

Pastor To Serve At Local Church

The Rev. Edward A. West has consented to serve as interim-pastor for the Roseburg Congregational Church (United Church of Christ).

The Rev. Mr. West received his training and ordination in the Disciples of Christ Church, serving the church at Loveland, Colo., for 12 years. He later transferred his ministerial standing to the Congregational Church. The Rev. Mr. West acted in the capacity of minister and manager to the Western Pastors' School for several years at Colorado Springs, Colo., and also served as minister for the Congregational Church there.

The Rev. Mr. West came to Oregon two years ago when he retired from the ministry to take up ranching with his brother Frank West, near Oakland. He will begin his interim-pastorate at 1581 N. E. Keasey Road, where the Roseburg Congregational Church has recently purchased acreage with a home for its new edifice.

Mr. and Mrs. West have three children who are married. Mrs. West teaches in Sutherlin Junior High School.

President of GMC, H. H. Curtice, Resigns

NEW YORK (AP)—Harlow H. Curtice resigned Monday as president and chief executive officer of General Motors Corp., effective Sept. 1. He was succeeded as chief executive officer by Fred G. Donner, who was elected chairman of the board also.

John F. Gordon was elected president and chief operating officer.

The elections were announced by the board of directors meeting in New York.

Curtice, who has headed the giant automobile manufacturing concern since Feb. 2, 1953, reached the age of 65 on Aug. 15.

Albert Bradley, chairman of the board since April 2, 1950, also is retiring Sept. 1.

Both Curtice and Bradley will continue as members of the board.

Physical examinations for all boys participating in the Camas Valley High School athletic program and all ninth grade boys and girls will be given at the high school Friday at 1 p.m.

Neuberger Lauds Eisenhower's Timber Policy

WASHINGTON (AP)—The new law governing sale of Klamath Indian Reservation timberland reflects a statesmanlike policy on the part of President Eisenhower and the Congress, in the view of Sen. Richard L. Neuberger.

The bill, signed by the President Saturday, provides for sale of as much of the vast pine forest as is necessary to give proper shares of reservation assets to the Klamath who have voted to withdraw from the tribe.

Private industry has first chance. The federal government then will buy what still must be sold, up to a 90 million dollar investment. Cutting must be on a sustained yield basis.

"This legislation," Neuberger said, "will assure financial justice to the Klamath Indian Tribe, and it will protect the vast pine forests and wildlife marsh of the Klamath River watershed. It is an epochal milestone along the highway of sound conservation practices."

Radiation Can Improve Apples, Scientist Says

MONTREAL (AP)—Nuclear radiation may give rosier cheeks to a tasty but slightly pale apple.

Dr. C. U. Bishop, head of Canada's experimental farm in Kentville, N. S., told the International Congress of Genetics about it. He said it will be five to seven years before the rosier apple can be raised on a tree and compared with existing varieties to see if it is commercially worthwhile.

"The Courtland is a leading Canadian apple but it is somewhat lacking in color," Dr. Bishop explained. "We launched an extensive research program designed to induce color."

New shoots were exposed to radiation at the Brookhaven National Laboratory on Long Island, then grafted in Kentville.

The result is a complete change to dark red apples on some branches. These are to be propagated to make several complete trees.

"Out of this may come a fine looking apple which will retain the qualities of the Courtland, a good dual purpose eating and cooking apple," Dr. Bishop said.

'Queer' Recluse Slays One Man, Wounds Another

EDMONTON, Alta. (AP)—Jim Alex, a 65-year-old bearded recluse who said someone was out to get him, was charged with murder this week after killing a prominent businessman and wounding a fire chief in a five-hour gun battle. He was held in a mental hospital for observation.

Police said Alex first fired with a rifle for no apparent reason at a nearby parked car and passerby, then took cover in a trench system he had dug in front of the converted boxcar in which he lived. Before authorities drove him from his fortification, Richard Butler, 44, a businessman and councilman of suburban Jasper Place, was killed by two bullets in the chest. Fire Chief Barney Waygood was wounded in the ribs when he tried to rout Alex with a hose. Police finally drove him from his trenches with a bulldozer and captured him. He had two rifles and a shotgun. The old man told the police he had dug the trenches so he could shoot at people.

Neighbors said Alex had told them Saturday somebody was out to get him. They described him as quiet but said he had "queer ideas." They said he began digging his trench network when he moved into the boxcar 12 years ago.

Two Logging Firms File Incorporation

Disappearance Of Explorer V Still Mystery

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The disappearance of Explorer V still was an apparent mystery today. The Army forged ahead with plans for two more satellite launches.

The Army still had no official comment on the cause of the latest failure two days after a powerful Jupiter-C rocket roared skyward on what appeared to be a perfect launching.

In the only activity Monday, a Snark intercontinental guided missile blasted into the night on the start of a 6,000-mile journey across the Atlantic. The trip toward target took about 10 hours, announced.

Explorer V was equipped to probe the far reaches of a severe radiation field now being investigated by Explorer IV as it whirled through space.

Scientists needed more detailed information about the radiation belt so they can protect the first space travelers against the bombardment of the rays.

Scientists already have learned that the rays double in intensity every 60 miles, but the cause, extent and type of radiation still is not known.

The radiation belt starts about 600 miles in space. Where it ends is not known.

Medford Woman Killed As Car Dives Into Canal

WINTERHAVEN, Calif. (AP)—A woman tentatively identified as Mrs. Bonnie Jean Ayres of Medford, Ore., was killed Sunday when the car in which she was riding plunged into an irrigation canal four miles south of Algodones, Mexico.

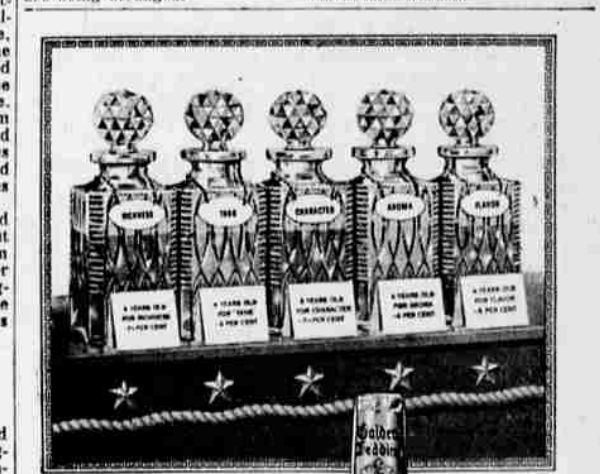
Algodones is 12 miles south of Winterhaven.
