Dr. Huber H. Routh, a Spokane chiropodist, filed the suit against Harley Tucker of Joseph, Ore. He said he suffered a fractured vertebra in the fall and will be laid up for three months.

Dr. Routh, president of the Mavereck Club, booster organization for the annual Diamond Spur Rodeo here, was to be a leader in the parade at Memorial Stadium but his own horse became disabled. He said he borrowed a mount from Tucker, followed the owner's instructions but was bucked off.
