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MISS BONNIE AULT has just returned from a seven-week tour of Europe during which time she visited 16 countries. She traveled with a group of 40 people from all parts of the United States. The trip proved most enjoyable and successful.

The group left New York by air June 27, landing in Prestwick, Scotland. From Glasgow they traveled by train to Edinburgh. Here, the group enjoyed an excursion through the Trossachs and Loch Lomond country.

From Scotland they flew to London and spent four days visiting Buckingham Palace, the Tower of London, Westminster Abbey and St. Paul's Cathedral. While watching the "changing of the guards" at the palace, the group had the good fortune to see the Queen Mother leave Clarence House. A highlight of the stay in England was a visit to Stratford-on-Avon.

From England they traveled by train and boat to Holland, where they were met by a bus, which they used for the remainder of the trip on the continent. In Amsterdam they visited the Isle of Marken, where the people still dress in the traditional Dutch costume.

From Holland the group traveled to Brussels. A visit to the World's Fair was the highlight of this stop. In Germany they made one night stops at Cologne, Assmannshausen and Freiburg. A boat ride down the Rhine was enjoyed while in Germany.

In Switzerland the group stopped overnight at Interlaken. During this stop they drove to the mountain village of Grindelwald and rode a ski lift up into the beautiful Swiss Alps.

From Switzerland they traveled through the Brenner Pass into Italy to Venice. In Venice the sightseeing included St. Mark's Square, Doges' Palace, the Bridge of Sighs and a ride on the Grand Canal. Continuing along the Adriatic coast the group traveled southward through Cassino to Naples. Here they took a day's excursion to the beautiful Isle of Capri, visiting the Blue Grotto. Another day was spent at Pompeii.

The "eternal city" Rome, was the next stop for the group. Here such familiar places as Trevi Fountain, the Pantheon, Vatican City and the Colosseum were visited. While in Rome the group had the opportunity of attending the opera "Aida" in the ruins of the Baths of Caracalla. From Rome they traveled to Florence and then through Pisa, Monte Carlo and Cannes to Barcelona, Spain.

The group reentered France through Carcassonne, Limoges, and Tours and on to Paris. Four days spent in Paris were filled with sightseeing to such well known places as the Arc de Triomphe, Eiffel Tower and Napoleon's Tomb. An all day excursion to Versailles was also enjoyed.

In Paris the original tour group split up, some members returning to the United States and others continuing on to Scandinavia. Those who continued on flew from Paris to Copenhagen. In Copenhagen a visit to rural Denmark and Helsingør, Hamlet's Castle, was enjoyed. Several evenings were spent at Tivoli Gardens enjoying this permanent amusement park, where open air ballet is presented every evening for all to enjoy.

From Copenhagen the group traveled by train to Stockholm, Sweden, the Venice of the North, proved to be an interesting, well-kept city. In Oslo, Norway, an excursion to Frogner Park to see the Vigeland collection of sculptures was taken. From Oslo Miss Ault flew by Scandinavian Airlines over the pole to Los Angeles and then to Portland and home to Roseburg, where she will teach again this year at Fullerton School.
