The Phoenix Giants and the San Diego Padres, the No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the Pacific Coast League, both took their lumps Wednesday night while the third-place Vancouver Mounties climbed to within three and a half games of the leaders.

The Giants lost their fourth straight game to the Salt Lake City Bees 5-0. The Pads were knocked off 5-3 by the Mounties. In other league action, Calde Osteen pitched a fifty three-hitter to give Seattle a 3-0 shutout over the Spokane Indians and Portland's Beavers smashed out 14 hits in smothering the Sacramento Solons 12-3.

Green Checks Phoenix

The Giants were held completely in check by Salt Lake City's Fred Green, who won it with a six-hitter. He fanned seven and walked only one in working the full nine innings.

Sam Milley's third inning single drove in Salt Lake City's first two runs and the Bees got three more in the fifth on two singles, a sacrifice, Milley's triple and a sacrifice fly.

Trailing 3-0 going into the seventh inning, the Padres tied it up with three runs of their own in that frame on three singles, a wild pitch and Freddie Hatfield's

pinchhit triple to deep right-center. The undismayed Mounties charged right back with their two winning runs in the last of the seventh. Pete Ward, reaching first when he was hit with a pitched ball, started it. Three singles and an error later the Mounties had their two runs.

Osteen Tough

Osteen, a young southpaw recently brought up from Wenatchee of the Class C Northwest League, struck out four Spokane batters and walked five. He was in trouble in the second and third innings but each time he worked himself out before any damage could be done.

The Rainiers collected their first two runs in the fourth frame on Juan Delis' double and singles by Hal Bevan, Eddie Basinski and Dutch Dotterer. They got their third in the seventh on Dotterer's double and two singles.

The Beavers toyed with Sacramento for three innings and then gave veteran Vic Lombardi his 10th victory against five defeats with five runs in the fourth and four in the fifth. Lombardi gave up seven hits, fanned three and walked none.

Carlos Paula, Sacramento's left-fielder, accounted for the Solon's first run with a solo homer in the second inning. It was the 10th homer of the year for Paula.

The San Francisco Giants finally have squashed Milwaukee's hex, hitting the law of averages for a double jackpot behind the hitless relief pitching of Al Worthington.

The Giants had lost eight in a row to the Braves and Worthington had beaten them only twice in 15 decisions before the big right-hander backed up his almost perfect three-inning job on the mound with a 12th-inning single that led to a 3-2 victory last night.

That clipped the Braves' National League lead to seven games over Pittsburgh Pirates, who rapped 18 hits and beat St. Louis 14-1. Cincinnati defeated Los Angeles 8-7 and the Chicago Cubs beat Philadelphia 5-2 with Ernie Banks pushing his major league-leading home run total to 42.

The Giants made it as Bob Trowbridge walked Orlando Cepeda on four pitches with the bases loaded in the 12th, cracking a 2-2 tie that had stood since Joe Adcock had put the Braves' square with a pinch home run in the seventh.

Worthington (11-6) gave the Braves nothing but a walk in his three innings. He struck out three. Stu Miller went nine, giving up nine hits, three of them in the first inning when Red Schoendienst, Hank Aaron and Wes Covington singled for a 1-0 Milwaukee lead.

Daryl Spencer's 15th home run, after a walk to Cepeda, gave the Giants the edge in the fourth against starter Juan Pizarro.

Dick Stuart, Bob Skinner and Bob Porterfield homered in the Pirates' 6th victory — their best total since winning 7-1 in 1949.

Pete Whisenant's pitch-hit grand slam home run, his first in the majors, gave the Reds a 7-2 lead in the fifth inning and they wrapped it up on a bases-loaded walk by ex-mate Johnny Kilpatrick in the seventh. Joe Nuxhall (11-9) won it with relief help. Carl Erskine (4-4) lost it in relief.

The Cubs broke a 2-2 tie with Banks' two-run shot in the sixth off loser Curt Simmons (6-13), and rookie Bob Anderson gained his first major league victory with a four-hitter.

Washington Board Said Mulling Franchise Move To Minneapolis

WASHINGTON (AP) — Directors of the Washington Senators may give Club President Calvin Griffith conditional authority tomorrow to seek American League

permission to shift the team to Minneapolis.

The directors, at their regular monthly meeting, are certain to discuss the possibility of moving. "We have reached no conclusion," Griffith said. But he added in an interview that Washington's board probably would accept if Minneapolis came through with satisfactory terms on stadium facilities, rental, concessions and other items.

Griff Is Hesitant
Griffith later reduced "probably" to "possibly." Still it was the first time he had acknowledged that much since reports started buzzing last week that the Senators were again contemplating a move.

President Eisenhower said at his news conference he was sure that if the team had a fighting chance of breaking into the first division, "this city would demand that they stay here."

And, he added, "I think they should."

Troubles Noted
The Senators have finished in the cellar two of the last three seasons and are back there now. Attendance has been correspondingly low.

Griffith said he and the other directors would make no final decision until Minneapolis presents an offer. The Minneapolis City Council votes tomorrow on a bond issue to double its stadium's capacity to 41,000.

The sublime was Stu Hanson's one-hit performance for Wenatchee in the Chiefs 7-0 triumph over Eugene.

Fans at Salem were subjected to the ridiculous when Lewiston's Broncs committed nine errors, six in one frame, in dropping a 12-3 decision in the first game of a doubleheader with the Senators.

The Broncs returned to their usually reliable selves in the second fracas, however, and took Salem in 11 innings, 3-2.

Yakima Recovers
Yakima, staggering after two straight losses at the hands of Tri-City, recovered long enough Wednesday night to salvage one game of the series, 7-3.

The Broncs still clinging to their three game lead over Wenatchee and moved to a four and a half game edge over the Broncs.

Hanson came to within two outs of posting a no-hitter at Eugene.

The long bingle off the right-hander was Mel Krause's double into left-center with two out in the ninth.

The Chiefs scored their runs in bunches, three in the first and four in the eighth.

Salem manager Vern Kindsvater pitched a five-hitter in the error-filled first game to rack up his 14th season victory. Lewiston's six errors in the fourth let in six unearned Emeralds' runs.

A grand slam homer in the top of the 12th frame by third baseman Al Hallgren gave back the Broncs' some self respect in the second contest.

Lewiston had tied the game, 1-1, in the seventh and the clubs battled scoreless until Hallgren's clutch.

Uprising Wins
The Bears staged a last gasp uprising in the ninth when they found themselves in a 1-1 deadlock with Tri-City. When the smoke cleared, six runs had crossed the plate on two doubles, two singles and a pair of Braves miscues.

Gail Harris, squeezed out of a job with the San Francisco Giants, has become Detroit's No. 2 gunner now that the Tigers have given him a home at first base.

In parts of three National League seasons, the 26-year-old lefty hitter had batted only 228, with 22 home runs and 68 runs batted in. Now, after 104 games in the American League, he's batting .285, leading the tigers in homers (14) and triples (7) and is second only to Al Kaline in RBIs with 61—just five less than his total for 181 games with the Giants.

Yesterday he drove in six in nine Tiger runs in a day-night double-header split at Boston. He had a two-run homer and a two-run double as they won the nightcap 7-2, and singled home both Detroit runs in a 3-2 afternoon defeat.

Kansas City ripped New York 11-7, reducing the pennant-bound Yankees' bulge to 1 1/2 games over the White Sox, who won 2-1 at Baltimore 8-5.

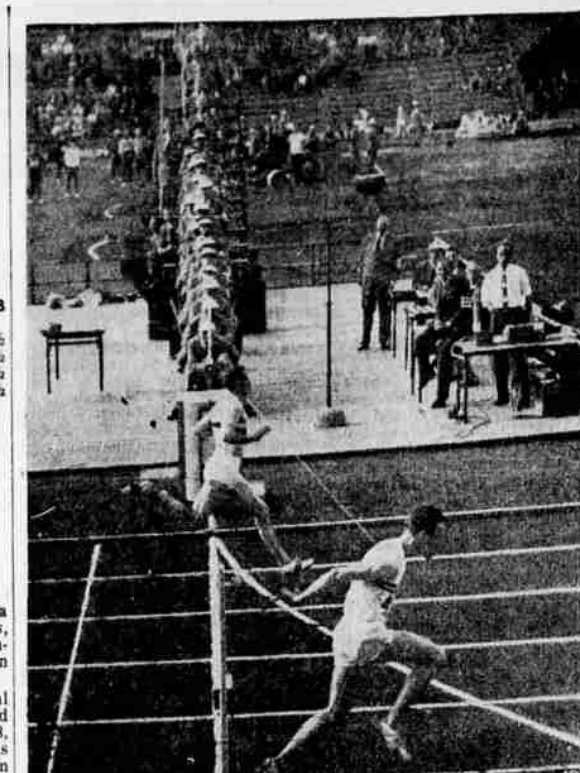
Tom Brewer (9-10) won his fourth straight for Boston with a six-hitter in the opener, blanking the Tigers on three hits after the first inning.

Harris homered in the nightcap first, then doubled in a four-run fifth, when Charley Maxwell, who drove in Detroit's other three, hit a two-run homer off loser Ike DeLoach (12-4).

The A's scored seven unearned runs in the first off Johnny Kuck (8-7), who gave up six hits after Bobby Richardson's two-out error. Tom Gorman (4-4) won it in relief for the A's, who tagged four pitchers for 18 hits. Yogi Berra hit his 20th homer—his 10th consecutive year of 20 or more—and Mickey Mantle socked his 37th for five Yankees runs.

Southpaw Billy Pierce won his fifth straight and 15th of the year with a four-hitter for the White Sox, giving up a seventh-inning home run to Norm Zauchin.

The Indians had 15 hits, but Cal McLish needed ninth-inning relief for his 14-3 victory. Don Mossi came on with a run in the bases loaded and none out. He gave up an RBI single to Bob Boyd, then fanned Gene Woodling and Bob Nieman and got Joe Ginsberg on a grounder. Connie Johnson (6-8) lost it.
