

Archers, Bird Hunters Face Good Prospects In State

Seven hunting areas open for Oregon archers this weekend, but the state Game Commission cautioned bowmen to be extremely careful or they would become firefighters instead of deer and elk hunters.

The commission also said there would be good hunting for bird hunters in the seasons opening this weekend.

Archery areas open this weekend are Canyon Creek, Mt. Emily, Eagle Creek, Baker, White River, Century Drive and Keno. Century Drive and Keno will be open only for deer. The others will be open for deer and elk.

Grouse Areas Tabbed

Almost all sections of Lake, Malheur and Harney Counties should be good for sage grouse gunners, hunting from Aug. 30 to Sept. 7, the commission report said. Other good sage grouse bets are Warner Valley, Fort Rock and Silver Lake in Lake County and near alfalfa fields in Harney County.

Eastern Oregon's five-day grouse season, opening Saturday, should provide good hunting in Morrow and Wheeler Counties adjacent to water areas. The north fork of the John Day will provide fair to good returns.

Dove Spots Noted

Dove hunting will be excellent in Gilliam, Morrow and Wheeler Counties. Blue grouse will be found scattered through most of the Blue Mountains and foothill areas in the Umatilla district.

Best shooting in Union County will be near Mt. Emily and the

Minam River. Ruffed grouse hunting will be fair to good in timbered and brushy areas near streams in the Eagle and Elkhorn ranges in Baker County and in the northern half of Union County.

Sage grouse hunting should be fair in Baker County south of the Burnt River from UNITY Reservoir east to Huntington.

Pigeon hunters will do well in the Mineral Springs areas throughout the Willamette Valley. The Nehalem flyway should produce good results also.

The high desert country near water holes and grain fields along the Deschutes and John Day Rivers should be good for mourning doves, which are in abundance throughout the state.

Lower Umpqua Bass Best Bet, Reports State

Weekend angling may be somewhat improved by the cooler weather this week, but the long hot spell has definitely affected fishing results from Oregon lakes and streams, the state Fish Commission said today.

Central Oregon lakes and some coastal salmon waters may be good bets this weekend, the commission said in its weekly report.

Trout angling is fair in the North Umpqua and in Lemolo, Toketee, and Soda Springs Reservoirs. Salmon angling at Winchester Bay is fair. Striped bass angling in the lower Umpqua is good. Coos Bay bay salmon angling is fair. Lower Coquille River Chinook angling is fair to good. Striped bass fishing between the bridges and Coos Bay is good. Occasional good catches of trout are being made at Willow Creek Reservoir and Squaw Lakes.

'Defend, Or Else' - Cal Group Tells Idle Robinson

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — California will put pressure on the National Boxing Assn. to make Sugar Ray Robinson either defend his world middleweight crown or give it up.

The plan is to get a top contender through an elimination tournament, then give a "fight or quit" ultimatum to Robinson.

Harry W. Falk Jr., a vice president of the NBA and a member of the State Athletic Commission, said he'd make the proposal at the NBA's Sept. 7 meeting in Las Vegas, Nev.

He concurred with matchmaker Bennie Ford's suggestion that the winner of a Sept. 25 San Francisco fight between No. 3 contender Joey Giardello and Holly Mims, No. 6, be one of the elimination matches.

Another, Ford said, could be the Sept. 11 bout in West Jordan, Utah between Gene Fullmer, the No. 2 contender, and No. 7 ranked Spider Webb.

Pittsburgh's persistent Pirates thunder into 10 telling days in the National League pennant chase tonight, opening a three-game series at Milwaukee with the first-place Braves.

The next 10 days could be thrillers or chillers for the no-longer-bundling Bucs. At the moment they're in second place, 7 1/2 games behind the Braves. They stand 7-8 against the Braves with seven games remaining in the season series.

All seven are scheduled for the next 10 days — three at Milwaukee this weekend, four at Pittsburgh next weekend.

Milwaukee wrapped up a 4-1 series at San Francisco yesterday by smacking the third-place Giants 3-0 behind Bob Rush's 10-hit pitching in the only game scheduled in either league.

Rush Tough

Rush (7-12) walked but one and struck out seven while giving up eight singles plus a triple and double to Orlando Cepeda.

The Braves had only six hits — four of 'em by Red Schoendienst, who doubled home the second run — off loser Johnny Antonelli, now 14-11. Del Crandall's walk and stolen base, triggering errors by catcher Bob Schmidt and center fielder Willie Mays, gave the Braves the run they needed to push the Giants nine games back in the fifth inning.

The Pirates sent right-hander Bob Friend against southpaw Warren Spahn, the NL's top winners with 17, tonight.

The Giants are home to the fourth-place Dodgers, with Paul Giel (4-3) opposing Don Drysdale (9-11). In the rest of the all night game schedule, it's Chicago (Glen Hobbie, 9-6) at St. Louis (Sam Jones, 11-10), and Philadelphia (Don Cardwell, 2-2) at Cincinnati (Bob Purkey, 14-8).

NY Seeks Clinchers

The New York Yankees should finally get around to making Washington the first victim of the inevitable in the American League pennant "race" this weekend.

The camps' magic number for officially eliminating the last-place Senators is three. Any combination of Yankee victories and-or

Washington defeats totaling three does the job.

The Yankees open a three-game set at Washington tonight. But if the Senators are doomed to be the first to go, they won't be alone very long. The number is 17 for the Yankee pennant clinching over the second-place Chicago White Sox.

The magic numbers that officially eliminate the rest of the league go like this: Boston, 16; Baltimore, 13; Detroit, 12; Cleveland and Kansas City, 9.

By comparison, Milwaukee's pennant number in the National League is 21.

After Thursday night's results in the Northwest League, it is anybody's guess who will tangle with first-half winner Lewiston in the playoffs starting Sept. 2.

Lewiston cuffed leading Yakima, 13-10, dropping the Bears to a shaky two-game edge over second place Wenatchee, which blanked Salem, 6-0. Eugene dropped Tri-City 3-1 in the other league tilt.

With six games remaining until the season's final scrap, Sept. 1, the Chiefs appear to have a far better chance to overtake the Bears than they did several weeks ago.

However, Wenatchee's final series finds them squaring off with Lewiston, an always tough opponent, while Yakima will meet Eugene, the fourth place club. The Bears are not counted out yet, by any means.

It took the Braves' seven-run sixth inning and three hours and 10 minutes to make Yakima play dead.

The Bears jumped to a 5-3 lead with four runs in the fourth, but Lewiston's sixth frame proved to be Yakima's demise.

The Braves' Bob Kropiewnicki twirled a five-hitter at Salem as Wenatchee whitewashed the Senators.

The Chiefs jumped to a three-run lead in the first inning after Elio Toboso singled and Felipe Valdes doubled, both scoring on a single by catcher Jake Azcue, who later came home on a sacrifice fly.

Another five-hitter by Jim Myers boosted Eugene to its victory over Tri-City.

The Braves got their lone run in the first stanza, when Harry Williams drove in Reggie Hamilton with a single.

Eugene scored single tallies in the sixth, seventh and eighth frames.

Many Queries Unanswered As U.S. Net Tourny Begins

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (AP) —

The National Tennis Championships got under way today with all sorts of questions to be answered.

Has Barry MacKay improved sufficiently under Jack Kramer's tutelage to make a serious fight for the title?

Has Ham Richardson, the only U. S. player who has demonstrated he can beat the Australians, decided to make a serious bid for the Davis Cup team?

How about National Collegiate champion Alex Olmedo? He is a citizen of Peru, but is eligible for the U. S. cup team because he has lived here so long. The question is whether he'll be selected.

Has defending champion Mal Anderson of Australia come along to the extent that he has no worries other than his teammate, Ashley Cooper?

The answers will be known a week from Sunday when the championships end. No doubt about it, Anderson, who is feuding with the

Aussie tennis authorities, should be favored.

He is seeded No. 1, and Cooper is right behind him.

Richardson is No. 3, followed by Neale Fraser, the Aussie left-hander who rates right behind Anderson and Cooper in Davis Cup coach Harry Hopman's plans.

Then, in order, come MacKay, Olmedo, Kurt Nielsen of Denmark and Dick Savitt.

The Davis Cup brass, including Captain Perry Jones, will be keeping close tabs on MacKay.

So far this season, Barry has been very steady. He has looked like a world beater on occasions and a bushier in other matches.

Elliott's 3:36 Cracks 1500 Meters Mark

GOETTERBORG, Sweden (AP) — How fast can Herb Elliott run?

That was the question track experts asked today after a world-record-smashing 3:36 for 1500 meters by the lanky, 20-year-old Australian.

Many even refused to venture a guess as he preceded his almost incredible 1500 with a 2:54 mile at Dublin Aug. 8. The mile is 1,609 yards. The 1500 meter is 1,640 yards, 1 foot, 4 inches.

3:50 Mile Foreseen

Some believe that Elliott will be the first to better 3:50 for the mile. He has been under 4 minutes on eight occasions since bursting into the limelight late last January with a 3:59.4 mile at Melbourne.

"No man must set a limit on his capabilities," he said of himself. "Nobody must be limited by what's around him."

Dr. Roger Bannister, first man to break the 4-minute barrier, and John Landy, who lowered the mile record to 3:58, called his 3:54.5 at Dublin "absolutely incredible." But his metric time yesterday was even better. It was equivalent to a mile between 3:33 and 3:54.

"He is the greatest runner I ever saw," said Sweden's Dan Waern, silver medal winner in the recent European Games. "He is able to do the impossible and you can expect everything from him. This was not the last time he will set a world record."

Consensus: Herb Tops

Swedish experts were unanimous Elliott is the best runner ever seen in the Scandinavian countries.

The youthful Australian, whose method of training belies all accepted programs, gave credit to the fans in the stands for his record.

"They inspired me," he said. "Their cheers carried me along a fine track. I didn't think about a timetable. I ran to win, not to set a world record."

He crossed the finish line 20 meters ahead of Czechoslovakia's Stanislav Jungwirth, who holds the listed world record of 3:38.1. Jungwirth was timed in 3:39.

Algerian Battles LA's Jordan In TV Tiff Tonight

NEW YORK (AP) — Lahouari Godhi's handlers have nicknamed the Algerian lightweight "Go Go" in the hope that he will see the light and do just that against Don Jordan tonight.

Godhi has to open up and keep punching in the American style, said Manager Jersey Jones. "He's a fine boxer and has fast hands. Very clever, too. They go for that stuff in Europe. Here you've got to please the fans and belt as well as box."

The 29-year-old Godhi has a 2-1 record in the U. S. Jordan, however, is an 8-3 favorite for the television 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden.

The lanky, 5-9 lightweight and welterweight contender from Los Angeles, is just as eager to make good here as his opponent.

Although ranked fourth among the lightweights by the NBA and seventh among the welters by Ring magazine, the bout marks Jordan's debut in the East.

Jordan, 23, has a 38-11 record, including 14 knockouts. He hasn't been stopped, Godhi has a 47-2 record, including 12 knockouts. He has been stopped once.

Discovery, Former Racing Great, Sent To Death

BALTIMORE (AP) — Discovery, the first horse bought by Alfred G. Vanderbilt and which carried him to the top in racing, was sent to his death Thursday at the age of 27.

The mercy killing at Vanderbilt's Sagamore Farm ended an association of a quarter of a century. It spanned a period in which Discovery helped his owner become the leading money winner twice.

Discovery was the big individual winner in 1935 for Vanderbilt and his grandson, the famous Native Dancer, provided the bulk of the backlog in 1953.

Nats' President Griffith Says Minneapolis Move Not In Books

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Washington baseball situation has suddenly become the Minneapolis muddle.

Just when it seemed the Senators were on the verge of seeking a transfer to the Minnesota city President Calvin Griffith said it wasn't so.

He said the club's board of directors would make no move to ward Minneapolis at a meeting today.

"There definitely will not be any vote taken on moving the franchise," he said.

There had been widespread reports that action would be taken on two fronts today to pave the way for Washington to try for relocation in Minneapolis.

The Minneapolis City Council is

expected to approve a nine-million dollar bond issue to finance an expansion of the city's stadium from 21,000 to 42,000 seating capacity.

Mayor P. Kenneth Peterson said he understood there was to be simultaneous approval at both ends — the okaying of the bond program in Minneapolis and a favorable decision by the Senators' board on the transfer proposal.

But Griffith said such wouldn't be the case.

"If they're saying my announcement that the ball club will move will be simultaneous with the approval of their bond issue, they're wrong," he said.

"We've simply decided not to vote on any shifts at this time."
