

Anderson Faces Perry In U. S. Men's Play

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP)—MacKay, of Dayton, Ohio, goes against James Shakespeare of Hollywood, Fla. Savitt, New York oil man who has quit big-time competition, opposes Lorne Main of Canada.

Emily's Pride Victor In Rich Hambletonian Trot Event

DUQUOIN, Ill. (AP)—A filly who set a record and an old man rubbing a rabbit's foot are part of the 1958 Hambletonian story.

A pre-race favorite, speedy Emily's Pride broke Hoot Mon's 11-year-old Hambletonian record of 2:00 with a third heat time of 1:59 4/5 for the mile trot.

Driven by 64-year-old Flick Nipe and trained by 78-year-old Fred Egan, Emily's Pride turned on a burst of speed at the finish of the decisive heat to edge out Sandalwood by half a length in the race for 3-year-old trotters.

"This is the third Hambletonian I've won with a special rabbit's foot," said Egan, waving his lucky charm. "I guess there must be something to it."

Egan won in 1940 and 1949 both times as a driver.

A second-heat stumble on a sulky wheel placed Emily's Pride in the No. 12 spot for the third trip around the DuQuoin State Fairground track, before a crowd of 22,500.

She won the first heat in 2:00 1/5 after a stretch battle with Mr. Saunders and Sharpshooter, the third of the pre-race favorites that included Emily's Pride and Sandalwood.

The second heat was won in 2:02 by Little Rocky, an outsider who took second place in the overall standings with a fourth place in the third heat. Little Rocky was last in the first heat.

Third and fourth in the overall results were Mr. Saunders and Sandalwood. Sharpshooter finished sixth behind McCooly. From there it was Great Lullwater, Mix Hanover, Lumber Along, Gang Awa, Baron Colby, Record Mat, Spunky Hanover, and Fiorella Hanover.

Victory in the \$106,719.24 classic was worth \$62,750.92.

Beecham Gains Nod Over Bobby Boyd

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Jimmy Beecham of Miami moved up the middleweight ladder Wednesday night with a popular 10-round decision over Chicago's Bobby Boyd.

Beecham, formerly of Philadelphia, used a looping left jab and a strong right to the body to win the unanimous decision of Referee Billy Regan and two judges.

Boyd, ranked No. 10, towered over the muscular Beecham and had a longer reach, but his left jab could not match Beecham's fevier but harder landings.

The 5-foot-8 Beecham, conceding 2 1/2 pounds to Boyd, who weighed in at 161, said body punching won the fight for him but added "I had to use the right hand to the head to keep him respecting me." At that, his lefts piled up points.

Both appeared to tire toward the end of the nationally televised (ABC) bout.

Packers' Coach Chooses Between Parilli, Starr For QB Position

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP)—Coach Ray McLean of the Green Bay Packers can choose between a home run hitter and a singles hitter for his quarterback this National Football League season.

For the long, or home run passes, he has Vito "Babe" Parilli. For the short, hit-where-they-are type of pass, he can call on Bart Starr.

Parilli, 29, and Starr, 24, divided the quarterback position last season with fair, if not consistent, results.

This year, McLean's first as a head coach, each is expected to mirror results of incessant practice in his specialty.

"Parilli's main problem has been a one track mind," McLean said today as the Packers got ready for a Labor Day exhibition game with the Philadelphia Eagles.

"He'd leave that huddle with one man in mind to throw to," McLean continued. "If that man was covered, Babe'd be lost. He'd have trouble picking out the pass defense and then run out of the pocket when he didn't have to and he'd throw for a loss. Or, he'd throw anyhow, most of the time for an interception."

Starr, an Alabama with two years of NFL experience, is expected to develop into one of the finest quarterbacks in the league. His strong points are an accurate arm and the ability to control the ball, which is the biggest single factor in producing a victory.
