The Indians announced also that Herb Score, star southpaw who has been out with a sore arm since July 16, was back on the active list. He will join the team Thursday in Kansas City. Wilhelm came to Cleveland last September from the St. Louis Cardinals. The Orioles said they sold first baseman Jim Marshall, obtained earlier in the season from the Chicago White Sox, to the Chicago Cubs of the National League, to make room on the Bird roster for Wilhelm. Marshall has been hitting .215.

Yakima is 69 percentage points and four games ahead of second-place Wenatchee. The Lewiston Braves, who won the first half of the season, are in the No. 3 spot, 86 percentage points and five games behind the Bears.

The Bears defeated Wenatchee 10-7 Saturday and divided a Sunday doubleheader with the Chiefs, dropping the first game 2-1 but winning the nightcap 2-0.

Lewiston defeated Tri-City 11-1 Saturday and took a Sunday twin-bill from the Braves, 8-2 and 5-3. The Braves are in fifth place.

The cellar-dwelling Salem Senators had a field day during the weekend. They downed the fourth-place Eugene Emeralds 5-3 Saturday and swept a doubleheader Sunday, 2-1 and 5-4.

SF Gets Millionth Fan At Sunday Bill

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The San Francisco Giants millionth fan — plus a few more poured through the turnstiles at Seals Stadium Sunday.

The capacity 22,913 who watched league leading Milwaukee dump the Giants 8-5 in 10 innings boosted the total attendance for 60 home dates to 1,910,456.

Last year in New York, the Giants in the 52,000-seat Polo Grounds drew 653,973. The last time they drew a million customers was in 1954 when they won a pennant.

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NATO Approves 2 Basic Science Program Plans

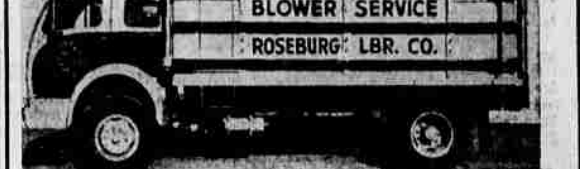
WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) said here that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization Council has approved two of his proposals for a NATO basic science program.

He said the United States has pledged conditionally \$375,000 to finance half the initial cost of the two projects.

One, Jackson said, calls for a program of NATO scholarship and fellowship awards to help outstanding students in critical scientific fields.

The other calls for advanced studies institutes, to bring together teachers and scholars for pioneer work in applied mathematics, solid state physics, nuclear engineering and medicine.

Jackson proposed the two projects to the 1957 NATO parliamentarian's conference.



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
