Northwest Jobs In Construction Bill of Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The \$1,720,115,000 military construction appropriation bill passed last week by the Senate contained \$49,182,000 for projects in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

The bulk of the Pacific Northwest money would be spent in Washington, for which \$45,843,000 was earmarked.

Although the Senate version was \$301,390,000 higher than the appropriations bill approved by the House, less than one million dollars of the additional funds were for the Northwest.

As a result, any cutting done in working out a compromise version probably would have little effect on Northwest projects.

The Senate bill contained this breakdown:

Washington — Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, Bremerton, \$25,438,000; Widbey Island Naval Air Station, \$8,479,000; Bangor naval ammunition depot, \$86,000; Fairchild Air Force Base, Spokane, \$4,094,000; Larson AFB, Moses Lake, \$3,785,000; McChord AFB, Tacoma, \$935,000; Ft. Lewis, \$2,190,000 and \$826,000 (added by Senate).

Oregon — Kingsley Field, Klamath Falls, \$76,000 and \$53,000 (added by Senate).

Idaho — Mountain Home AFB, \$3,111,000.

Soviet Scientists Sympathetic Over Moon Shot Flop

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet scientists took sympathetic note today of the U.S. attempt to shoot for the moon. One said it was a pity it failed; another called it a wonderful attempt.

There was no derision; they seemed to share in the disappointment—but no great surprise—of U.S. and British scientists here for the 10th congress of the International Astronomical Union.

Mrs. Anna Masovich, director of the Soviet moonwatch program and a noted astronomer, said: "A failure in the scientific world is always a pity because it affects so many people."

A. B. Severny, director of the Crimean Observatory, said the U.S. launching, however unsuccessful, remains "the first wonderful attempt of a very important activity."

"The first attempt is the important thing," he added.

The Soviet press had no comment.

LONDON (AP) — Western Europeans showed almost as much disappointment as the Americans today at the failure of the first U.S. moon rocket. It was a significant change of attitude since the days of the first Sputnik.

British and continental newspapers—cynical about the American efforts when the Soviets won the race to launch the first artificial earth satellite—were sympathetic this time.

PRINCESS INJURED

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Princess Desiree, 20-year-old granddaughter of the King of Sweden, suffered a fractured arm and a dislocated knee Sunday night when her jeep skidded and turned over.

Princess Irene, 16, daughter of the King of Greece, who was with Desiree, suffered minor injuries.

Princess Desiree has been a vacation guest of the Greek royal household.

U.S. Survival Demands Sacrifices—Neuberger

CHICAGO (AP) — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore) said here that "unless Americans can make sterner sacrifices to discipline they may not be equal to survival in the kind of world we live in."

Neuberger said Russia is posing for the present generation "a challenge and a test that no generation of Americans has had."

But, he said, Americans may fail the test "unless we realize what we're up against."

Neuberger, in a news conference before addressing the annual convention of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, said higher taxes and a return to government controls on wages, profits, prices and rents may be needed to keep the United States geared for competition with Russia.

Pennsylvania Has 29 Weekend Traffic Deaths

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Death stalked Pennsylvania highways over the weekend.

In all, 28 persons were killed since Friday afternoon in a rash of traffic accidents unsurpassed in recent years in western Pennsylvania.

In eastern Pennsylvania three traffic deaths were reported, making the state weekend total 29, a new high for 1958.

The previous high of traffic deaths recorded in Pennsylvania for this year was 19 over the Memorial Day weekend.

Eighteen persons were killed on state highways last weekend, including six members of a Pittsburgh family spanning four generations.

A weekend of fine weather brought out heavy road traffic. Authorities said they were at a loss to account for so shocking a death toll.
