

Newest Forecast For Wheat, Corn Announced By Dept.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department, in a mid-growing season report, here has forecast this year's corn crop at 3,487,159,000 bushels and the wheat crop at 1,429,725,000 bushels.

The corn figure is 175,910,000 bushels more than last month's forecast of 3,311,249,000 bushels. It compares with 3,402,832,000 produced last year and 3,144,304,000 for the ten-year 1947-56 average.

The wheat estimate is 76,635,000 bushels more than last month's forecast of 1,342,490,000 bushels. It compares with 947,102,000 harvested last year and 1,116,218,000 for the ten-year average.

Corn was grown under acreage allotments and a soil bank land retirement program designed to limit production. Wheat was grown under rigid marketing quotas and the soil bank program, also for

the purpose of restricting production. The wheat crop included 1,170,768,000 bushels of winter wheat and 249,957,000 bushels of spring wheat.

The winter wheat estimate compares with 1,129,727,000 forecast last month, 707,201,000 produced last year and 849,604,000 for the ten-year average.

The spring wheat estimate compares with 213,763,000 predicted a month ago, 239,901,000 produced last year and 266,611,000 for the ten-year average.

The spring wheat crop included 18,733,000 bushels of durum and 221,294,000 bushels of spring wheat other than durum. Last month's durum forecast was 14,985,000 bushels compared with 39,680,000 last year and 29,904,000 for the ten-year average.

Spring wheat other than durum

was forecast last month at 194,788,000 bushels compared with 200,221,000 last year and 236,707,000 for the ten-year average.

American Student Freed From Communist Jails

VIENNA (AP) — A 22-year-old American student, John Bachman Harcastle, of Nashville, Tenn., was released on the Austro-Czechoslovak border Tuesday after three days in Czech Communist jails, including 24 hours in solitary confinement.

"You don't know what it means to be out to be free again," the round-faced American boy said. Harcastle had been arrested by two Czechoslovak border guards on Saturday afternoon after he climbed over a border fence to pose for photographs.

Discrimination Against Indians Blamed For Riot

PRINCE RUPERT, B. C. (AP) — A riot here last week in which an estimated 1000 persons took part, was caused by racial discrimination against the local Indian population, a fisherman's union claimed this week in a letter to British Columbia government officials.

The union called for a full scale investigation into the disturbance, particularly into treatment of Indians by Royal Canadian Mounted Police and by local business.

Failure to investigate the matter, the union says, could result in future disturbances "on a more massive scale."

The riot occurred the night of Aug. 3 when police arrested a man and woman, who officers said had been fighting in the street.

Bystanders, many of whom were Indians objected to the arrest and the crowd soon grew into a howling, fist-waving mob which demonstrated for more than three hours.

It was finally stopped by the town's entire force of policemen and firemen, using tear gas and fire hoses.

Some 40 persons were arrested and charged with inciting or taking part in a riot.

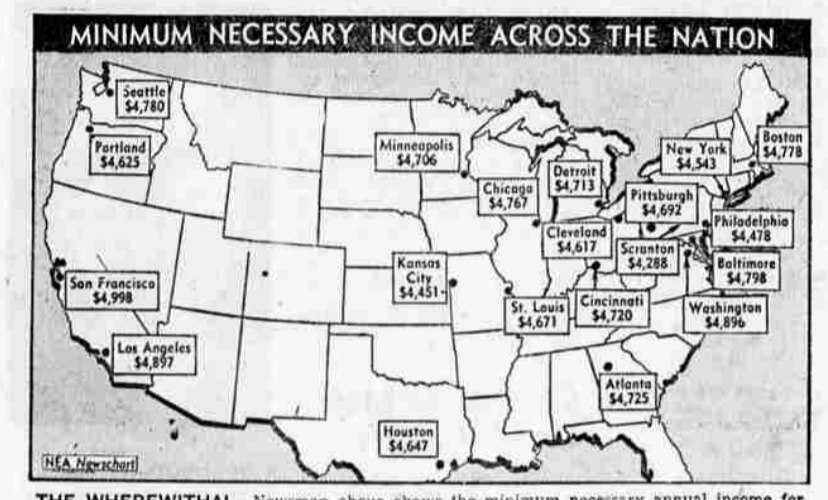

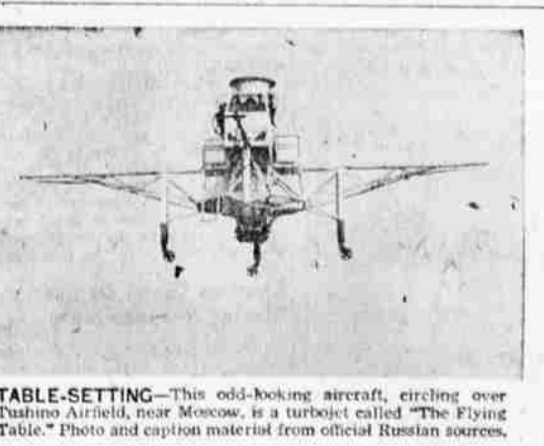

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Hatfield Raps Holmes On Strike Attitude

SALEM (AP) — Secretary of State Mark Hatfield here has criticized the role of Gov. Robert Holmes in the labor dispute which has tied up Oregon's heavy construction for a month.

Hatfield, Republican nominee for governor, said that Holmes had called for establishment of a state labor conciliator in his inaugural address. "Yet, after more than 30 days of this strike, he (the labor conciliator) has not been asked to offer his services," said Hatfield.

"I cannot see that the governor's office has accomplished anything other than sitting in on some talks and issuing press releases," Hatfield said.

Submerged Non Swimmer Scrambles To Safety

ROSE LAKE, Idaho (AP) — A truck driver who can't swim scrambled to safety from the Coeur d'Alene River this week after the bottom fell out of a 200-foot wooden bridge as he drove across it.

Clayton Johnson, 25, of nearby Coeur d'Alene, plunged some 30 feet into the water by his mill truck but was able to get out of the submerged cab and grab onto the bridge wreckage. His only apparent injury was a bruised cheek.

He said he was halfway across the bridge on a county road when he heard it crack beneath his rear wheels. A timber ahead of the truck flew up and struck the cab and then the bottom of the bridge fell out, he said.

The truck was still underwater Tuesday.
