Pittsburgh's youth-minded Pirates, en route to their first finish in the first division in 10 years, are almost certain to have a 20-game pitcher this season. He is Bob Friend, the oldest Pirate in point of service.

The 27-year-old right-hander has 17 victories, more than any other National League hurler. He was credited with the Pirates' 8-4 first game triumph over St. Louis yesterday although he gave way to Elroy Face after seven innings. St. Louis won the second game 12-8. The Pirates are one percentage point behind the second-place Giants.

Frequent Chores
A workhorse, Friend already has pitched 215 innings, second only to Milwaukee's Warren Spahn. Although he has lost 13 games, most in the league, he already has equalled his top winning mark (17-17 in 1956). In seven previous years, he has had only one winning season—14-9 in 1955.

In other games, Milwaukee increased its first-place margin over San Francisco to seven games, defeating the Giants 8-5 in 10 innings. Cincinnati nipped Los Angeles 6-5 and Philadelphia swept a double-header from Chicago 15-8 and 5-3. The second game was called after eight innings because of darkness.

Home Wins
Hank Aaron smashed a two-run homer in the 10th as Milwaukee snapped a 5-5 tie. The Braves added another run off Red Worthington on Joe Adcock's double and singles by Andy Panko and Johnny Logan. Leon Wagner hit his third homer in four days for the Giants.

They split them plumb down the middle in the Pacific Coast League Sunday in a day marked by four shutouts.

The league-leading Phoenix Giants defeated Salt Lake City 2-0 in the opener, and then took it on the chin in the nightcap when the Bees blasted out a 7-1 win. Second place San Diego stayed two games behind the leaders with a 4-3 win over Vancouver after dropping the first game 3-2. Seattle took an 8-0 victory over Sacramento and lost the nightcap 1-0, while Portland shutout Spokane 2-0 in the opener and lost the second contest 6-2.

Baumer Grand Slams
Pinchhitter Dick Baumer was the Salt Lake City hero. He whacked a grand slam homer in the sixth to break a 1-1 tie in the second game.

In the opener Phoenix right-hander Joe Shipley made his first regular appearance a shutout victory. The Bees' Joe Christopher was the only Salt Lake player to get past first. He did it with a triple in the second. But Shipley

pitched his way out of the inning and wound up striking out five Giants.

At San Diego, the Padres wound up their best attended season by edging Vancouver in the last inning of the nightcap when Dick Smith singled with two out. Club officials said 291,712 turned out for the home team during 1958—an increase of 108,468 over last year.

The Pads lost the opener when Jim Dyke lashed out a two-run homer in the eighth to bring the Mounties from behind. The Mounties threatened in the second but San Diego's first triple play of the season wiped the bases clean.

Suds Do Turnabout
Seattle rapped out 17 hits in its first game against Sacramento but the whack was gone in the second and the Rainiers could only muster one against Sac pitcher Pete Mesa. Sacramento filled the bases in the ninth but Seattle pitcher Chuck Churn squelched the rising tide to preserve his shutout in the first game.

In the seventh inning nightcap it was a nothing—nothing contest until the last minute when Nippy Jones got a double, a single and Smith's hit brought him home.

Portland pitcher Al Lary blanked the Indians and tripled home the first run in the Beaver-Spokane opener. It was Spokane's second night shutout.

The Indians came back in the second game to spoil the Beavers' last home stand. Spokane scored two runs in the first. The Beavers bounced back with two of their own, but the Indians kept right on going with one run in the second, two in the fourth and one in the fifth.

New Athletic Conference Formed Of UCLA, SC, Cal And Wash.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A Big Four athletic conference of western universities was born Saturday when California, Washington, Southern California and UCLA banded together.

The group, known as the Athletic Assn. of Western Universities, takes official status July 1, 1959. That's one day after the nine-member Pacific Coast Conference dies.

Under New Plan
Unlike the PCC, the big four sets up a plan for grants in aid covering room, board, tuition and books providing the athlete works at least 250 hours per academic year. The four schools, all penalized

in the PCC illegal aid to athletes cases of the past two years, set up a plan of exchanging complete information on academic requirements, eligibilities and financial aid.

"There shall be no central enforcement agent or agency of this association," the bylaws state. "If a member institution has reason to believe that another institution is violating either the letter or the spirit of these articles it may undertake to resolve its differences by discussions with that institution."

In general, rules of the NCAA will govern the new Big Four.

Stanford Addition Backed
Dr. Glenn Seaborg, chancellor of the University of California, said, "it is my personal hope Stanford will join us in the new future."

Representatives of the other three schools echoed his sentiments. Seaborg said no agreement had been reached with Tournament of Roses officials concerning future Rose Bowl commitments. The Rose Bowl games for 1959 and 1960 already are set through arrangements between the PCC and the Big Ten.

The four schools agreed to play each other annually in football, basketball and to the extent feasible in other sports.

Stanford Invited To Join AAUW

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Stanford holds an open invitation today to boost the new West Coast Big Four to a level five before the athletic conference starts official operations next July 1.

California, Southern California, UCLA and Washington announced on Saturday that they have formed the Athletic Assn. of Western Universities effective July 1, 1959.

The new group, born from the dying Pacific Coast Conference, was expected to play a major role in the Rose Bowl setup of the future although the spokesman said no agreement was now in effect with the Tournament of Roses group.

Rose Bowl officials said there was no need to sign any contracts with anyone as the PCC still has two Rose Bowl games left. Although officials of Stanford adopted a wait-and-see attitude, the school had representatives at formulative meetings of the new alignment.

Lary's only complaint is that he doesn't see enough of Casey Stengel's American League champions.

The stocky Detroit right-hander faced the Yankees yesterday for the seventh time this season and for the sixth time he beat them. The score was 8-3, enabling the Tigers to gain a split in their doubleheader as the Yankees won the nightcap 3-2.

Not since 1944 has a pitcher whipped the Yankees six times in one campaign. It was done by a pair of Detroit hurlers, Hal Newhouse and Dizzy Trout.

NY Widens Edge
The split enabled the runaway Yankees to widen their lead to 12 games over Chicago, which was beaten 5-2 by Baltimore. Boston's third-place Red Sox swept a doubleheader from Kansas City 14-3 and 3-2 in 11 innings. Cleveland swamped Washington 9-1.

Detroit outlit the Yankees 12 to 6 in the opener. Charlie Maxwell led the Tiger attack with a pair of singles and a three-run homer. Art Ditmar was the loser.

Norm Siebern's ninth-inning home run snapped a 2-2 tie for New York in the second game. Herb Moford, who had held the Yankees hitless after the first inning, was the victim. Winner Bobby Shantz went the distance for the first time since April 27.

Jensen Bingle Wins
Jackie Jensen's run-producing single in the 11th broke up a tight pitching duel between Boston's Murray Wall and Kansas City's Ray Herbert in the second game of their twin bill.

The Red Sox bombed four Athletics pitchers for 16 hits in the opener, with Don Buddin and Pete Daley driving in three runs each on as many hits. Wall, coming to the relief of starter Ted Bowsfield in the fourth inning of the nightcap, allowed only one hit in 7 2-3 innings.

Billy Gardner drove in three runs with a pair of doubles in Baltimore's triumph over Chicago. Two other Billies—pitchers O'Dell and Loes—held the White Sox to three hits with O'Dell posting his 12th victory.

Jim (Mudcat) Grant hurled his fifth victory over Washington as Cleveland belabored four Senator pitchers for a dozen hits. Lary Dobby drove in three runs for the winners with a single, double and his eighth home run.

Tiger Manager Inked For 1959

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Tiger General Manager John McHale announced Saturday that Bill Norman has been signed as manager for the 1959 season.

McHale said he talked with Norman before Saturday's game at Baltimore and settled with him that he will be back again next year. No contract terms were disclosed.

There had been speculation whether Norman would return. The Tigers skidded near the bottom of the standings last month. Norman took over from Jack Tighe June 10 and piloted the Tigers from last place to second. A 2-1 loss to Baltimore Friday night dropped them into fifth.
