

Abolishment Of Peace Justices Will Be Sought

PORTLAND (AP)—Studies of the Legislative Interim Committee on Judicial Administration are going to result in some controversial measures being put before the next session of the Oregon Legislature.

The Portland City Club was told this here by the committee chairman, Gunther Krause, Portland.

Krause said that among the recommendations will be these: Abolish justice of the peace offices; give the Supreme Court added rule-making power and enlarge it to nine members; withdraw judicial authority from county judges; and make judges of the state's courts appointive.

He said he expected opposition but defended the recommendations as forward steps. He said appointment of judges would be recommended as part of the so-called Missouri system under which a panel of jurists, lawyers and laymen makes up a list and the governor appoints from it. Dr. Lawrence, Noted Nuclear Pioneer, Dies

PAULO ALTO, Calif. (AP)—Dr. Ernest O. Lawrence, nuclear physicist and Nobel Prize winner, died Wednesday night after surgery at Palo Alto Hospital. He was 57.

Dr. Lawrence invented the atom shattering cyclotron, an instrument for converting one element into another, in 1930. His first one cost \$25.

He built one of the world's great scientific laboratories around his cyclotrons at the University of California. The instruments played a key role in developing the first nuclear bomb, producing the first self-exploding uranium 235.

From the laboratory, which Lawrence has directed since 1936, came numerous discoveries of the nature of matter, new substances to fight disease and promote agriculture, science and industry.

Dr. Lawrence won the Nobel Prize in physics in 1939 for his cyclotron discovery.

Losers In Beauty Contests Have Best Chance For Movie Stardom, Record Reveals

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—It's nice to win a beauty contest but it's better to lose—if you want to become a movie star.

The history of beauty contest winners has been dismal in Hollywood, but losers go on to stardom. Take Vera Miles, who lost out in the Miss America contest some years back. Even she can't remember the name of the girl who won the year she entered.

In the recent Miss Universe contest, Evi Norlund as Miss Denmark wasn't one of the five finalists. Yet she is the only one of the 70 international beauties who wound up with a movie contract.

Max Arrow, talent director at Columbia Pictures, watched the telecast of the Long Beach beauty pageant. It was a miniature screen test for the 20-year-old Evi.

Arrow had a look at another beauty contest loser a few years ago. He took her to the late Harry Cohn and urged that she be signed. That was Kim Novak.

He has the same feeling about Evi—also a blonde. She's getting the same buildup that Kim got four years ago. Columbia even fixed her up with a room at the nearby Studio Club, the YWCA-like habitat that Kim called home even after she reached stardom.

Box Office Lure Rules

Evi's selection for a contract indicated a trend in Hollywood beauty, especially as it relates to box office. A few years ago, every new starlet signed by a studio could roughly fall into two categories. Either she was a Marilyn Monroe type or a Grace Kelly type.

Evi, a shapely blonde with an intriguing accent, is a Scandinavian. A Brigitte Bardot category is a blending of the Kelly-Monroe types with that added something that only foreign girls have.

Evi had no dramatic training before Columbia signed her. The daughter of an architect, she was a top fashion model in Copenhagen when she won out over several hundred girls for the Miss Denmark title.

"I didn't think I would ever get to the United States as a tourist but here I am under contract to a big movie studio. It's incredible," she said.

Forgotten Note Book Touches Off Quiz Show Fraud

NEW YORK (AP)—Television's big quiz show probe, it appeared today, began when a woman contestant reportedly got careless with a notebook.

The New York County district attorney's office said that Edward Hilgemeier Jr., a part-time butler, but actor and contestant on quiz shows, made the complaint that triggered the inquiry.

The disclosure came after columnist Harriet Van Horne in the New York World-Telegram & Sun named him as "the man who blew the whistle on Datto and panicked TV's multimillion-dollar quiz show empire."

The district attorney's office would give no details, but Miss Van Horne said Hilgemeier was a standby performer for the Datto show and became intrigued when he noticed that one of the women who had been winning a lot of prizes on the program kept consulting a notebook when waiting to go on the air.

When she forgetfully put the book down and walked away, Hilgemeier saw that it contained answers to questions that were being asked, according to the published account.

The man sent an affidavit to the Federal Communications Commission. Subsequently Datto was taken off the NBC and CBS networks by the sponsor.

Until today's disclosures, a wall of silence had blocked efforts to determine the actual beginning of the inquiry.

In another development, the Columbia Broadcasting System said it had been conducting an intensive inquiry of its own for a week into all quiz shows currently carried on its network, but has failed to turn up evidence of any improper procedure.

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State Fair Opens To Small Crowd; New Lures Poised

SALEM (AP)—Oregon's 1958 state fair officially opened under cloudy skies Thursday morning as Gov. Robert D. Holmes used a power saw to slice through a log at the entrance gate.

Only a sparse crowd was on hand as the event opened, but fair officials predicted a throng of youngsters and their parents would descend on the grounds later in the day.

This is one of the two "Kids' Days" at the fair. The other will come a week from Thursday.

The Thursday opening marks a departure in fair history. Previously gates were opened on the Saturday before Labor Day. The change was made to lengthen the fair to 10 days. It will close Sept. 6.

A feature of Thursday's program was the dedication of four newly completed 4-H Club-Future Farmers of America buildings which cost \$300,000 and are in use for the first time.

The governor presided at the dedication ceremonies.

An overflow of cattle and poultry exhibits are on display this year with some of the animals being housed in tents.

Judging of exhibits began in earnest Thursday morning both in open classifications and in 4-H and FFA competitions.

Fair officials report record advance sale of tickets both to the combination rodeo-horse show and the stage revue.

The revue for the first six days will star Jimmy Rodgers, the Camas, Wash., singer who has become one of the nation's top recording stars. Vaughn Monroe will be featured performer the final four nights.

Horse racing got under way Thursday at Lone Oak track at the fairgrounds.

Linfield Researcher To Aid Oregon Plans
SALEM (AP)—Dr. Walter P. Dyke, director of Linfield Research Institute and recognized as one of the nation's top electronic experts, has been retained as technological consultant by the Department of Planning and Development, Gov. Robert D. Holmes announced this week.

The new consultant, chosen last week as Western electronics man of the year, is given a major share of credit for development of the Linfield Research Institute from a laboratory corner into a major research and consulting operation.

The governor said Dyke would concentrate his efforts for the Department Commission in wooming a growing share of the mushrooming electronic industry for the state. He will work on a part-time consulting basis.

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
