Supreme Court Delays Decision On Integration

The U.S. Supreme Court has delayed for two weeks decision on the school integration crisis at Little Rock, Ark. The court, in a rare emergency session, listened intently to three hours of arguments Thursday. Then, after a recess, it called for more arguments Sept. 11.

Gov. Orval E. Faubus of Arkansas held a package of anti-integration bills which, if signed into law, will give him tight control over any integration situation arising in the state's schools. The strongest of the six measures pushed through a special session of the Legislature is one permitting Faubus to close any public school on which integration is being forced.

He said he didn't know when he would sign the bills.

Included in the package which cleared the Legislature were bills permitting the governor to close forcibly integrated public schools; giving him authority to set up segregated classes within an integrated school; providing aid for any student displaced in an integration dispute and a bill postponing the opening of Central High School in Little Rock until Sept. 15. The school board had already postponed the opening date from Sept. 2 to Sept. 8.

Chief Justice Earl Warren said the Supreme Court delayed its decision because Central High would not open until Sept. 15.

Faubus, however, must sign the bill or the school board must act to delay the opening until that date. Thus Central High could open before the court decision. The National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People hopes to have Negro children in the school when the fall term opens.

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Roseburg Schools Hire Adult Education Head

Kennedy said he would be in a position to make definite plans for the adult education program approximately Sept. 15.

The new director left this morning for Henderson to move his family to Roseburg. He has a wife, Margaret, and three daughters, Karen, 14, Phyllis, 6, and Marda, 5.

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Teamster Elections 'Rigged'

Members Give Details To Probers

Phony Records Seated
Pro-Gibbons Element
In Corruption Rush

WASHINGTON (AP)—The man Harold J. Gibbons defeated for election as head of the hoodlum infested St. Louis Teamsters Union domain today called the voting "as crooked as anything possibly could be."

E. E. (Gene) Walla flung the allegation in the Senate rackets hearings. The husky Walla voiced it on the heels of testimony that doctored records had figured in the seating of delegates from a Tampa, Fla., Teamsters local to cast the seven votes that clinched Gibbons' election as president of St. Louis Joint Council No. 13.

Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.), chairman of the Special investigating committee, interrupted the testimony to say "I just can't believe the rank-and-file members would condone the corruption that has been shown and the tactics that have been used in controlling elections."

Charge Substantiated

A prior witness, Robert L. Lewis, who said he won out on Walla's slate for election as the council's recording secretary despite the disputed seven votes against him, also charged the election was rigged by Gibbons.

Lewis, secretary-treasurer of the St. Louis Brewers & Malsters Local No. 6, said the vote in favor of the Walla slate was 70-69 until Harry Karch, head of the Tampa Carnival Workers Local and right-hand man to Gibbons tossed in the seven votes from Tampa.

Gibbons and Teamsters President James R. Hoffa listened in the rear of the committee room to Lewis' testimony.

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Sign-Up Required On Land Converted To Tree Planting

Farmers may retire cultivated land and plant forest trees on it—and be paid for it.

Under the Conservation Reserve Program, farmers may receive up to \$25 per acre per year for a period of ten years. The annual rate received by the farmer will depend upon the productivity of the farm and the county in which the land is located.

Those planning to plant forest trees under the program must sign up between Sept. 2 and Oct. 3, according to Jack C. Mace, service forester of the Oregon State Board of Forestry.

The program gives the farmer an opportunity to start a young forest, for timber or Christmas trees, and receive a reasonable rental for the land during the ten-year contract period. Upon expiration of the contract, the farmer may manage his forest as he sees fit.

Mace pointed out that many tree plantings established in 1957 and 1958 under the Conservation Reserve program are making satisfactory growth.

Persons interested in converting lands now in crops, to trees, should contact the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation manager. The Douglas County office is in the courthouse.

Arson Draws Prison Term Of 2 Years

Lonnie D. Branscum, 27-year-old Yakima, Wash., factory manager, Thursday pleaded guilty in Circuit Court to setting fire to his former Winston residence and said he was paid \$250 "to do the job."

Judge Charles S. Woodrich sentenced the father of five to two years in the Oregon State Penitentiary with no probation recommended.

Less than 24 hours earlier secret Grand Jury indictments alleging arson were filed in Circuit Court against Branscum and the woman whose house he rented, Mrs. Caroline Peden, 57, of Winston. Her arraignment has not been set.

The indictments charge the pair with conspiring to burn the Darrell Ave. dwelling the night of Feb. 9, 1956.

Branscum, under questioning by Judge Woodrich, said Mrs. Peden paid him \$250 to set fire to the house, although she had offered him \$500 earlier if he would do it.

"When I got only half the amount, I let it go," he said.

In further statements, Branscum recounted how he spilled kerosene on the front room floor before setting the fire. The dwelling quickly burned to the ground. It was insured for \$4,000, and settlement subsequently was made with the owner, according to investigating officers.

"I had not planned to go through with it," he told the court, "and (Continued on Page 2 Col. 4)

Douglas County Spurts In Business Activity

Business activity in Douglas, Lane and Coos counties continued to increase during July, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research said today.

The trend was gleaned from the report of debits by 18 banks in the three counties. Bank debits are taken as good indicators of business activity.

Debits in July totaled \$147,373.32, an increase of 4.8 per cent over June, but a decrease of 4.3 per cent from July 1957.

One hundred sixty-seven reporting banks in the state showed an increase of 4.2 over June and 4.4 over July 1957.

Roseburg Area's Ozone Slated For Sampling

PORTLAND (AP)—The State Air Pollution Authority is taking samples of the air over Portland and plans to do the same soon at Pendleton, Springfield, Albany, Klamath Falls, Roseburg and Medford.

Members of the state agency said in a meeting Wednesday that Portland air has been sampled at three stations since June.

A meeting in early autumn will take up Portland's pollution problems.

Carl Green, authority chairman, invited Portland city officials to attend that session. He said the authority hopes the city will employ its own air pollution control officials.

No dates were given for the sampling planned at upstate cities, but Green said the sampling would take place within weeks.

The Black Sox, who upset Casa Grande, Ariz., 4-2, last night in the National Baseball Congress tournament at Wichita, Kan., meet Alpine, Texas, tonight. Both teams are undefeated. Details of the game are on the sports page.

Mayor Arlo Jacklin wired the team today: "Congratulations. First you beat Georgia, then took Alpine, then walked California and edged out Arizona, leaving two undefeated teams in the nation, Drain, Ore., and Texas. It took Alaska 91 years, numerous sessions of Congress and hundreds of senators to take away from Texas her claim of the largest, the biggest and the mostest. We in Roseburg are pulling for you all the way to do the same in nine innings of baseball."

STORM THREAT EASED

Chinese Reds Given Repeat U. S. Warning On Attacks

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Chinese Communists stepped up their artillery attack on the Tan islands in Amoy Bay today, hurling a blistering 7,120 shells into the 136 Nationalist-held acres in an hour.

It was the heaviest concentration in the nearly four years of the pocket war in the Formosa Strait.

The bombardment heightened speculation that the Communists soon would try to take the islets. Only 2 1/2 miles from their port of Amoy, they are used by the Nationalists as lookout posts from which to alert naval forces blockading Amoy.

The Nationalist island fortress of Quemoy, 15 miles out from Amoy, got off relatively lightly. The Nationalist Defense Ministry said the Reds fired 783 rounds at Quemoy during a four-hour period beginning at dawn. Then the Communist guns turned on the Tans.

Peiping radio warned the Quemoy defenders to surrender or die. The sharp report from Taipei was "come on and see what happens."

U.S. Repeats Warning
WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States Thursday denounced Red Chinese "aggressive expansionism." It warned Peiping again not to try to conquer the islands of Quemoy and Matsu, off the Chi-

More Flexible Farm Price Support, Welfare, Foreign Aid Money Approved By Ike

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower today signed 44 bills — including such far-reaching measures as the new farm law and Social Security revisions.

Security Benefits Boost Also Spells Increase In Taxes

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower today signed a bill increasing Social Security benefits and taxes.

The new law will provide bigger checks starting next February for 12 million retired workers and survivors. The increase will be 7 per cent with a minimum of \$3 a month.

It also will raise taxes for old age insurance on some 75 million workers and their employers.

The payroll tax goes up Jan. 1 from 2 1/4 per cent for both worker and employer on the first \$4,200 of annual income, to 2 1/2 per cent on \$4,800.

Eisenhower expressed concern over a provision which increases the proportion of public assistance programs which are financed by the federal government. He said he is asking Secretary of Welfare Flemming to deal with this problem in a review of such programs now under way.

Eisenhower said the increases in the federal government share of the costs of such programs as aid to the needy aged "can lead only to a weakening of the responsibility of the states and communities."

"I believe deeply," he said, "in the concept that the state and communities can best determine the actual needs of individuals and best administer programs of assistance to them—and that the state and local financial responsibilities in these programs should be strengthened, not weakened."

Tax More Than Ample
This is the fourth time since 1950 that social security benefits have been boosted by election-year Congresses.

The new formula on retirement benefits will hike checks from the present range of \$30-\$108.50 a month to \$33-\$116, effective with checks going out next Feb. 3. After some years the maximum will go to \$127 a month.

For families with a number of dependents, the maximum benefit will rise from \$200 to \$254 a month.

The tax increase actually will be less than \$1 a month.

Beating-Threats Probe Can Strike Aftermath

PORTLAND (AP)—Reported threats of violence and the beating of a non-striker were under police investigation today in the aftermath of an unauthorized strike last week at the American Can Co. plant here.

Harold Bradley, Portland, told police he was beaten by a fellow worker for refusing to join the wildcat strike which was not sanctioned by the United Steelworkers Union. Bradley underwent minor surgery Thursday for treatment of a broken nose and a serious cut over his right eye.

Police arrested Daniel Stoller, 27, Portland, on a charge of assault and battery after Bradley signed a complaint. Stoller also is employed at the plant.

Several of the hourly paid workers who remained on the job during the strike have reported telephone threats of violence. One man said a threatening note was pinned to his front door.

The walkout occurred after the company laid off three employees as a disciplinary measure. The dispute was settled last week and work at the plant resumed.

Canadian Woman Dies In Oregon Car Crash

JORDAN VALLEY, Ore. (AP)—A one-car accident on U.S. Highway 98 killed a Canadian woman and critically injured another Thursday night, state police reported.

The victim was identified as Maria Eleanor White, 21, of Edmonton, Alberta. Maxine Medwid, 21, also of Edmonton, was taken to a hospital in Caldwell, Idaho, in critical condition.

The accident occurred about five miles north of here and just west of the Oregon-Idaho border.

Riddle Council Contracts For New Fire Engine

American La France Co. of Beaverton was awarded a contract by the Riddle City Council Thursday night for a new fire engine.

The company submitted a low bid of \$12,600. The contract was awarded at a special council meeting. Mrs. Erma Best, News-Review correspondent, reports. It was awarded on a five-year lease-rental-purchase basis. Delivery date has not been established.
