

State Of Oregon To Have Surplus Of \$30 Million

SALEM (AP)—The state of Oregon will have a surplus of \$30,631,400 in its general fund at the end of the current fiscal biennium, June 30, 1959, the state Tax Commission estimates.

The expected surplus is nearly identical to that upon which the special session of the Legislature based its income tax rate reduction program last fall.

At that time a \$30,338,468 surplus was predicted for the end of the biennium.

The estimate came in an announcement from the commission that revenues and surplus funds on hand will make levy of a state property tax for debt service unnecessary this year.

The special session last October eliminated all state property tax obligations except for bonded indebtedness.

It has been many years since the Tax Commission has found it necessary to levy a property tax

because other revenue has been available to meet the state's financial needs.

Carl W. Chambers, commission chairman, said tax revenues for the fiscal year 1958-59 will be nearly 16 million dollars below the 1957-58 figure.

He said receipts from personal and corporation income taxes were slightly more than 105 million dollars for the past fiscal year but are expected to drop to about 88.7 million during the current year.

Chambers explained the drop by saying the full impact of the low-

er rates established by the special session was not felt last year because of certain non-recurring revenues from withholding and corporation-excise taxes.

Americans Must Make Sacrifices, Says General

SEATTLE (AP) — Americans must be prepared to make heavy sacrifices if this country is to keep its freedom, Lt. Gen. Arthur G. Trudeau, head of the Army's research and development program, said here.

"Freedom is becoming more and more costly, because defense can only be purchased with sacrifice," the general told a Rotary Club meeting.

"Unless Americans display more sacrifice and less self-complacency and self-ease, we are in grave danger of losing our country and our freedom," Trudeau said.

Blocking Order Issued By ICC On Freight Rates

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interstate Commerce Commission's Suspension Board here has issued a second blocking order in connection with a bid by Freight Forwarder companies for a larger share of large-quantity freight business.

The board, a staff group authorized to act for the commission, notified clipper Carloading Co. of Chicago, not to go through with a plan to offer special low rates on 10,000 to 30,000 pound shipments moving between Chicago and New York-Northern New Jersey area, effective Aug. 20.

The board Wednesday made public a similar suspension notice directed to all major Freight Forwarders in connection with a proposal to offer low rates on 40,000 pound freight shipments moving from points east of the Mississippi River to California, Oregon and Washington.

The proposal was ordered suspended until next March 13, pending ICC investigation of complaints by trucking interests that the Freight Forwarders were attempting to cut into the trucking business by expanding Forwarder use of railroad flat car piggy-back service.

Forwarder company attorneys said Thursday they would appeal to the commission itself to lift the suspension.

Heat, Drought, Disease Damage Washington Crops

SEATTLE (AP) — Heat, drought and disease have damaged some crops in the state but the over-all situation is generally encouraging, the Washington Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said here.

Winter wheat, the state's most valuable single crop, escaped any serious heat loss but rust infestation has shown up in many stands of spring wheat.

The reporting service said slight heat damage had been suffered by many crops in the Columbia Basin. Some early potatoes also are being left in the ground because of poor prices.

One favorable aspect of the warm weather is in slowing down apple growth and reducing the threat of over-size apples — a cause of difficulty in marketing last year's crop.

Western Washington pastures have dried up and some dairymen are feeding hay and silage to livestock.

Mt. Jefferson Lumber Sold To Stayton Firm

LYONS, Ore. (AP) — Mt. Jefferson Lumber Co. has been sold to Freres Forest Products Co. of Stayton and it will be operated by Ted Freres under his firm's name.

Walter Miller, the seller, said some 1,000 acres of timberland in the North Salem drainage was not included. He said he might build a small mill to process timber in managed timber farms his company still owns.

The report, based on information from 119 mills, gave this account of figures last week, the preceding week, and a comparable period of 1957:

Production—91,270,000 board feet, 88,751,000 and 94,357,000.

Shipments—95,490,000 board feet, 94,548,000 and 90,664,000.

Orders—93,885,000 board feet, 98,897,000 and 85,734,000.
