

Two-Story Home In Riddle Damaged By Smoke, Fire

The Wayne Young home on Ash Creek, a six-room two-story building was heavily damaged by fire. The upper story was destroyed and the ground floor furnishings suffered water and smoke damage. Riddle Fire Chief Harry Erkenbeck placed an estimated value of \$12,000 on the house, and \$6,000 on the furnishings with 30 per cent damage.

The Riddle Volunteer Fire Department was assisted by the Canyonville and Tri-City departments, and all were hampered by a lack of available water. The Young family was on a coastal fishing trip at the time. Young is associated with the reforestation program in this area.

Satellite Made By Man To Orbit Sun Proposed

AMSTERDAM (AP)—A man-made satellite orbiting around the sun was proposed today by Dr. R. P. Haviland of Philadelphia. He said it is feasible now with present equipment to put it as close to the sun as the planet Mercury.

With greater power, it could come within four to five million miles of the blazing sun, fountain of all life on earth.

Haviland, a General Electric Co. engineer, in a report to the International Astronautical Federation meeting here, envisioned a 2-foot long cone weighing 30 pounds. It could discover vital new information about the sun, he said.

Through use of photoelectric cells, the sides of the cone would always be in shadow to keep them relatively cool despite the tremendous heat. Special measuring instruments would be placed on the sides. The instruments could measure the intensity of ultraviolet light, electrons and protons, and meteor hits. The information would be telemetered to the earth.

Russian Empire Potential Myth, Mme. Chiang Says

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Mme. Chiang Kai-shek says "the great potential of the Russian empire market is a chimera."

The wife of the Chinese Nationalist leader, speaking at the American Bar Assn. annual dinner last night, termed a "mistaken belief" the theory that "in the new Russian empire lies a great new untapped market."

The Chinese Communists, she said, "would certainly buy only capital goods or raw materials which Russia for the moment cannot supply."

"For these goods one can count on the glad hand, the big smile, and the most munificent fairy godfather approach. But for how long?"

"Only as long as the Soviet world finds the goods indispensable."

Mme. Chiang also referred to current Communist moves.

"At this moment," she said, "the Chinese Communists under the order of the Kremlin are continuing military action against Quemoy and Matsu as a deliberate and direct answer to President Eisenhower's efforts to have world peace."

In her talk, Mme. Chiang compared free world demands for trade with the Communists with the "political folly" of appeasement.

When economic interests are involved, she said, "there are some who would swing a ton of convenience, acting contrary to their conscience."

"But has any lasting good ever resulted from forsaking principles? And has any real benefit ever been derived from such a course?"

Siamese Twins Face Surgery In England

LONDON (AP)—Surgeons will attempt soon to separate Siamese twin boys born to a London mother nearly four months ago. The twins, two of triplets, are joined at the top of the head.

The third boy is a normal child and is home with his parents. The joined babies are in a special cot in a London hospital.

The parents of the Siamese twins were identified publicly for the first time as Reginald Thackeray, 39, a bank manager; and his wife, Kathleen, 35.

Date of the operation will depend on when the connecting tissue is in a condition that will involve minimum risk to the babies.

License-Lack Charge Against Driver Dropped

A charge against Donald A. Button, 20-year-old Coos Bay laborer, of driving with a suspended operator's license, was dismissed in district court Thursday.

Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich, acting for District Judge Warren A. Woodruff, said he was dismissing the complaint in the interest of justice on a motion of the district attorney's office.

The court pointed out Button had not been advised by the state Department of Motor Vehicles of his suspension at the time he was ticketed by state police on June 4. Button had entered a plea of innocent at his June 25 hearing.

Willard Carl West, 23, of Elkton pleaded innocent to drawing a bank check with insufficient funds to cover it. The \$10 check was passed Aug. 2 at the Little River Super Market, Glide.

2 More U.S. Warships Sent To Formosa Area

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy said today the aircraft carrier Midway and the heavy cruiser Los Angeles are on the way to reinforce the 7th Fleet in the war-threatened Western Pacific.

The Midway left San Francisco Aug. 16 and moved out of Pearl Harbor Thursday.

The Los Angeles sailed from Long Beach, Calif., Wednesday. This was the day the carrier Essex and four destroyers pulled out of the 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean to join the 7th Fleet.

The 7th Fleet is on the alert because of the Red Chinese threat to invade the Chinese Nationalist islands of Quemoy and Matsu, between the Chinese mainland and the Nationalist stronghold of Formosa.

It further stated that the decision has created disunity in the United States, at a time when unity is critically needed, and has destroyed racial friendship in the South.

Other Southern delegations, however, did not go along with the resolution.

In a debate before the vote, Dan Ellis of Tennessee asked if the racial animity (friendship) meant that one race was too good to associate with another.

Don Furtado of the University of North Carolina said the congress was not held to argue constitutional points. He said that in 1902 a North Carolina governor called for integration and that the actual achievement of that desire is coming 56 years later.

The leader of the South Carolina group, Fred Letclery, however, termed his delegation's resolution "a realistic document." He said, "Only when the South submits will you integrate."

Diana Dors' Missing Cash Turns Up; Case Closed

LONDON (AP)—Scotland Yard today dropped the case of Diana Dors' missing bundle of cash.

Detectives, announcing no charges would be filed, conferred with the movie star and her manager, Tommy Yeardey.

Diana had reported Tuesday that 11,000 pounds—\$30,800—disappeared from her safe-deposit box at a London department store. Yeardey also had disappeared.

He turned up Thursday and announced he'd just transferred the money "on Diana's behalf to safe-guard her."

A detective and an attorney picked up the money from another safe-deposit box in London, and handed it over to the actress.

Judge Woodrich increased bail to \$1,000, and set West's trial for Sept. 9.
