

Nixon Urges Tax Cuts, Jobless Pay Boost As Economy Spur

Deficit Held Not Serious

Better Treatment Of Business Needed, Vice President Says

BOSTON (AP)—Vice President Richard Nixon today urged a broad program of tax cuts and expanded jobless payments to stimulate the U.S. economy.

Nixon said he was speaking for himself, not the Eisenhower administration, and declared:

"I realize that for someone in political life even to suggest consideration on such proposals as these may seem somewhat foolhardy."

Nixon, in a speech prepared for delivery to the 50th anniversary conference of the Harvard Business School Assn., said his proposals were "areas that should have top priority for consideration by the administration and by the Congress in its next session."

Noting that a 12-billion-dollar government deficit now is in prospect, Nixon said "we must not allow the fear of a temporary budget deficit to put us in a strait-jacket which will keep us from doing what we ought to do to insure economic growth."

"Our goal should be to fashion a tax structure which will create more jobs, more income and more genuine security," he said.

Tax Reform Plan Stated

Nixon's tax reform proposals were part of a three-pronged discussion of major economic problems.

The vice president urged "more liberal treatment of depreciation for business taxation purposes" in order to "stimulate the taking of risks by investing in new plants and equipment."

He also proposed a reduction in the present corporate tax rate, saying:

"Even a small cut in the corporate tax rate of 52 percent would lead to more rather than less revenue."

Nixon urged "A complete overhauling of the present hodge-podge of excise taxes."

He said a "general manufacturers' excise tax of approximately 1 1/2 percent would bring in as much revenue as is presently obtained from all other excise taxes."

Nixon proposed revision of what he called the present "almost confiscatory rates in the highest brackets" of personal income taxes. These now range up to 90 percent.

"The small loss of revenue caused by some reduction of these rates would inevitably be offset by the new investments and business expansion which would result," he said.

E. M. Murphy To Manage Ashley's Campaign

Edward M. Murphy, Roseburg attorney, has accepted the position of campaign manager for Frank Ashley, incumbent Democratic candidate for Douglas County commissioner.

Murphy said he has begun the organization of a non-partisan committee to support Ashley's candidacy. He said he will have a full slate of district managers at a later date.

Murphy, who has been active in civic affairs during his residence in Roseburg, has not actively participated in local politics. But he said he volunteered his services as Ashley's campaign manager because Ashley "has proven that he is a man who can work with other people and that he is vitally interested in the economy and welfare of the people in our county."

Murphy said he would consider it a "serious blow to the overall economy of our county" to make a change in the County Court at this time.

Boy—Matches—Attic Fire: 3 Children Die

CLEVELAND (AP)—Three young children from one family were burned to death last night in an attic apartment fire which arson squad members said was started by an older brother.

The victims were Marion and Marilyn Clemons, 2-year-old twins, and Elmyria Clemons, 8 months. The third story attic apartment of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Clemons, who were visiting a neighbor, was destroyed in the \$3,000 fire.

Firemen said Rudolph Jr., 5, admitted playing with matches and starting the fire. They said a sister, Lillian, 4, was with him. Both ran out safely when flames whipped through the apartment on the east side. The father, returning home, turned in the alarm.

Rev. C. W. Bates, Retired Cleric, Passes On At 77

The Rev. Charles Wesley Bates, 77, retired minister of the Church of the Open Bible, died this morning in a Roseburg hospital.

He was injured in a fall at Silverton about 10 days ago and was hospitalized at Silverton before being brought to Roseburg.

Born at Boone, Iowa, May 20, 1881, he moved with his parents to California when he was a child. He came to Oregon as a young man, residing at Coos Bay for 40 years and at Gold Beach for 15 years before coming to Roseburg about four years ago.

He became a minister of the Church of the Open Bible in 1920 and retired four years ago. He was married to Maude Wuerz on June 12, 1952 at Roseburg.

Funeral services will be in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary Tuesday at 2 p.m., with the Rev. Lawrence Crook of the Church of the Open Bible, Eugene officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

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Absence Of Law Snags Icelandic Fishing Dispute

LONDON (AP)—The claims of Red China and Iceland to waters within 12 nautical miles of their shores have provoked disputes with two of the world's greatest sea powers, the United States and Britain.

The one clear fact to emerge from the tangled complications of those claims is that they cannot be settled in any court of law because there is no uniform international law on sea limits.

Disputes over those limits seem capable of settlement, therefore, only by force or by political negotiation.

In the Icelandic dispute, the British have been urging the hardy Icelanders to sit down and negotiate, meanwhile defying the new limit with their trawlers and gunboats. But with confidence in their case, the Icelanders feel they need only hark the trawlers long enough to emerge the winners.

On the Red Chinese claim, which the United States rejects, there are many more complexities and wider issues. In a sense, it seems to be only a byproduct of the deeper power struggle.

Iceland extended her sea limit last Monday to protect her fishing area. Helping announced her extension Thursday to buttress her claim to the offshore islands held by her nationalist enemies on Formosa.

There is no generally accepted international agreement on the breadth of territorial waters held by the powers are hopelessly divided on a uniform law of the sea.

Most countries observe a three-mile sea limit. The limit goes back to the 17th century when a nation's "shot" batteries could reach no more than about three miles.

Funeral services will be in the chapel of Ganz Mortuary at 2 p.m. Monday, with the Rev. Frank Wagner of Riddle officiating. Burial will be in the Riddle Cemetery.

was arrested Aug. 27 at her Roseburg place of business by Sheriff Ira C. Byrd. His office had worked on the case nearly two years in conjunction with the Oregon State Police arson squad.

Mrs. Peden is accused of being a party to the burning of a Darrell Ave. house in Winston which she owned. The fire was set by her former tenant, Lonnie D. Branscum, 27, Yakima box factory manager.

Branscum pleaded guilty to a similar charge on Aug. 29 in Circuit Court, stating he was paid \$250 "for the job."

Judge Woodrich continued bail of \$3,000 for Mrs. Peden following her arraignment and plea yesterday.

He said her trial will be set "at the earliest possible date in the coming September term of court." This is expected to be early in November.

At the time of the fire the night of Feb. 5, 1956, the tenant told investigating officers a kerosene lamp he was lighting exploded, setting the living room of the house on fire. The dwelling, insured for \$4,000, quickly burned to the ground.

Under questioning by Judge Woodrich at his arraignment, Branscum declared Mrs. Peden paid him \$250 for setting the building on fire although earlier she had offered him \$500 if he would do it.

Boycott Fizzles

At Van Buren, Ark., about 50 segregationist white pupils, including seven girls, kept Negroes out of the high school for the day but failed to entice more pupils to join their classroom boycott. Thirteen Negroes are enrolled in the 600-pupil school.

In Nashville, Tenn., 14 Negroes registered without trouble for second grade classes in six formerly all-white schools. This brought to 30 the number of Negroes registered for mixed classes.

At Knoxville, Tenn., racial agitator John Kasper was turned down when he tried to register as a voter in Knox County. A spokesman for the county election commission said Kasper failed to meet residence requirements.

Kasper, a native of New Jersey, recently was released from a federal prison after serving eight months of a year's sentence for criminal contempt of court on grounds he violated an injunction against interfering with peaceful integration of Clinton, Tenn., High School in 1954.

Electric Shock Kills Woman At Clothes Dryer

EUGENE (AP)—An autopsy will be held here today in the case of a woman who apparently was killed by electrical shock in her home.

The body of Mrs. Catherine M. Draga, 44, was found slumped over a clothes dryer in her Eugene home Friday.

Sheriff's deputy Harry Marlowe said an electrician later discovered a short in an outlet at the rear of the dryer.

Marlowe said this was the way the accident apparently occurred: As Mrs. Draga used a vacuum cleaner behind the dryer, the vacuum's nozzle touched the shorting outlet.

The woman then leaned over the dryer, her body touching a chrome strip. The electrical current was completed.

Marlowe said the body was discovered by the woman's husband, Frank Draga, who had been working in the back yard of their home.

Draga told deputies he received a shock when he tried to lift the body of his wife from the dryer. He was not injured.

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Communist China is moving faster and heavier naval power toward the explosive Formosa Strait area, the chief military spokesman for Nationalist China said today.

The reported buildup of Red seapower is increasing the threat to Nationalist-held offshore islands. Rear Adm. Liu Hsiu-tai said.

More Communist warships could be used to intensify Red efforts to cut off the Nationalist supply route from Formosa to the islands and would be needed to cover any invasion attempt against the islands.

Indications mounted on Formosa, meanwhile, that the Nationalists are preparing to bomb the Communist mainland if the Reds begin massive artillery or bombing attacks on Quemoy.

HONG KONG (AP)—Red China's Supreme State Council today called for general mobilization of the nation's 600 million people "for the struggle against war provocations by American imperialists in the Taiwan area."

Peiping Radio said the council issued the mobilization call after approving the government's statement calling for China-U.S. peace talks and warning the United States "not to extend provocations and aggressive action in the Taiwan (Formosa) area."

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Oregon Centennial Commission Has 3 New Members

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Robert Holmes Friday night appointed three men to the Oregon Centennial Commission—only hours after two other members resigned.

The new appointees are Nedford Mayor John Snider, Portland businessman Thomas C. Young and Al Hartung, president of the America.

Holmes Friday afternoon accepted the resignations of Thomas Sandoz of Astoria and Glenn Jackson of Medford. The governor said he did so with regret.

The third vacancy on the commission was created when Bruce Bishop resigned several months ago to study in Europe.

Snider is the only Republican among the new appointees. Young and Hartung both are Democrats.

Jackson, a vice president of the California-Oregon Power Co., and Sandoz both said their resignations were prompted by the press or private business. Sandoz is president of the Columbia River Packers Assn.

In addition to being mayor of Medford, Snider also operates a dairy. He is 40. The 65-year-old Young is in the roofing, fibre board and paper business.

Hartung has been president of the IWA six years, and is a regional director of the AFL-CIO.

Tropical Storm Hits Gulf Coast Of Texas

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (AP)—Tired tropical storm Ella moved southward today with intermittent downpours and swelling seas and squalls along the Texas Gulf Coast.

The U.S. Weather Bureau's 4 a.m. (CST) advisory, last planned on Ella, said, "Lower all warnings. Small craft along Texas and Louisiana coasts should remain in port until squalls and seas subside."

At least eight small towns had been evacuated as Ella moved toward the Texas coast and about 1,000 persons, including many tourists, left Mustang Island, about 16 miles from Corpus Christi.

MEDFORD (AP)—Superintendent Thomas Williams says the lodge in Crater Lake National Park will be closed for the season Sept. 10.

The cabins and cafeteria will be closed Sept. 15, and the chalet and cabins at the Oregon Caves National Monument will close Sept. 10.

Williams said, however, guide service at the caves will continue through the winter, and the warming hut in Crater Lake will be open on weekends throughout the winter.

3 Californians Favor Oregon Cut On Lumber Rates

PORTLAND (AP)—Three California lumber wholesalers Friday testified they had reduced their purchases of Oregon lumber because of high rail freight rates.

The three told an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing here that Southern Pacific Co. should be permitted to lower its rates for shipment of lumber from Oregon to California and Arizona.

The three are Robert Albert A. Kelley, Alameda; Carl W. Baugh, Pasadena; and James E. Richardson, Santa Ana.

Richardson said that the price of lumber produced by California mills was higher than that from Oregon mills. But, he added, higher freight rates on shipments from Oregon made it cheaper for his firm to purchase California lumber.

The three were extensively questioned by Edwin R. Berol, representing the California Forest Products Assn., which opposes the proposed rate decrease.

The final morning witness was Fred Cleveland, of Seattle, who retired in 1935 as Western freight traffic manager for Northern Pacific Railway. He said that there had been rate reductions recently throughout the Southwest.

The Portland hearing recessed and will move to San Francisco where it will resume Sept. 10.

Red Warning Issued

In his statement today, Chou emphasized "the dispute between the People's Republic of China and the United States is completely separate from the current Taiwan (Formosa) crisis."

He said Formosa was strictly "an internal affair of China."

Chou said that if the United States "outrageously continues its aggression and intervention in China and forces war upon the Chinese people, the United States will be held responsible for all the grave consequences to arise."

Chou said "the international dispute between China and the United States over Formosa Strait is a matter different from the problem of Chinese internal territory. The United States has been consistently confusing these two matters and covered up its aggression and intervention in China."

Chou stressed that the Chinese have the "complete right to liberate their territory by use of appropriate methods at the appropriate time and will not allow any foreign power to intervene in such effort."

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet military newspapers today joined the Soviet press barrage warning the United States to keep hands off Red China.

The army newspaper Red Star said the navy organ Soviet Fleet followed the same line yesterday by Pravda and Izvestia.

A retaliatory blow against the aggressors will not be limited to the area of their provocations," said Red Star. Then it said, "an attack on Red China will bring a crushing rethuff which will decisively put an end to imperialist intrigues in the Far East."

Two Southern girls, Miss Alabama and Miss North Carolina, won in the third round of preliminary judging last night. They are among the 32 contenders for the fame and fortune that goes to the final winner of the Miss America pageant.

LEVITTOWN, N. Y. (AP)—An Air Force sergeant shot himself in the abdomen Friday after a spat with his 15-year-old bride.

Sgt. Robert H. Venator, 27, was in critical condition today at Meadowbrook Hospital.

Venator married the girl, Carolyn, last July 21. They have been living with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Mitchell, in this Nassau County community.

The sergeant recently applied for a transfer from Mitchell Air Force Base on Long Island to duty in Germany.

His blonde wife objected to going overseas, and a continuing argument was climaxed when Venator strode from the Mitchell house, telling his bride: "You won't make trouble for me any more."

He got in his car and seconds later the family heard a shot. Venator had used a .45-caliber pistol.

At the hospital last night, Carolyn sobbed to her unconscious husband:

"Oh, please, God, please I didn't mean it. I didn't mean it."

Police said Venator, who originally came from Buffalo, N. Y., married Carolyn in Mineola, N. Y., and that she had altered a birth certificate to make it appear she was 18.

Lumber Prices Still On Upward Trend

PORTLAND (AP)—The lumber price index stayed on the rise in the two-week period that ended Sept. 4.

Crow's Lumber Market News Service reported the industry price average of 73 selected items indicated a net gain of \$1.27 a thousand board feet. In the previous two weeks, the increase was \$2.57 per thousand.

According to the service, indications were that the rise in prices was letting up considerably but has not yet halted. It said pine area mills reported a continual advance in white and inland fir dimension prices, but that Ponderosa pine was strong only in the lower grades.

The service said Douglas fir plywood mills appear to be moving gradually to the \$50 price for a thousand square feet of quarter-inch, sanded on one side stock.

BALCONY MODERNIZED

NEW YORK (AP)—Madison Square Garden is undertaking a \$300,000 modernization of its balcony.

President James D. Norris said the work on the 6,000-seat balcony would include enlarged public lounges, more refreshment stands, painting, increased lighting and wider areas near the escalators which were installed last year.

The work will be completed for the opening of the 1959 ice skating season, Sept. 3, which inaugurates the Garden's winter program, Norris said.

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
