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Building Permits In County Show Large Increase

Total valuation of building permits issued in Douglas County in July showed a substantial increase over June and July of 1957.

The county figure for July, as released by Equitable Savings & Loan Assn., was \$116,740. The valuation represents an increase of 71 per cent over the June figure of \$68,108 and a 31 per cent rise from July of 1957, when valuation was \$89,250.

In Roseburg, however, total valuation showed a dip in both cases. The July total was \$50,165. This represents a 52 per cent dip from June, when valuation was \$104,574, and an even larger 92 per cent drop from 1957, when July valuation totaled \$610,331.

The latter decrease represents the largest drop in the list of 24 major Oregon cities.

In issuance of dwelling permits, however, the picture was brighter. The July figure of \$21,800 represented a whopping 128 increase over the \$9,570 figure of a year ago. It showed a 46 per cent drop-off, however, from the June figure of \$40,500.

County dwelling permits were valued at \$47,152 in July, compared to \$43,468 in June and \$65,282 in July of 1957. This represents a slight increase of 8 per cent over June and a decrease of 28 per cent from last year.

Total valuation of permits for the state's major cities was down 38 per cent from June and up 7 per cent from July, 1957. Dwelling permit valuation was up 10 per cent over June and 41 per cent over 1957.

Health Examinations Forms For Pre-School Children Available

Health examination forms for pre-school children and ninth graders are available at doctor's offices, according to an announcement made by three agencies.

The announcement was made by the Douglas County Health Department, county Medical Society and the Assn. of County School Superintendents.

Children should be provided with health examinations by their family doctor as soon as possible so that the examinations can be completed prior to the opening of school. Children or parents who object to the physical or health examination on the grounds of religious tenets will be excused providing that they present an exemption card properly certified by their church.

Purpose of the health examination is to discover if there are any defects which might interfere with the normal progress and development of the child in school.

County's Stream Flow Continues To Dwindle With Hot Weather

The flow of water in the county's streams continued to dwindle as the hot weather continued deep into August.

This was shown in the latest of comparative stream readings being made this summer by Ben B. Irving, director of the Douglas County Water Resources Survey office.

Outside the main Umpqua, the North Umpqua was still pouring out the most water among all the streams of the basin. On Aug. 14, it was releasing 1,130 cubic second feet past Winchester. This is 90 cfs. less than it was on July 31, or about 670 gallons per second. The figure, however, is still slightly higher than it was last year at the same time.

The South Umpqua, which was banned for swimming earlier this month, also dropped in volume. It was down 28 cfs. to 162 at Winston. The new figure means only 1,200 gallons per second were flowing there on Aug. 15. This also was above the figure of the previous year at the same time and far above the lowest recorded in the last 12 years. In 1946, it was flowing at the rate of only 83 cfs.

The South Umpqua at Tiller was down at about the same rate to 135 cfs. Other readings made by Irving at mid-August showed: Cow Creek near Azalea 16.5, down 2.5; Cow Creek near Riddle 39, down 24 cfs.; Steamboat Creek 35, down 10; Little River at Peel 25, up 4.5; Calapooia Creek near Oakland 15.4, down 3; and Elk Creek near Drain 3.1, down 4.9. Jackson Creek was draining off 30 cfs. into the South Umpqua.

Educators Discuss Plans For Clinic

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Glide Board Meets To Evaluate Plan

J. C. Livingston, representing parents of students, led a critical evaluation of the Oregon School Activities Assn. insurance program at the Glide School Board meeting last week.

The board would like to completely cover all school activities for Glide School District. However, most policies have some limitations. The cost of providing coverage without limitations would be more than the board feels it would like to ask the taxpayers to support. At present, the coverage for Glide Schools is adequate except in unusual cases.

Supt. Harry Harvie was instructed to make sure parents were completely informed about the OSAA insurance as evidence produced showed parents did not have full information that this plan is the best coverage available for the amount set aside in the budget. Harvie was asked to continue his search for a plan that would give the most protection for the same premium. He reported that up to the present time, his investigation has revealed no company that will meet this requirement.

Supt. Harvie reported that three sixth grade teaching positions have not been filled. There is a critical shortage of intermediate teachers throughout Douglas County, he said. Many schools besides Glide are looking for grade school teachers. He said he had contacted every teacher replacement service in the state of Oregon, and many outside, for the position.
