

Metros Move Early, Rip State Gridders 32-7

PORTLAND (AP)—It took just 53 seconds for the Metro squad to launch its second straight-up drive over State in the Oregon Shrine All-Star football game, 32-7, in the 11th annual prep classic here Saturday night.

In those brief moments, the Metro squad received the opening kickoff and turned halfback Mick Sinnerud of Beaverton loose through a big hole on the right side of the line.

Sinnerud, a fleet, 170-pounder, reappeared 80 yards for the touchdown. The lightly regarded Metro squad scored four more times in a decisive victory over the bulkier State squad.

Sinnerud Most Valuable

Sinnerud played a vital part in several other Metro touchdowns and later was named the game's most valuable player.

After Sinnerud outraced the entire defense for the opening score, the State squad came back for its only lead of the game.

After the Metros had missed their conversion attempt, they kicked off and State promptly marched 60 yards for a touchdown on 11 plays. Frank Hawley went the final yard, and Doug Austin of Dallas kicked the conversion to give State its 7-0 lead.

It was a brief margin, though, for Metro later recovered a fumble on the State 26-yard-line and John Dams of Grant rocketed 16 yards up the middle for a score two plays later.

Lighter Metros Move
The Metro squad was out-weighted about five pounds per man, but they moved their heavier opponents out of the way with ease.

In the second period, rugged blocking cleared the way for a 34-yard punt return by Sinnerud. Then he went nine more yards and set up an eventual touchdown plunge by quarterback Gary Albright of Milwaukie.

It was in the second quarter that State appeared to start a rally as Rick Herman of Springfield dashed 35 yards into the end zone. But the score was nullified by an offside penalty.

Sinnerud scored in the third period, after John Leuning of Portland's Roosevelt blocked a punt and the Metro squad recovered on the State nine-yard line.

Another State fumble, this time in the fourth period, gave the Portland-area all-stars the ball at midfield, and they scored four plays later.

Albright Pass Clicks
Albright unfurled a 13-yard pass to set up the TD, and then John Dams of Portland's Grant circled end 17 yards into the end zone.

A mark of the Metro superiority was that none of its scoring drives took more than five plays. And the Metros also held a big statistical edge. For instance, the Metro team had 297 yards rushing—compared to but 99 for State.

Following the game, center Jim Funtson of Medford was named the State's outstanding lineman, and fullback Hardy Spurgeon of Marshfield the State's top back.

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Bob Gutowski Records Ore. Mark In Vault

PORTLAND (AP)—The highest pole vault in Oregon track history was recorded Saturday when Bob Gutowski skimmed over the bar at 15 feet, 3 inches to win the pole vault in the Northwest All-Corers track meet.

His right ankle heavily taped because of an earlier sprain, the former Occidental College ace from Los Angeles twice failed to clear 15 feet, 3 inches. He holds the world record of 15 feet, 9 1/2 inches.

Highest previous vault in Oregon was by Southern California's Ron Morris with 15 feet.

The Far Western Regional Women's meet, held in conjunction with the All-Corers affair, featured Sharon Shepherd of Mapleton, Ore., who hurled the discus 114 feet, 3 1/2 inches and tossed the javelin 132 feet, 11 inches.

Jim Bailey, a former University of Oregon runner who was the first to run the mile under four minutes in the United States, won the 880 here Saturday in 1:58.7.

Mark Robbins, Roseburg, Ore., won the 3,000 meter steeplechase. Other winners included:

Chicago's Nellie Fox Shatters 2nd Sackers' Endurance Mark

CHICAGO (AP)—He's just a little bit of a guy but Tuesday night in Boston, Jacob Nelson Fox will set a major league endurance record.

The scrappy Chicago White Sox second baseman will be playing his 478th consecutive major league game, eclipsing the mark of 477 set by the immortal Eddie Collins who began with the Philadelphia A's in 1914 and ended with the White Sox in 1918.

Fox might have broken the durability record for second basemen long ago had not Marty Marion, then Sox manager, decided to rest him in Baltimore Aug. 6, 1955, in hopes of breaking a slump.

At that time Fox had a string of 274 games. He now has played in 751 of the last 752 Sox games.

Before Sunday's 3-2 victory over Cleveland, a big No. 477 was chalked at second base and an announcement was made over the public address system that Fox was about to tie the record.

Shortstop Johnny Logan, reminding that he had predicted at All-Star time the Braves would win by 10, said his prediction looked better than ever.

"The way we're going," he said, "we should hit 10 by September. I'd be satisfied if we were ahead by 10, Sept. 15."

Parko Conservative
Veteran Andy Parko wouldn't go on the limb.

"I was with the Dodgers in '51," he said. "Remember that? We were ahead by 13 about this time and lost the pennant to the Giants in a playoff."

"If I can get 25 games out of them," Haney said, "I'll be happy. Conservation of manpower is my biggest problem."

Kids' World Series Playoffs Set Tues.
VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—Eight junior baseball teams start playoffs here Tuesday for the Babe Ruth Baseball League world series title.

Although the series is being played in Canada, no Canadian team will compete. Canada's last hope was North Vancouver team, which lost out in a regional playoff. All the finalists are from the United States.

Favorites are the New England Kinspins from Stamford, Conn., runners-up from Pensacola, Fla., for the 1957 crown. Other finalists are from Seattle, Joplin, Mo., El Paso, Tex., Charlotte, N.C., Massapequa, N.Y., Berkeley, Calif., and Owensboro, Ky.

The Babe Ruth program, now operating in 45 states and five Canadian provinces, embraces more than 100,000 youths in the 13-15 age bracket. They play on some 6,000 teams in more than 1,200 leagues.

Playoffs begin at the league level in July and progress through local, district, state, provincial and regional tournaments to the world series.

George Barr, former National League umpire, will be chief umpire for the series, which opens with games between Joplin and Charlotte and Stamford and Berkeley.

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. (AP)—Seven teams of excited youngsters tried to relax here today as they awaited the opening round of the Little League World Championship Baseball Tournament.

Six of the teams arrived here Sunday from Canada, Hawaii, and all sections of the United States. They joined Monterrey, Mex., the first champion to defend its crown in the 11-year history of the Little League World Series.

Monterrey, representing Latin America, arrived here Thursday.

The series opens Tuesday with Darien, Conn., winner of the Eastern regional tournament, meeting Valleyfield, Que., Canadian champion. Monterrey will play against Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, the Pacific champion, and Portland, Ore., Western champs, meets Kankakee, Ill., Northern region winner, in the day's closing game.

Gadsden, Ala., drew a bye in the first round of play and will meet the winner of the Portland-Kankakee game Wednesday. The other two semi-finalists also meet Wednesday.

Consolation games will be played Thursday and the big game, to decide the championship, will be played Friday.
