

## Son Of America's Richest Man Provides Own Requiem Of Faith During His Funeral

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The poor little rich boy provided his own requiem—a simple poem of faith.

The lad was Timothy Getty, 12-year-old son of oil multimillionaire J. Paul Getty, said by some to be America's richest man.

Timothy's poem was read at his funeral Friday. Somehow it brightened the little Church of the Flowers in a way adult speakers couldn't.

Getty himself did not attend. His former wife, Mrs. Louise Dudley Lynch Getty, the boy's mother, was present.

Timothy was a friendly, outgoing boy, a bit on the philosophical side, perhaps because of illness. He underwent several operations for a brain tumor.

While recuperating in New York he met Roy Campanella, Los Angeles Dodgers catcher who suffered a broken neck in an auto accident. Campanella gave the boy a baseball.

"Why didn't you sign it," asked Timothy.

"I have a little trouble writing," said Campanella.

The boy paused. "I'll pray for you," he said.

**Spiritual Fight Won**

Facing his last operation—a minor one to remove scars of previous surgery—he wrote a poem about God and winning each fight. But he lost his own fight last Sunday.

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## Bus Franchise Snarl Continues To Grip Eugene

EUGENE (AP)—The question of what has happened to the city bus franchise is the latest point of controversy in restoration of stable mass transportation service here.

The franchise was claimed Friday before a Eugene City Council committee meeting by a representative of the defunct City Transit Lines.

He is also one of the incorporators of Cascade Transit Lines, formed as a successor company to City Transit.

Frank Bocci, who identified himself as a representative of City Transit into bankruptcy, that prevented Cascade Transit from leasing the City Transit buses and, he added, it meant City Transit still has a franchise.

City Manager Robert Finlayson denied that. He said City Transit forfeited its franchise in an Aug. 9 letter to the council.

The council will go into the franchise question again Monday night. At that time the union drivers of City Transit—now idled by that company's suspension—are expected to ask a franchise for a company they plan, Cascade Transit was expected to do the same until Bocci raised the question of the old franchise being in existence.

City Atty. John Pennington told the council that the City Transit franchise has been forfeited by the company.

Eugene, Springfield and Salem are all involved in the transportation snarl caused by the shut down of City Transit. The new Cascade Transit started operations again in the three cities, Louis Soukup, head of the old company, is manager of the new, whose drivers are said by Motor Coach Employees Union to be non-union.

**Strike Of Purse Seine Fishermen Settled**

ANACORTES, Wash. (AP)—The way was clear Saturday for American purse seine fishermen, idled by a strike since Tuesday, to start dipping their nets Monday into a heavy run of sockeye salmon streaming into Puget Sound.

The fishermen, spurred by reports of fabulous catches of sockeye being made by Canadian fishermen in the Johnstone Strait area, voted to accept an employer offer of 28 cents a pound for sockeye.

The fishermen had struck to back demands that employers raise the price for sockeye from 25 cents to 31 cents a pound. When offered 28 cents, they voted 310-49 to accept. The voting took place at Anacortes and at Bellingham.

**Seaton Predicts GOP Victories In Alaska**

SEATTLE (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton took off for a tour of Alaska Saturday after predicting a sweeping vote for statehood in the territory's Tuesday election.

Seaton said he would go along with ex-Gov. Mike Stepovich, who resigned his post to enter the Senate race, who predicted statehood would pass by "five or six to one."

"I would expect," the Cabinet official added, "that the Republicans will win the governorship, elect at least one senator and end up with a representative in the House."

In their primary election, Alaskans will nominate candidates for the U.S. Senate and the House of Representatives as well as for state offices. They also will vote on three propositions dealing with the proposed statehood. If any one of the propositions fail, the statehood act would be voided.

The general election is scheduled for Nov. 25.

**Abandoned, Hungry Boy Admits 13 Burglaries**

RIVERHEAD, N.Y. (AP)—"When I got hungry I broke into a house and stole food and whatever money I could find. It was either that or go home, and I couldn't do that."

It was a 13-year-old boy talking to police Friday. The boy was found living in a burlap and oil cloth tent in nearby woods.

The youth admitted to 13 burglaries in this area, most of them in the last five days.

The boy, not identified, said he had not seen his father, a small-time thief, since he was three years old and that his mother also has a criminal record.

The youngster was sent to Nassau County Children's Shelter.

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## Big 3 Prods Russia In New Proposal To Resume Talks About Summit Meeting

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States, Britain and France prodded Russia today to resume diplomatic talks at Moscow about a possible summit meeting.

The State Department said U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson handed a new note to the Soviet Foreign Ministry in Moscow yesterday. It said identical notes were delivered by the British and French embassies there.

The messages called for a Soviet reply on Western Big Three requests of nearly two months ago to get the pre-summit diplomatic talks started again.

Technically, the Big Three messages were in reply to a Soviet note of July 15 proposing an East-West treaty of friendship.

But the text of the U.S. reply, as made public by the State Department, brushed this Soviet note off with a "no comment."

The United States said the question of a friendship treaty was just the sort of thing that could be explored at meeting of heads of government.

The United States said the West was anxious to swap views with Russia on a friendship treaty, but held to the view that this was a topic to be included in a discussion of a summit agenda.
