

Count Station
Renovation Set,
Reports State

Tentative plans for renovation of the Oregon Game Common fish counting station at Winchester Dam were revealed today by regional commission headquarters in Roseburg.

The work probably will be done in early September, with bids due at Game Commission headquarters in Portland Aug. 26.

California Oregon Power Co. is to draw down the water level of the reservoir while some of the work is being done.

Work planned includes replacement of some of the wooden platform area with concrete, improvement of the fish trap to ease trapping and examination of marked fish, installation of a new track over which the counting house is pulled to high ground during high water periods and wiring the station with 220 volts of electrical power.

The commission also said that well in which mechanical counting equipment may be installed at a future date also may be part of the work.

All-Stars To Use Double-Unit
Backfield Against Detroit Lions

CHICAGO (AP) — Using a double-unit backfield, the College All-Stars will try to outpace and outrun the Detroit Lions tomorrow night.

That is more than most of the National Football League clubs could do last year.

It is such a tall order the odds-makers think the All-Stars won't come within 13 points of winning.

The pro kings will be shooting for their 16th decision in the series. Their last defeat came when the Cleveland Browns lost 30-27 in 1955.

The ex-collegians have seven victories. Two games were tied.

Graham Fears Mistakes

Otto Graham, All-Stars' head coach for the first time, knows he can't show the Lions anything they haven't seen before except new faces.

"We have a good All-Star squad but the trick is not to make too many mistakes," said Graham, who may decide he has enough manpower to relay plays to his quarterbacks in the manner of Paul Brown, his old Cleveland coach.

"We aren't naive enough to think the Lions will make many mistakes. If they do, it will be one of those breaks that might

balance the game in our favor. We know we'll have trouble if the Lions feel like playing and want to win."

Graham's two-unit backfield system will key the offense. One set will be led by quarterback King Hill of Rice and include Walt Kowalczyk of Michigan State at fullback and Jim Pace of Michigan and Dick Christy of North Carolina State at halfback.

The other unit will have Jim Ninowski of Michigan State as quarterback, fullback Jim Taylor of Louisiana State, and Bob Mitchell of Illinois and Phil King of Vanderbilt at the halves.

Runners Abound

Seldom have the All-Stars had such fine break-away runners as Mitchell, Pace and Len Lyles of Louisville, the 1957 top collegiate scorer with 132 points.

They have power and speed in such runners as John Sample of Maryland State and Kowalczyk. They have exceptional passers in Hill, Tom Forrestal of Navy and Ninowski.

In addition to the fleet halfbacks they have outstanding receivers at end—such as Fred Dugan of Dayton, Jim Gibbons of Iowa, Bob Jewett of Michigan State and Tom Schulte of East Kentucky State.

All this plus a line that could average 234 pounds from tackle to tackle.

Oregon Thinclads
Welcomed Home
At Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — Starting with a modest crowd at Portland's international airport Wednesday evening and later the keys to the city, three Oregon track stars were welcomed home.

Aside from relatives, friends, civic and AAU officials the crowd at the airport, which awaited Bill Dellinger, Jim Grelle and Dave Edstrom, was mostly citizens of Sherwood, Edstrom's home town.

The trio, all past or present University of Oregon students, who competed in four European countries, this summer, said it was a wonderful trip. They visited Moscow, Warsaw, Budapest, and Athens, competing in two-day meets in each city as members of a select American team.

Dellinger, now an Air Force lieutenant, told of the tremendous enthusiasm of the people in Poland and capacity crowds at the Warsaw stadium of more than 100,000 each day.

Grelle, who won 1500-meter races at Moscow and Athens, said that as many as 500 Poles watched the Americans in workouts. "The Poles had a lot of spirit and morale, especially compared with the Hungarians," Grelle said.

In his race against Istvan Rozsavoelyi, who broke the world 1500-meter mark, Dellinger, a 1956 Olympic team member, did 3:41.5, best ever by an American.

"I had no idea we were going that fast," he said.

Commenting on his loss at Athens, when he was beaten by Christos Chiotis of Greece, Dellinger said: "It was a hard track to run on, and slippery. I've had lower times than he and believe I could beat him in another race."

Dave Edstrom said a sore leg kept him from running at Athens.

The three said they were well treated in all countries. "We were allowed to do as we pleased in Moscow, but weren't supposed to discuss politics," Grelle said.

The American girls' team including Sharon Shepherd of Mapleton, Ore., was praised by the three. Miss Shepherd, who placed in the shot-put in three meets, arrives at Eugene Thursday.

Los Angeles Dodger pitcher Bob Giallombardo won 21 games for Reno, Nev., in the California League in 1957. He had four shutouts among 21 complete games.

Occasional good catches of trout are reported at Willow Creek Reservoir and Squaw lakes.

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Crawford Claims
Contender Role
Following Draw

NEW YORK (AP) — For whatever it may be worth to world welterweight champion Virgil Akins, Mickey Crawford now regards himself as the No. 1 contender for the crown.

"Why shouldn't I?" scowled the 34-year-old Mich., boxer-artist Thursday. "I know I won last night's fight with Gaspar Ortega. And even though they called it a draw, I still regard myself as No. 1 contender."

Well, what Crawford says may be true, but the chances are that his next battle will be with this same Ortega. They now have met twice. A month ago, Ortega won a split decision. Wednesday night in Madison Square Garden they fought a draw.

There's no doubt that the deadlock will work to Crawford's advantage. Ortega currently is No. 1 on the list for Virgil Akins' crown. He needed a victory over Crawford to cement his claims.

Actually, Crawford made him look bad through most of the fight and The Associated Press saw Mickey, the artist, as victor, 6-4. That card agreed with Judge Joe Eppes'.

However, Judge Bill Rehl, saw Ortega the winner, 7-3. Referee Burney Felix called it all even, 4-4 in rounds, and 5-5 in points. The point system is used in New York State in case of a tie in rounds.

Red Sox Might Play Tilt
In Portland Sept. 8

PORTLAND (AP) — The secretary of the Portland Baseball Club said Wednesday there is a strong chance that the Boston Red Sox will play an exhibition game here Sept. 8.

"We expect definite word in the next few days," said Don Walker, secretary.
