

All-Stars Ready To Combat Favored Lions With Passes

CHICAGO (AP) — The All-Stars start Operation Ozone tonight. They are expected to make a daring effort to beat the Detroit Lions, champions of the National Football League.

The 25th All-Star promises to draw 70,000 spectators to Soldier Field. It will be televised and broadcast nationally by ABC starting at 8:30 p.m. EST.

The Lions rule a solid 13½ point favorite to gain a 16th decision for the pros in the rivalry. The All-Stars have won seven times, the last being 30-27 over the Cleveland Browns in 1955, and have held the pro champs to two standstills.

Lions Rule
In two other appearances in the classic the Lions have treated the All-Stars as morsels. They beat them 24-10 in 1953 and 31-6 in 1954. With Tobin Rote and Bobby Layne giving a powerful one-two punch at quarterback, the Lions again are preparing for a feast.

Probably their two busiest men will be Darrin McDermott and Gene Cronin, defensive ends. They are assigned to barge into the All-Stars backfield in an attempt to smear passing plans.

Wenatchee's Chiefs, with a firm hold on second place, moved to Yakima Friday night for a crucial four-game series with the Northwest League toppling Bears.

With 16 days remaining until the end of the season's second half, the Chiefs-Bears get-together could be the deciding factor in the lineup of the upper division clubs come Sept. 1.

Wenatchee Thursday night stunned Tri-City, 12-4, to win the series' 2-1, while Yakima was taking Salem, 6-2, and Lewiston was squeaking by Eugene, 1-0.

The Bears swept their four-game series with the Senators, 3-1, and the Broncs dropped the Emeralds, two games to one.

Down 2-0 in the third frame, Wenatchee suddenly found the range against Tri-City hurler Jack Kelly and took the lead with three runs in the fourth. Hank Bivens clouted a triple to drive in two of the tallies.

The Chiefs scored four more in the sixth on seven hits, all singles, and added two in the seventh and here in the ninth to overwhelm the Braves.

Right-hander Dave Watson allowed Tri-City only four hits, struck out 11 and walked 11 to take his third straight victory against no losses.

All of the hits off Watson went for extra bases. Three were doubles and the other was a solo homer by Ray Looney in the ninth.

Maury Lerner stole home for what proved to be Yakima's winning run over Salem. Lerner's steal in the third frame brought the score to 3-1 only moments after three straight walks had driven in the inning's first tally.

Catcher Pete Gongola homered in the seventh for Yakima. Thornton Kipper, already topped the league in wins, notched his 19th victory with a sterling two-hit shutout of Eugene. He has lost 10.

Kipper was touched for a single by Mel Krause in the first inning and then blanked the Emeralds for seven frames before Nick Hopkins singled in the ninth.

The game's lone run came in the eighth when Tony Santino rifled a double into leftfield and scored on a single by Don Frailley.

In other games Friday night, besides the Yakima-Wenatchee battle, Lewiston travels to Tri-City and Eugene hosts Salem.

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Chances Of Trans-America Loop, Including Coast 11's, Appear Slim

CHICAGO (AP) — Chances of a new college football conference to fill the gap opened by the death of the Pacific Coast Conference appeared weak Friday.

College officials, in Chicago for Friday night's All-Star football game, said that chances for a nationwide league which would comprise such teams as Army, Navy, Notre Dame, Miami of Florida, Pittsburgh, Southern California, Stanford and California were anything but good.

One spokesman put it this way: "Why should Army, Navy or Notre Dame tie themselves up with a conference? They do well enough as independents."

Still another official set forth the belief that the "Big Five" or the West Coast — Southern Cal, UCLA, California, Stanford and Washington — would eventually form their own league.

Figuring in all of the comment was the Rose Bowl which for the past decade has been a match between representatives of the PCC and the Big Ten. The present contract runs through 1960 and since the PCC will still operate this fall the two leagues again will furnish the 1959 opponents.

However, the 1960 game will present a problem. Many suggestions were thrown around but one possibility would be a Big Ten rep-

representative against one of the California schools.

Meanwhile, the Big Ten meetings in December should clear the picture with a definite decision as to the Western conference's plans toward the Rose Bowl and other post-season football games.

The dirt track is located between the fairgrounds and Highway 99 near the KRRL broadcasting studios. No admission will be charged.

The association hopes to establish a program of quarter midget racing for youngsters. Meanwhile, the kids will get their thrills from rides in the larger cars following each racing program — providing their parents consent.

Micro cars are smaller than standard midget racers, and most of them are powered by power saw motors.
