Zora Folley Ready To Test Patterson

CHANDLER, Ariz. (AP) — "I deserve the chance to fight Patterson. I think I can lick him any time, any place."

So says No. 1 heavyweight contender Zora Folley, who figures he's been marking time long enough.

Folley's manager, millionaire Phoenix sportsman Bill Swift, echoes the refrain.

Why, asks Swift, has the Chandler fighter been sidetracked in favor of opponents of lesser standing?

Champion Floyd Patterson's manager, Gus D'Amato, has said: "Patterson won't fight anybody who's fought for the IBC."

The International Boxing Club is a big bogey to D'Amato. And Folley has fought under IBC auspices.

Folley, at 26 has met most of the top heavies. He and his manager feel this is the crossroads. One route leads to the title, the other to oblivion.

Folley watched the champ score a bloody, 12th round knockout over Roy Harris in Los Angeles Monday night and came away convinced that he can defeat Patterson.

Boxers Collect Cash, Traveling Homeward

LOS ANGELES (AP) — World heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson is en route by train today to his home in Mt. Vernon, N.Y., about \$311,000 richer because of his 12th-round knockout of Roy Harris.

Harris flies home to Cut And Shoot, Tex., Saturday for a big reception. He's \$100,000 richer despite his many cuts and bruises.

Before leaving for the East, Manager Gus D'Amato said the champion wants to defend his title again this year.

Oregon Golfers Enter Jaycee Junior Tourney

TUCSON (AP) — Three of Oregon's four entrants qualified for championship match play, beginning today in the annual international Jaycee Junior Golf Tournament.

David Munro, Portland, led the way with 149 in qualifying play that ended Tuesday. Biff Lovett, Portland, and Lynn Yurri, Ontario, also qualified with 150 each.

It took 157 or better to qualify. Mickey Shaw, Milwaukie, finished with 159 and went into consolation match play.

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Chinook Salmon Migration Ending In Umpqua River

The migration of spring chinook salmon in the Umpqua River came to a virtual standstill during the first half of August, figures from the Oregon State Game Commission show.

Only nine salmon passed over the counting board at Winchester Dam in the period of Aug. 1-15. The run normally is nearing an end by Aug. 15.

Summer steelhead also slowed in their migration during the period, with only 51 fish being counted.

Rickey Predicts Flag For Pirates In 1959

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Branch Rickey Sr., board chairman of the Pittsburgh Pirates, Tuesday night predicted the team will win the National League pennant "not this year, but next year."

"But don't sell these lads short this year," said the 76-year-old former general manager of the Pirates and the old Brooklyn Dodger.

Rickey's comments to newsmen came at one of his rare public appearances since suffering a heart attack last February. He looked hale at memorial services of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity.

Eastern Teams Short In Line

NEW YORK (AP) — A dozen or more football coaches at major Eastern colleges are searching frantically for good ends and guards, which seem to be in very short supply this year in the East.

The situation even affects several teams which otherwise are ready to contend for top Eastern ratings. Center is another spot where some leading teams badly need help.

Penn State, which lost five ends from last year's squad, Pitt, Syracuse, Yale, Dartmouth, Columbia and possibly Navy are among those seeking more good flankers. Guard is considered a weak spot on the Army, Penn State, Princeton, Brown and Dartmouth squads.

Some coaches at the independent institutions were able to remedy these deficiencies to some extent during spring practice.

Four Teams Stand Out

Less than two weeks before the start of autumn drills, it appears that spring work at Navy, Army, Syracuse and Penn State progressed to the point where these teams again will be contenders for the Lambert Trophy, emblem of Eastern supremacy.

Holy Cross and Boston College, each with an outstanding quarterback, are well stocked with veteran players and should be in the thick of it.

Rutgers and Boston University likely will show great improvement but not enough to challenge these biggies.

Pitt, with weak spots at ends and tackles and a just adequate backfield, will suffer from a schedule that includes UCLA, Minnesota, Michigan State, Army and Notre Dame.

Princeton appears strong enough to successfully defend its Ivy League title against Dartmouth, Cornell and Yale. Another cavalry charge finish is foreseen in this league.

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Two Pacificists Are Determined To Halt Project

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — Two self-styled pacifists who are determined to halt construction of a missile launching site here say they will be joined by a Pennsylvania minister.

Kenneth Calkins, 23, made the announcement after he and his wife Eleanor, 22, were ejected from the area twice this week.

Calkins said he and his wife and the Rev. Theodore Olson, 26, of Falsington, Pa., would attempt to distribute leaflets urging the workmen not to work.

Federal and military authorities are undecided how to keep the Olson couple and the Rev. Mr. Olson off the site.

Two air policemen escorted Mr. and Mrs. Olson from the installation after they passed out one leaflet protesting bases to a welder.

Calkins said he was here under auspices of the American Friends Service Committee in an effort to halt what he termed a "hopeless arms race with the Soviet Union."

He said there are some religious persons affiliated with the group.

The son of a Chicago Methodist minister, Calkins said if his efforts here are unsuccessful attempts would be made at planned missile sites at Denver, Spokane, Chicago, Omaha and elsewhere.

Spokane Credit Bank Loans Hit All-Time Record

SPOKANE (AP) — The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Spokane said Tuesday its loan account reached a 35-year record this month of more than 100 million dollars.

Paul F. Matson, president, said the bank has channeled almost 3 billion dollars worth of credit to Northwest agriculture since it was opened for business March 22, 1923.

"This money has been used by production credit associations and other local financing institutions making short and intermediate term loans to farmers and ranchers," he said.

The credit bank was capitalized by the federal government but is now partly owned by 30 production credit associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington. They will eventually retire all of the federal investment and become sole owners of the wholesale and retail end of the credit system, Matson said.

The 30 associations now own \$1,042,740 of the Spokane bank's \$6,793,530 capital.

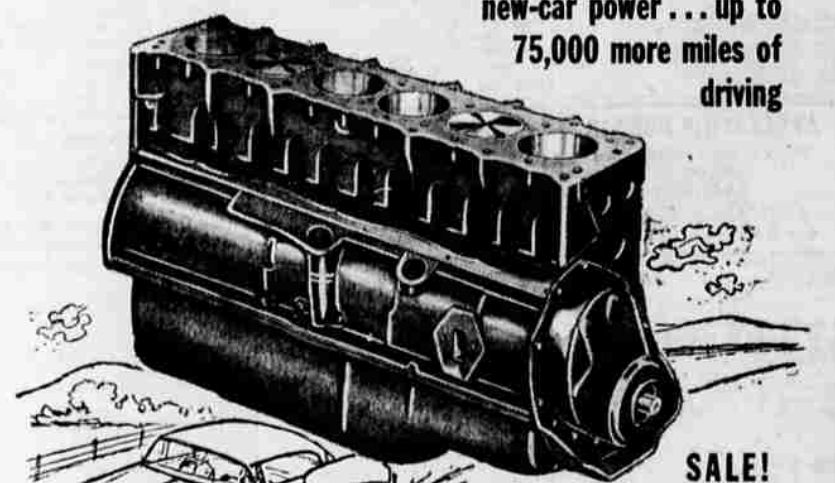
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
