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Cone Collectors To Receive \$4 To \$5 A Sack This Year

Cone collectors will receive two to four dollars a sack for this year's seed crop, according to Robert Bradley, Douglas County extension forester.

He said, however, some crops may be "a little hard to come by" in 1958. Douglas fir cones have been described as both poor in quality and quantity.

However, if sampling shows sufficient quality and maturity, pickers can expect to get from \$2 to \$2.50 a bushel, or \$4 to \$5 for a two bushel sack, depending on the seed count.

Grand fir (lowland white) and white fir (upland white) boast good crops this year and should bring about \$3.50 a sack. Noble Shasta crops are scattered, but price of \$4 or better should be realized.

Poor To Good
Bradley said the Ponderosa pine crop varies from poor to good this year in Deschutes, Umatilla and Walla Walla counties. Prices are quoted at \$3.50 to \$4 a sack this year.

Sugar pine crops are good but scattered, with prices at \$3 a sack.

White pine also has a good crop, but no prices have been quoted.

Port Orford Cedar have some cones this year, but demand seems to be lacking. Incense Cedar, especially Northern California stock, is bringing around \$3 a sack. And demand appears good for Hemlock, with prices of 18 cents a pound for good clean cones without needles.

A very good crop of Sitka spruce also is reported. Demand is fair, Bradley reported, and prices are \$4 a sack.

The county forester warned, however, pickers should be watchful of several factors if they intend to market the cones.

Sample Carefully
Cones should be carefully sampled before harvesting. If poor in quality and quantity there may be many unfertilized seeds.

Avoid cones that are deformed or those from which pitch is running, they probably are wormy. To tell good cones, cut several of them from different parts of the tree-lengthwise. If at least five seeds show up white and firm, the cones are okay. Six to eight seeds showing indicates good average quality. Over eight shows high quality.

Pickers also should first contact buyers to see what they want and get details on shipments. One very important specification, Bradley stated, in addition to seed count and quality is elevation at which cones should be collected.

Similar Elevation
It is generally accepted that trees to be planted or seed to be sown in the forest should come from seeds collected within 1,000 feet elevation of the reforestation site.

Cone collecting in a conscientious manner, Bradley says, can be profitable. Some pickers make as high as \$35 a day, and several have made as much as \$50 a day.

A list of seed buyers is available through the county extension office. They are located at Salem, Medford, Vancouver, Wash., and Seattle.
