Schools Throughout County To Start Early Next Month

5,073 Pupils To Sign Up In Roseburg

Estimated student enrollment in the Roseburg Schools in September will be 5,073, according to Supt. M. C. Deller.

Total number of students enrolled in school during the 1958-59 school year was 5,169. Enrollment last year dropped below original estimates. Deller attributed this to the recession.

Following is a listing of how many students are expected to enroll in each grade: Grade one 575, grade two 471, grade three 423, grade four 450, grade five 460, grade six 534, grade seven 411, grade eight 375, grade nine 360, grade ten 341, grade 11 - 382, grade 12 - 293.

School Census Showed Drop

Douglas County's school census figure dropped during the past school year. County School Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg said it was the first drop since he has been superintendent.

He took over the position in 1949. He contributed the drop to the county's economic situation. In October of year before last, 1956, the census figure stood at 22,618. The last census figure, determined in October of 1957, was 18,085. Starting about 1945, there was a steady increase in enrollments each year until about four years ago when enrollment figures leveled off. Biggest enrollment was between 1948 and 1954.

County school funds for each district are allotted on the basis of the census figure. Each district is allotted \$10 per census child.

Canyonville Bible School Sets Opening For Sept. 8

Opening Sept. 8 to an expected enrollment of between 130 and 140 students, Canyonville Bible Academy begins its 24th year as a Christian high school and its 10th year affiliated with the Assemblies of God churches.

Events calendared for the fall term include the reception banquet welcoming new students on Sept. 12; Thanksgiving holiday from Nov. 26 to Nov. 30; Christmas vacation from Dec. 20 to Jan. 4, 1959, and the beginning of the second semester on Jan. 27, Virginia Proctor, News-Review correspondent reports.

Dillard Expects 1,395 Students

Ten new teachers will greet an estimated 1,395 students in the Dillard Schools Sept. 2.

Enrollment in the district is expected to be up from last year, according to School Supt. George A. Corwin. Estimated enrollment in grades seven through 12 will be 575, in Temple School 160, Lookingglass 100 and Dillard 560.

The new teachers include Clifford Findley who will teach the eighth grade. He was graduated in 1958 from Southern Oregon College at Ashland.

Laurence Wilson, a 1958 University of Oregon graduate, will teach junior English and world geography. He is married and has four children, David, Sams, who was graduated from the university the same year, will teach world geography. In addition, he will also teach art. Sams is married and has one child.

Districts Plan Yearly Events

Schools throughout Douglas County will be starting next month. None of the county's 26 school districts scheduled major construction but minor improvements have been done during the summer months in many districts.

New teachers are also moving into the county and looking for homes. In most districts an increase is not expected in enrollments. Dillard School District is the exception.

Parents, teachers and pupils are getting in the back-to-school spirit. New school clothes are being purchased and in Roseburg, the Roseburg High School marching band has started rehearsals.

The football spirit is also in the air and the sport looms high on most school calendars. Many of the school calendars have been released but most of them are tentative.

Parents "get into the act" through Parent-Teacher Assn. activities. PTA units throughout the county elected their officers for the coming year before school was dismissed.

Registration Set At Days Creek

Days Creek schools will open Sept. 2 from 9 a. m. to 11:45 p. m. Approximately 245 students are expected to enroll. Last year, 224 students attended Days Creek schools. Two teachers new to the district have been hired by the school board, Mrs. Edith Moore, News-Review correspondent, reports.

Oakland Schools To Open Sept. 2

A total of 556 students are expected to enroll in Oakland schools when school opens Sept. 2.

Of this total, 160 students will be enrolled in the high school and 396 in Lincoln and Washington elementary schools. The enrollment figures are similar to those of last year, Mrs. Edith Dunn, News-Review correspondent, reports.

At Oakland High School, Darrell Langevin, who has taught music at the school for the past three years, will serve as principal. Teachers of the district will meet for instructions Sept. 1.

Children attending school for the first time must have their health cards and birth certificates, Mrs. George Munson, News-Review correspondent, reports.

Four new teachers will welcome students back to school. They are Clifton Hughes, Mrs. Albert Hughes, Mrs. Doris Parnell and Mrs. Alvie Gillespie.

Clifton Hughes will serve as principal of the school. He came from the Oakland School District where he was a vice principal and taught the eighth grade for the past 12 years.

Mrs. Hughes and Mrs. Gillespie came from the Riddle School District. Mrs. Parnell, who will teach music at Umpqua, has been with the Sutherlin School District for the past nine years.

Academy Expects Same Enrollment

An estimated 80 students are expected to enroll Sept. 2 in the Roseburg Junior Academy.

The enrollment will be about the same as last year. Most of the students enrolled in June before school was dismissed.

Members of the Home and School Assn., which is comparable to the public school PTA, will sponsor a social event to welcome the teachers. The social is planned for soon after school opens in September.

Other events on the school's calendar of events includes one week in the fall and one in the spring when special emphasis is given to the spiritual side of life, Christmas caroling program and a spring ingathering program. Special speakers, programs by the children and the showing of special films are also planned.

Myrtle Creek Expects About 30 More Students

Myrtle Creek School Supt. Al Nest estimates a total of 1,330 students will register for school Sept. 3 and 4.

This is an increase of 30 over last year's enrollment. It includes an expected increase of 20 pupils in the high school and 10 in grade and high school registration is scheduled for Sept. 3. A faculty Orientation Day is scheduled for Sept. 2, Ruth Evans, News-Review correspondent, reports.

Canyonville Events Listed

Enrollment in Canyonville schools is expected to be about the same when school opens Sept. 2 as it was last year, Supt. O. J. Monger said.

Close to 90 students are expected to enroll in the high school and 310 in the elementary school. Three special events are listed on the school calendar of events.

They are, the teachers' workshop in November, high school play and carnival in November and a one-act play contest in April, Mrs. Virginia Proctor, News-Review correspondent reports.

Ross, who is married and has three children, has taught zoology and anatomy at Portland State College and physiology and biology at Lewis and Clark College. His last teaching position was at Callin Gable High School in Portland.

Donald Nellermoe, a 1958 graduate of Concordia College, Marble Head, Minn., will teach typing and office practice. His wife, Joyce, also a Concordia College graduate, will teach girls physical education.

Canyonville Establishes New System

Instead of registering first and ninth graders in August as has been the usual practice, the Canyonville schools this year inaugurated a different system, setting most first graders registered in a May pre-school clinic and saving registration of ninth graders to the first two weeks of school.

Physical examination blanks were given mothers of first graders at the clinic to be filled out by doctors at Forest Glen hospital or the family physician sometime this summer. Ninth graders will also be examined outside of school by clinic doctors or the family physician. Physical examinations are at the school board's expense, Mrs. Virginia Proctor, News-Review correspondent, reports.



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
