Illicit Bomb Factory Found

KELOWNA, B. C. (AP)—Police believe they have uncovered an illicit bomb "factory" in the hills near here as the result of a premature explosion in which one member of the Sons of Freedom Doukhobor sect was killed and another severely injured.

The explosion, RCMP believe, ended an attempt to make more bombs to be used in this city last Wednesday — the night bombing raids were made on Oliver, Osoyoos and Vernon, other Okanagan Valley centers.

Killed in the explosion was Philip Pereveroff, 20, of Winlaw in the Slokan valley of southeastern British Columbia. RCMP said he was a known member of the Sons of Freedom Doukhobor sect.

Ohio State, MSU Appear Toughest In 1958 Western Conference Race

CHICAGO (AP)—The Big Ten football race, unpredictable at best, could turn into a hellcat scramble this year with at least seven teams fighting for the title.

Ohio State's defending champions and Michigan State's Spartans will be the teams to beat. Iowa, Wisconsin and Purdue are expected to challenge strongly and Michigan and Illinois never can be counted out until the season ends.

For Minnesota, Indiana and Northwestern, it looks like another long season.

Woody Hayes, Ohio State coach, promises the same bruising attack which has brought the Buckeyes three unbeaten titles in the last three years. Hayes plans to employ a powerful ground attack headed by fullback Bob White, fine line play and a great defense.

MSU Tough
Michigan State is set to challenge all comers for the national title. The Spartans are loaded but they may be in need in the quarterback slot vacated by Jim Nowski.

Iowa again will be tough. The Hawkeyes have quarterback Randy Duncan to pass. They also have good and speedy halfbacks, a fine line and an easy schedule.

Purdue is the team that could take it all — Big Ten title, Rose Bowl and possibly a national title. There are 26 lettermen returning at the Boilermakers campus. Purdue won five of its last six games in 1957, including a 20-13 upset triumph over Michigan State.

Wisconsin has a tough schedule but the Badgers are ready. They have a veteran team and 28 returning lettermen. The schedule Michigan State in succession.

Purdue is the real dark horse. Most Big Ten coaches refer to the Boilermakers when there is talk of a title. "That's the team to watch out for," said Ray Eliot of Illinois. The Boilermakers have a

temendous line plus quarterbacks Bob Spoo and Ross Fichtner.

Wolverines Rebuild
Michigan has to rebuild its line from tackle to tackle. The Wolverines are always tough and as unpredictable team as there is in the Western Conference. Fullback John Herrstein is a strong prospect to lead Michigan to most of its triumphs.

Illinois could wind up with the best line in the country. The Illini, however, will be lacking their usual fleet of halfbacks and again are in trouble finding a capable quarterback.

Minnesota has only two regulars back from last year's team which was picked to finish near the top but wound up in eighth place. The Gophers must rely on newcomers and could progress as the season grows older.

Neither Indiana nor Northwestern won a conference game in 1957 and since neither of the two meet it could be the same story again. Help from newcomers is needed in both cases.

Dickerson Named New UCLA Coach

LOS ANGELES (AP)—George Dickerson succeeds the late Henry (Red) Sanders as UCLA's head football coach.

The 45-year-old Dickerson, a UCLA alumnus, was Sander's first assistant and handled a great mass of detail for him, including liaison between student-athletes and faculty.

Sanders, eulogized at a memorial service Monday as "an authentic genius," died last Thursday of a heart attack. He was 53.

Athletic Director Wilbur Johns, in announcing the appointment Monday, said Dickerson was not hired on an interim basis and that his contract will extend for "more than one year." Exact tenure and the salary were not disclosed.

Ruben Amaro, St. Louis Cardinal infielder, was brought up from Rochester this season. He had batted .209 in 92 games. He is a native of Mexico.

The University of New Mexico baseball team won the Skyline Conference eastern division crown in 1958 with an 8-4 record.

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
