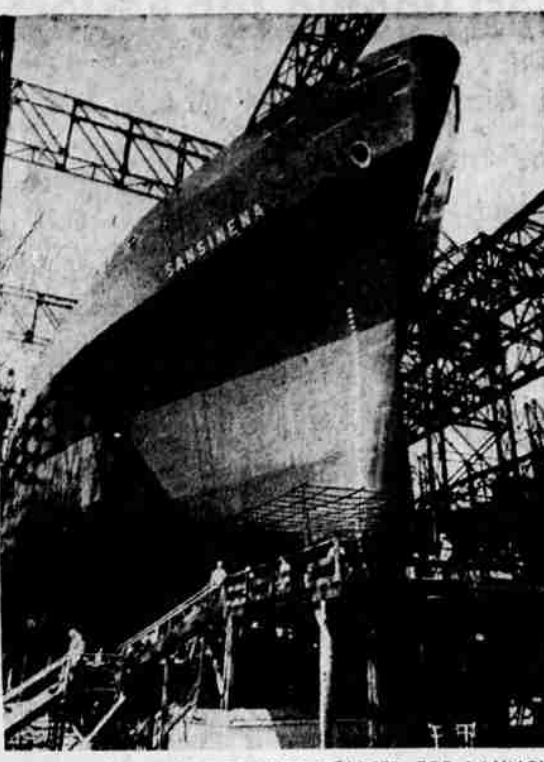

Japanese Airliner Lost Near Coast

TOKYO (AP) — A Japanese airliner carrying 33 persons, including one American was lost and feared crashed in Japanese coastal waters.

All-Nippon Airways said aboard six missing DC3 were 3 crewmen and 30 passengers including one non-Japanese listed as Howard Kreiss. The Japan Broadcasting Corp. reported he was with Kreiss & Co., Los Angeles.

The lost airliner reported at 8:57 p.m. Tuesday night about 100 miles southwest of Tokyo, that it had trouble with its left engine and was returning to Tokyo International Airport.

A half hour later, it asked permission to land at Kisarazu Air Base, 35 miles southeast of Tokyo, on the shores of Tokyo Bay.

There were no further messages. Civil aviation officials said they feared the plane went down offshore.

A U.S. Air Force amphibian plane started searching coastal waters.

Five Japanese Coast Guard boats began a sweep of the area from Shimoda — near where the plane first encountered trouble — to Tokyo Bay.

The plane was on a flight to Nagoya in Western Japan.
