The 1958 Douglas County high school football season is under way at most of the area schools and again this season new mentors will be handling some teams.

Four of the 15 high schools in the county will be fielding teams under new coaches.

At Oakland, the Oakers will have Chuck Halstead as head man in football and baseball. Halstead comes to Oakland High from Gooding, Idaho. At Drain, the Warriors will battle in the Emerald League under first-year man Stan Dmochowsky. In the six-man ranks the Camas Valley Hornets will have Les King as grid mentor. King comes to Camas Valley from the Bakersfield, Calif., school system. The fourth new man is the Roseburg Indian head man, Roy Thompson.

IN OTHER SCHOOLS in the county remain unchanged in the gridiron coaching department. In the Umpqua Valley League, Bob Williams will coach the Douglas Trojans. Ralph Dyson will handle the Bulldogs of Sutherlin. Leroy Juelke remains as head coach of the Myrtle Creek Vikings. At Clatskanie, the Vikings will have Chuck Pinion in set for another year with the Glide Wildcats.

The Douglas County B League will have the same head coaches. Ron Anderson is at Yoncalla, Bill Marsters at Canyonville, Joy Smith at Riddle, Carl Grimsrud at Elkton and Tom Mason at Days Creek.

The Glendale Pirates, District 6-A-2 and Rogue Valley League champs, again this year have L. K. (Hoot) Gibson as coach. At Reedsport, the Braves will vie for another top finish in the Coast League under Rudy Ruppe.

Here's a recap of the final standings of the Midwestern, Umpqua Valley and Douglas County B Leagues in last year's play:

IN THE MIDWESTERN League or District 5-A-1, Springfield won the title with a 3-0 record. South Eugene was second at 2-1. Marshfield third with a 2-1 mark, Roseburg fourth at 1-3 and North Bend last with a 0-3 record.

In the Umpqua Valley League, or the northern half of District 6-A-2, Douglas won the title with a 4-0 mark. Sutherlin was second at 2-1-1. Myrtle Creek third at 2-1-1, and Oakland and Glendale both ended play with 0-3 marks.

In the Douglas County B League or District 4-B, Yoncalla grabbed the crown with a 4-0 record. Canyonville was second at 2-1. Riddle third with a 2-2 mark, Elkton fourth at 1-3 and Days Creek last at 0-4.

The Glendale Pirates took top honors in the Rogue Valley League or the southern half of District 6-A-2, with a 6-0 record. In the Emerald League, or District 5-A-2, Drain was eighth at 1-5 and in the Coast League or District 2-A-2, Reedsport was second at 5-2. Yoncalla and Glendale both were ousted from the state playoffs in the quarter-finals. Yoncalla was dropped by Powers 31-0 and Glendale lost to Elmira 20-13.

Another new coach at Oakland this year is Arnold Bobson. Bobson is a graduate of Florida State and the University of Oregon and will coach basketball and track.

Salt Lake City opened its final home stand with a 7-0 win over the Phoenix Giants Monday. Carlos Bernier provided the game's big thrill with a four-run homer.

## Bond Issues Due At Minneapolis

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Council approval of a nine-million-dollar bond issue to speed a major league baseball team to Minneapolis appeared nearly certain today.

Aldermen voted 10 to 1 in favor of the move in a preliminary poll Monday. Council President George Martens said the proposal would carry without difficulty at the next council session Friday.

The bond issue needs nine votes or passage. Two aldermen did not vote.

It represents Minneapolis' trump card in the long and disappointing stream-dealing to land a big league franchise here.

The city's big league negotiators made it clear to the council they are aiming at bringing a team here by next year. They told the aldermen, in fact, that the bond proposal should be scrapped for the time being if the city doesn't get a commitment by Jan. 1, 1959.

**Senators Possibility**  
Whether they are looking to the Washington Senators for such a commitment, possibly within days, wasn't brought out. But reports of an imminent Senators' request for permission to shift their American League franchise have been picking up steam rapidly.

The proposal on which the council will take final action Friday would give the city's guarantee to a \$4 million dollar bond issue, mainly for expansion of Metropolitan Stadium from 21,000 seats to 41,000.

Another \$34 million dollar issue, not obligated by the city, would replace bonds now held by original investors in the privately-built stadium.

The bond issue won't go through, however, until Minneapolis has a signed contract with a major league team.

**CHICAGO (AP) —** Bill Veeck, eager to get back into baseball, is hot after the franchise he once operated at Cleveland in order to keep the Indians from making any moves.

However, at a press conference in Chicago yesterday, Veeck said he isn't against moving franchises and believes the major leagues should expand to 10 teams with Toronto, Montreal, Houston and St. Louis being possible additions.

## Green Bay's Hopes High For Climb Up NFL Ladder

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — The food is good, discipline strict and hopes high as the Green Bay Packers prepare for the National Football League season under new head coach Ray (Scooter) McLean.

The Packers finished last in the NFL's Western Conference with a

3-9 record in 1957. The finish brought McLean, an assistant since 1951, out of the wings onto center stage as the fourth coach in the 40-year history of the team.

His assignment is to restore the lustre missing since the Packers won their last title in 1944. He said today it can be done.

McLean discounted a 3-0 exhibition loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers in a game played in a driving rain and thick mud in Milwaukee.

"I couldn't even see who the players were," he said. "It was a lousy night."

One of McLean's first orders were instructions for his linemen to learn to go both ways.

A strong defensive specialists bearing down on offensive line assignments are linebackers Tom Bettis and Bill Forester and ends Jim Temp and Carlton Massey.

The strongest Packer position is linebacker Sam Palumbo and Ernie Danjean are available, along with three rookies, including Dan Currie of Michigan State.

Quarterbacks in camp are Bart Starr, Babe Parilli and rookie Joe Francis of Oregon State. Their target at end are all-pro Bill Howton, Max McGee and Gary Knefel.

## TROUBLE IN AAWU?

## New UCLA Coach Charges Cal Recruiter In LA Area

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — The University of California has sternly rebuked UCLA's head football coach but is investigating his charges against athlete recruiting.

George Dickerson, successor to the late coach Red Sanders at UCLA, shattered presemester calm on California's campus by confronting Coach Pete Elliott in his office.

Dickerson demanded that Elliott curb the activities of Herman Weiner, president of Southern Seas, a University of California booster group in Southern California. This was Saturday. Yesterday Dickerson told a news conference about it.

Elliott said in a statement he had agreed Saturday to ask Weiner to cease any activities until Dickerson's charge could be properly investigated. But, he added, because of the UCLA's coach's statements to the press he had withdrawn the request to Weiner.

"With the threat of Coach Dickerson to carry the investigation of his charges to public print, I agreed for Herman Weiner's personal sake and for the University of California to ask him to stop recruiting," Elliott said.

"George Dickerson broke our

trust and Herman Weiner was publicly ridiculed as well as adjudged guilty without any chance of defense."

In Los Angeles, Weiner said the charges against him were entirely false.

Dickerson charged that two young athletes, Dean Moore, freshman tailback at UCLA last fall, and Bill Kilmer, Citrus Junior College back, told him Weiner had offered them illegal payoffs to enroll at California. Moore and Kilmer accompanied Dickerson to Elliott's office.

**Beaverton Team Nears AABC Baseball Tourney**  
PORTLAND (AP) — The 16-team double-elimination AABC baseball tournament, was down to two teams today—defending champion Showboat of Beaverton and American Buyer of Portland.

The Portland nine-made up chiefly of University of Portland players—beat Archer's Monday night 6-4 to stay in the running. Beaverton is undefeated. The Buyers lost to Beaverton 15-2 Saturday night. A Beaverton victory tonight will qualify it for the regional tournament at Rapid City, S. D., opening Sept. 5. If a third game between the two teams is needed, it will be played Wednesday.
