Yes, it's almost fall and World Series time. There's the smell of burning leaves. There's the football practice. And there's Lew Burdette, pitching the big shutout again.

It's been a long summer for the big right-hander who pitched the Milwaukee Braves to the world championship last October. At the All-Star game in July he had only a 6-7 record. Those winter banquets that toasted his three victories and two shutouts over the New York Yankees in the Series were as much to blame as anything.

But since the All-Star break he's won 8 of 10. He beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-0 last night with a four-hitter.

It was only his second shutout of the season. He didn't walk a man, struck out five and didn't allow a base runner after Gil Hodges, who had two of the Dodgers' hits, singled with two out in the fourth inning.

Smacks Homer
Burdette also hit his third home run of the season, all at the expense of the Yankees. He beat the Yankees 4-3 as Bob Turley won his 18th. Boston defeated Cleveland 8-6. Baltimore spilled Detroit 7-6 and Kansas City rapped Washington 7-4.

Hank Aaron's 27th home run opened a four-run fourth for the Braves against losing southpaw Sandy Koufax (9-7). Duke Snider's error, Andy Pafko's double and Burdette's homer wrapped it up.

Newk Wins
Don Newcombe, who has lost 11, picked up his third victory for Cincinnati with a six-hitter. Leon Wagner had half the Giants' hits, one his eighth home run in the second inning. The Reds scored four in the first inning, capped by Alex Grammas' three-run, two-out dou-

ble, as Mike McCormick lost his sixth.

Banks drove in all the Cubs' runs. His 39th homer came with two on in the third inning off loser Vern Law (9-11), and he added an RBI double off the Buc right-hander in the fifth. His 40th homer was a solo shot in the eighth. Moe Drabowsky won his ninth with a three-hitter.

Larry Jackson won his 10th for the Cardinals, blanking the Phils on five hits for seven innings and then giving up five hits in the last two frames. He lost his shutout on three singles, the last by pinch-hitter Dave Philley, in the eighth, then got Wally Post on a grounder for the final out of the game with the tying run on third.

Turley Seeks Mark
Bob Turley had to beat himself, you might say, before he could beat American League teams with consistency. Now he has a shot at becoming the New York Yankee's biggest winner since Lefty Gomez, nailed 26 victories 24 years ago.

The big right-hander, who was a lead of four when Gomez did his big job for the Yankees in 1934, licked his wildness with a no-wind-up style, then gained more control and learned to pace himself by pausing for a couple of deep breaths between pitches.

Now he's hit his one-season high with a six-hitter that beat Chicago last night. With 33 games left, Turley could be the first Yankee to win 22 since Gomez, and the first right-hander to do it for the champs since George Pipgras in 1928.

Better yet for Turley, he now is 3-0 against the White Sox this season, a point he's always missed at contract time. "I'm particularly happy with this victory," he said, "because when I sit down to talk salary, they always tell me I never beat the top teams, like the White Sox." His lifetime record against 'em is 8-11.

Boos Win
While the Yankees regain an 11½-game lead with their fourth victory in 12 games, the Boston Red Sox moved within three games of second place Chicago and Baltimore tied Detroit for fourth by defeating the Tigers.

Turley, who had lost two in a row, had a four-hitter with two outs in the ninth, when Jim Rivera hit a home run and Al Smith singled. But he didn't have it in the bag until the Yankees scored three in the seventh and ended a duel with Ray Moore, who had beaten them three times. Two singles and a walk loaded the bases in the seventh. Then consecutive sacrifice flies by Bill Skowron and Elston Howard, and Tony Kubek's bunt single gave the Yankees a 6-2 lead.

The Red Sox had 15 hits and 11 runs, but left 16 men on base and didn't put it away until a three-run eighth. Dick Gernert's 17th home run scored a pair in the winning spurt. Every Boston batter had a hit except Ted Williams, who left six runners stranded.

Don Brewer won his eighth, but needed a walk and a three-run ninth. Hal Woodeshick (3-4) was the loser for the Indians, who got homers from Vic Power, Vic Wertz and Randy Jackson.

The Tigers, scoring four runs in the fourth with the help of an error, blew a 6-3 lead when Gus Triandis' 24th homer, with two on, capped a four-run Oriole seventh. George Susce was the loser in relief. Chuck Beamon won it in relief—first victory since he won his first two major league decisions in September 1956.

Hector Lopez banged a pair of homers and Hal Smith hit a two-run single for the A's, who finished their scoring in four innings. Jack Urban, 5-0 against Washington in his brief career, squared his record at 8-8, but needed relief in the eighth, when Roy Sievers drove in two runs with a single. Vito Valentinetti lost it.

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP)—Veteran Gardnar Mulloy, a finalist last year, challenges Davis Cuppers Sam Gammalla and Barry MacKay with a new partner today in the men's quarterfinals of the National Doubles Tennis Tournament.

Whitney Reed, eighth ranked U. S. singles player, joins Mulloy in the No. 7 pair seeking an upset of the third seeded Americans. Mulloy won the national crown four times with Billy Talbert in the 1940s and lost to Ashley Cooper and Neale Fraser of Australia in the 1957 title match at Longwood paired with Budge Pate.

Second-seeded Aussies Mal Anderson and sore-shouldered Bob Howe face unseeded Tut Bartzin of Dallas and Grant Golden of Chicago.

In the remaining women's semifinal, favored Althea Gibson of New York and Brazil's Maria Bueno play the blonde English teenage sensations, Ann Haydon and Christine Truman.

Defenders Cooper and Fraser turned back inspired Mike Davies and Billy Knight of England 8-6, 10-13-11 in a brilliant exhibition Thursday.

The other men's quarter test was won by Ham Richardson of New Orleans and Alex Olmedo of Los Angeles and Peru from Australia's Bob Mark and Rod Laver, 6-4, 6-2, 6-4.

Unseeded Jeanne Arth of St. Paul, Minn., and Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., clicked off an upset. They eliminated Australia's Mrs. Mary Hawton and Mrs. Thelma Long, 6-2, 6-2.

To Bounce, Or Not To Bounce? WSC Grad Seeks Answer
PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—A Washington State College graduate student working for his master's degree in physical education is trying to solve an old baseball argument:

Does a ball thrown on the fly from the outfield get to home plate faster than one that takes a bounce first?

Chuck Brayton, a 1950 graduate who won three letters in baseball at WSC and now coaches at Yakima Junior College, has set up sort of a field laboratory on the campus diamond to find out.

He recruited assorted outfielders to throw balls toward home while he photographed the proceedings with a high-speed camera at 3,000 frames per minute.

Some balls are bounced off the turf in front of a piece of plywood eight feet long. Uniform grid lines are painted on the board and exact timing is recorded on film by a high speed strobe unit.

Film Examined
The problem from here on is one of examining several hundred feet of film and mathematically determining the speed of each ball before and after the bounce, Brayton said.

Brayton said most outfielders believe the bounced ball takes less time to reach home plate because it picks up speed with a back spin when it hits. Others, he said, contend it only appears to go faster.

He said the argument compares with the old one of whether a pitcher's curve ball really curves.

Lew's Season Start Rough, But Then...
LOS ANGELES (AP)—For half the season, Lew Burdette was little more than a faint image of the Yankee-killing hero of the 1957 World Series.

The lean Milwaukee right-hander turned a stunning trick in that series by whipping New York three times, twice on shutouts. But at the All-Star break this season, he was mired in mediocrity with a record of six victories and seven losses.

Today, little more than a month and a half later, the man from Nitro, W. Va., has a much more credible record of 14-9. He has won 8 of 10 since the All-Star game and now has three consecutive complete game victories.

"It's pretty much a run-of-the-mill thing with me," Burdette said Thursday night after stopping Los Angeles on four hits as the Braves won 4-0. "I usually start pretty slow and it seems I always have about six wins half way through the season."

"I was bothered by a little soreness in my arm early in the season, but just about every pitcher is."

The Seattle Rainiers, though they are poking along in last place, 22½ games off the pace, are turning into the spoilers of the Pacific Coast League.

Of course, the Reds spread some sunshine a few days ago while they were in the throes of a 14-game losing streak. But the moccasin is on the other foot now and the Rainiers have a win streak going.

Thursday night they made it seven in a row with a 7-5 victory over the Portland Beavers, their fourth straight over the fourth-place Oregonians. In their preceding series, the Rainiers beat league-leading Phoenix three out of four games.

The Giants maintained their two-game lead over San Diego Thursday night by trimming Spokane 8-6 while the Padres outlasted Salt Lake City's Bees 6-5 in 13 frames. The Sacra into Solons dropped the third-place Vancouver Mounties 3-2 in the other league game.

Dick Brodowski, who came on in relief in the ninth inning, was

the winner. Don Williams, who took over from Salt Lake City starter Jim Hardison in the sixth, was the loser.

A crowd of 4,503 turned up at Portland as the club's "Build Baseball Week" continued.

George Freese singled and Frank Kellert doubled. Wineciak singled home Freese and went to second on the throw-in. Pinch-hitter Nine Toman's single registered Kellert and Wineciak. But Wiand fanned pinch-hitter Don Nicholas to end the game.

The fourth-place Beavers open a series with Spokane Friday night. The series will close Portland's home season.

Veteran Turner Tabbed To Beat Redl In TV Scrap

NEW YORK (AP)—Welterweight Gil York, a fighter with a hefty bankroll, and Stefan Redl, a newcomer who would like to build up a roll, clash tonight in the 10-round television feature at Madison Square Garden.

Turner, 27, older, more experienced and a harder hitter, is the 8-5 favorite. It should be a lively scrap all the way.

Gil likes to tear after an opponent and fire away with both hands. The same goes for Redl. Someone will have to give and it figures to be 25-year-old Redl. Turner has proved he can take a wallop. Redl's jaw hasn't been tested yet by a ranking fighter.

After eight years of pro fighting, Turner, of Philadelphia, is ranked fifth by Ring magazine and sixth by the National Boxing Assn. His record is 55-17-2, including 35 knockouts.

Redl, a pro only 28 months, is unranked. He has an impressive record of 10-1, including 13 knockouts. The lone defeat was by split decision to Gaie Kerwin at the Garden last Feb. 14.

Since the loss, the Passaic, N. J., scrapper has won three straight.
