ISABEL FISHER, at the top left, started working for Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. Dec. 28, 1925, as an operator then later as assistant chief operator and in 1941 was promoted to the position of chief operator. Her husband, Andrew D. Fisher, owns Fisher Auto Parts in Roseburg and Sutherlin. The couple resides on Del Rio Road.

LEAH CRAFTON, top right, has been with Douglas Title Co. in Roseburg since being graduated from Roseburg High School. Her friends in the business world are many. Her continuous work with Douglas Title Co. has made her well-known throughout the county. She and her husband, L. J. (Jack) Crafton, reside on SE Mill Street.

OPAL MOORE, center right, has been with Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. as an operator since 1928. She first started work in Eugene and has since been at Camp Abbott near Bend, Seattle, Eugene, then back to Bend and to Roseburg in January 1957. She and her brother, Frank Moore, reside at 102 SE Court Street. Opal is on the Vail Award committee, the only traffic woman for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. on that committee.

AGNES PITCHFORD needs no introduction to Douglas County residents nor to a great many in the state of Oregon, for as Douglas County Juvenile Officer she served Judges R. W. Marsters, George K. Quine, Stewart, D. N. Busenbark, M. C. Bowker, Huron Clough, Walter Hamilton, Carl Hill and Charles Woodrich. She was elected city treasurer when women were first allowed to vote. She became associated with the county in the juvenile department in 1916 and held the office of Juvenile Officer until 1955, when she stepped down to semi-retire, but as long as Aggie is able, Douglas County will always need her and when she no longer is able to work, she will be remembered as one of the best officers in juvenile work in the state of Oregon.

KATHERINE KENNY, lower right, needs no introduction, as her friends are legion. She started in the office of Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. May 1, 1918, as a cashier. She later became service representative and is now business office supervisor. Katherine's friendliness is unlimited, not only to all county residents, but to her co-workers as well.
