Robin Roberts Wins 14th Game

CHICAGO (AP) — Right-hander Robin Roberts, the once peerless craftsman who topped to mediocrity last year, has found himself. Roberts, 31, tossed a four-hitter at the Chicago Cubs yesterday for the Philadelphia Phillies winning 10-3. It was his 14th victory against 11 defeats.

In a late season surge, his seventh win in nine starts gives him an outside shot for 20 victories, a feat which he rattled off from 1950 to 1955. He had a 28-7 mark in 1952.

Two years ago, the Springfield, Ill., native slumped to a 19-18 campaign. In 1957, he plummeted to a 10-22 season, serving up 40 home run balls to lead the National League.

"I don't know what was wrong with me last year," he said. "I guess I was pressing too hard after a horrible start."

"Now my arm feels fine. My control has been good all year. I've been able to move the ball where I want this year. Actually, I feel I'm finally pitching the way I was a couple of years ago."

With 203 pitching victories tucked under his 6-2, 190-pound frame, Roberts said he wasn't shooting for any lifetime goal.

Maybe it's time to admit those pesky Pittsburgh Pirates are for real.

With only 4 1/2 weeks left in the National League race, the Pirates are back in second place — fighting for their first finish in the first division in a decade. They haven't finished as high as second since 1944, when they wound up 14 1/2 games behind the St. Louis Cardinals.

They're now eight games behind league-leading Milwaukee, moving up from third by beating the Cardinals 5-3 last night after the Braves had slapped down the Giants again, 7-3, with four home runs.

It was the Braves' eighth in a row over San Francisco. Lew Burdette was the winner.

Robinson, riding a comeback, won his 14th as Philadelphia whipped the Chicago Cubs 10-3. Cincinnati defeated Los Angeles 6-4.

Thomas Clouts Homer
The Bucs wrapped it up on Frank Thomas' two-run, 34th homer for a 4-1 lead in the third inning.

Burdette lost a 3-0 lead when Willie Kirkland hit his 12th home run in the fifth inning and Willie Mays hit his 23rd with a man on

Del Crandall hit his 18th homer in the eighth, and Mathews then hit his 27th and Wes Covington smacked his 23rd in the ninth.

The Cubs grabbed three runs in the first, capped by Walt Moryn's 19th homer with one on. Robin also cracked a three-run triple as the Phils scored six in the fifth.

Don Newcombe (4-11) needed relief help in a two-run Dodger eighth, but beat his ex-mates for the first time after the Reds Staked him to an early 6-1 lead.

Jackie Jensen of the Boston Red Sox? Bob Turley of the New York Yankees? Bob Cerv of the Kansas City Athletics?

Turley because he has become the ace and steady guy on a championship staff, leading the majors in victories and topping the AL in complete games and strikeouts. Cerv because of his batting bat—the man who carried the A's most of the season despite all sorts of serious injuries.

Burdette Winner Of 9 In 7 Weeks

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Lew Burdette, following his 1957 pattern of a slow start and a fast spurt into World Series stardom, won his ninth game in seven weeks Tuesday.

That kicked the San Francisco Giants, his 7-3 victims, nine games behind Burdette's National League leading Milwaukee Braves.

And it submerged Giants manager Bill Rigney in such gloom that he would say only:

"This club is going to have to wake up."

Before Milwaukee came to town, Rigney had foreseen possibly four Giants victories in the five game series. After three games, the Braves lead 3-0.

Burdette has won 15 games this season — nine of them since the All-Star game July 8 — and 100 since his first NL victory in 1952.

Milwaukee's victory was built on Burdette's six hit pitching and 17 hits including two solo homers by Eddie Mathews and one each by Del Crandall and Wes Covington.

American League Runnersup Strong

NEW YORK (AP) — Maybe the "weak" American League has been handed a bum rap. The New York Yankees have had a breeze all along, and lead by 12 1/2 games, but the rest of the league is no weaker than the rest of the National League behind first place Milwaukee.

The second place clubs, Pittsburgh in the National and Chicago in the American, have identical 66-59 records. Third place San Francisco stands 64-59 in the NL, and third place Boston stands 63-59 in the AL.

Baltimore, fourth in the AL, has a better record (61-62) than Los Angeles, fourth in the NL (60-63). Fifth place St. Louis (60-64) and 11th place (59-63) have the same percentage, .484.
