WASHINGTON (AP) — Worry that the Chinese Reds might soon try a full-scale invasion of Quemoy ebbed here today. Instead, officials speculated on what the Communists intend by their continued heavy bombardment of the offshore island.

Rep. Clement Zablocki (D-Wis.) and Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) joined U.S. diplomats in viewing the Communist attacks as a primarily political rather than military move in the cold war.

They discounted the possibility of an imminent seizure attempt against Quemoy or Matsu, Nationalist-held islands just off the Communist-controlled mainland, or against Generissimo Chiang Kai-shek's Formosa stronghold itself.

That left one question: Just what are the Reds up to?

Some State Department authorities figured the Chinese Communists might invade the tiny, lightly defended Tan islands near Quemoy as a cheap follow-up to the big bombardment of the past five days. Peiping could then ballyhoo this as a great victory.

Mao May Have Ideas

These officials suggested Red Chinese Premier Mao Tze-tung might be trying to strengthen his bid for United Nations membership, due for discussion at the U.N. They said he may also be serving

Democratic leader and a foreign Relations Committee member, said he doubted the bombardment was designed to bring pressure to bear for a U. N. seat.

He called it a diversionary tactic of Peiping, after Mao's recent meeting with Soviet boss Nikita Khrushchev, to keep the United Nations he wants to be included in any future summit conference.

Mansfield, the assistant Senate

States on the defensive now that Middle East tension has eased.

Zablocki, chairman of the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on the Far East, said he has been told that "the reports of the ferocity of the attacks on the island were a little bit exaggerated."

Reds Bolster Strength
Zablocki said U. S. leadership

in the Far East would suffer a heavy blow if Quemoy should be evacuated now. Any such pullout should not be undertaken at least until after the firing has quieted down, he said.

Intelligence officials reported new evidence the Reds have bolstered jet fighter and bomber strength along the Chinese coast. But they said Communist troops are still several hundred miles inland and no invasion fleet has been assembled.

Mansfield said it appeared the United States has told Chiang not to retaliate against the mainland. "I don't believe that Chiang will be unleashed," he said.

Zablocki said Nationalist planes have been dropping rice and leaflets, not bombs, on their forays over Communist territory.

However, the Nationalists reported today their artillery had destroyed several Red gun positions and some Communist supply dumps in the Quemoy area.

Flier Sets World Flight In Effort To Break Record

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — A flier who plans Monday to start a round-the-world flight and a new assault on the light plane distance record was to make a television appearance here today en route to New York.

The former Navy flier, George P. Williams, 34, was to fly here from Kerrville, Tex., and then head on to St. Paul, Minn.

The native of Knox, Ind., who has been living in Mexico City, is flying the same plane which William Wyatt used in an unsuccessful attempt to fly from Galveston, Tex., to Rome last year.

The Texas-built craft is a four-place, 180-horsepower plane built by Mooney Aircraft Corp. of Kerrville. Williams plans to land at Idlewild Airport, New York, Saturday after stops at Chicago and Washington.

The projected flight out of Idlewild on Monday is expected to take seven or eight days including stops in Newfoundland, Ireland, France, Rome, Aden, Singapore, Tokyo, Mexico City and back to New York.

He hopes to set the distance mark with a nonstop flight from Tokyo to Mexico City, 7,030 miles. The present record was set last month by Marion Boling, an airline pilot who flew 6,979 miles from Manila to Pendleton, Ore.

Heavy Dish-Breaking Loss Caterers' Severe Headache; Tried Alternatives Futile

NEW YORK (AP) — If you take your wife out to dinner you can get out of helping with the dishes — unless you forget your billfold.

But the dishwashing and dish-breaking problem is still there. It's one of today's big headaches for those in the restaurant and hotel business.

They report replacing as much as 85 per cent of their cups and 47 per cent of their saucers annually. The toll varies widely. Some eateries say they replace less than 15 per cent of all their tableware stocks annually. A few report replacing up to 150 per cent.

This can eat into profits almost as fast as Junior can into a hamburger.

Those who cater to the public's hunger have tried many ways of cutting this cost. Some of the larger ones report that dishwashing machines have cut their breakage costs by one-fourth to one-half. A few say they can see little difference in this respect between the mechanical and the human washer.

Labor-Industries Name Selected For New Building

SALEM (AP) — Members of the Oregon Board of Control this week officially designated Labor and Industries Building as the name of the new structure to rise on the Capitol Mall.

Plans of the new \$3,600,000 structure were approved.

The building is to be financed through investment of state Industrial Accident Segregated Funds.

Members of the Industrial Accident Commission, present at the board meeting, voiced approval of the plan.

It was decided to have an opinion from the attorney general to determine just who will own the building after the Industrial Accident Commission is repaid.

The commission is to hold title until the money advanced is paid back.

Only one piece of property on the block where the building will be constructed is still to be acquired by the state and it is expected to be done within 60 days.

A construction table presented by Finance Director John Richardson calls for bid opening Feb. 27, 1959, with construction to take 18 months after the contract is let.

The building will house activities of the Industrial Accident, Unemployment Compensation Commission, Department of Labor, Corporation Commission and other state agencies.

Educators Of 6 Foreign Nations Will Enter OSC

CORVALLIS (AP) — Twenty-seven science teachers and school administrators from six foreign countries will enter Oregon State College this fall under an international teachers' exchange program sponsored by the U.S. Department of State.

The program, administered by the U.S. office of education, makes it possible for American school teachers, supervisors and administrators to study and teach in foreign countries and for teachers from those countries to do the same in the United States.

The 27 teachers will enroll in two science teaching seminars and will audit two other science courses. They will live in private homes in Corvallis as part of the program aimed at letting them become acquainted with American family life.

The group includes 14 men science teachers from Japan; 3 men and 1 woman from Iran; 1 man and 1 woman from China, and 1 man each from Peru, Jordan and Germany. Four other teachers will be assigned later.

Proposed Portland Help For College Faces Objection

PORTLAND (AP) — State Rep. Shirley Field (R-Portland) today said she would fight any efforts by former Rep. Keith Skelton (D-Eugene) to pass legislation aimed at getting the city of Portland to help finance Portland State College operations.

Miss Field wrote Skelton, noting, "To follow through on your reasoning, we would expect Corvallis to support Oregon State College and Eugene to support the University of Oregon. This is ridiculous."

Skelton who is a candidate for election to the Legislature this fall, said Friday he had asked the state legislative counsel to determine whether a city could, under existing law, contribute to the support of an institution of higher education within its city limits.

If not, Skelton said he proposes to see about introduction of such legislation.

He said that in granting broad degree powers to Portland State, that the state Board of Higher Education implied that the college would receive an "increasingly large appropriation from the state general fund." He then suggested that Portland pay part of the cost.

Gov. Holmes Opposes Integration Slowdown

SALEM (AP) — School integration should be pushed as rapidly as possible, Gov. Robert Holmes said here.

"Once the Supreme Court has made its ruling in favor of integration, each state should proceed as orderly and as rapidly as possible in the framework of that state's individual situation to achieve integration," he said.

Holmes added: "There should be no slow-down."

The governor made the comment after President Eisenhower admitted he once remarked to friends that school integration in the South should be slowed down.
