

Senate-House
Deadlock Snags
Farm Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate and House farm leaders ran up no surrender flags today in a first class deadlock that vexed congressional tempers and threatened to upset adjustment plans.

The result left new agricultural legislation facing an uncertain fate.

In a series of seriocomic maneuvers, the Senate Friday turned down a last-chance House farm bill and the House in turn coldly rejected Senate offers to turn over a compromise.

But despite pessimistic pronouncements by all concerned, it appeared that election-year political realities eventually would swing the balance in favor of an eleven-hour agreement in favor of the House bill.

Both House and Senate bills carry vital provisions to forestall sharp acreage cuts in allowable plantings of cotton and rice next year. Both also move in the direction of lower price supports for both these crops and corn as advocated by Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

Washington Receiving Benefits Applications

OLYMPIA (AP) — The state is beginning to receive applications for jobless benefits from Teamsters hit by the truckers tieup, Frank Ryan, assistant state employment security commissioner, reported here.

He said so far there was no estimate of the total number because the applications were being processed in local state employment offices.

"We'll have some figures next week when the final terminal and on-the-road work is completed," Ryan added.

He estimated that if the strike continues, 7,500 to 10,000 benefit applications will be filed.

"Each application will be considered individually," the state official said, adding that persons directly affected by the labor dispute will not be eligible for state compensation checks.

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PRESIDENT SIGNS BILL

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill requiring sponsors of water projects to consult with the Fish and Wildlife Service regarding conservation problems was signed by President Eisenhower.

The measure requires submission of the Fish and Wildlife Service plans to Congress for consideration as part of the legislation authorizing construction of the project. It does not require the sponsor to accept the Fish and Wildlife Service suggestions.
