Viks Field 14 Lettermen In Attempt To Oust Troy

The Myrtle Creek Vikings are well-equipped to replace the Douglas Trojans as champs of the Umpqua Valley League this year.

The Vikings have no less than 14 lettermen, including one letterman transfer to attempt the chore. Leroy Juelke welcomed 30 candidates at the first practice session and four more gridders were expected after the start of school.

The Vikings have letter-winners at every position and back them with other award-winners, and players with JV experience.

Heading the list of veterans are a pair of two-year men. Dudley Klimback is a senior tackle weighing 190 and has lettered twice. The other is fullback Wes Davidson, who scales 185.

Vet Halfbacks Set
In addition to Davidson at fullback, the Vikings have at halfback four one-year lettermen to help the backfield and another at quarterback. Halfbacks are Doug Thompson, senior transfer from Lowell weighing 150; Bob Paine, a senior who weighs 150; Frank Shircliff, a junior who is capable of playing either end or halfback and who also weighs 150; and sophomore Gordie Lowell, at 155.

At quarterback, the Viks will have Greg Lindquist, senior scaling 165.

In the line, the Myrtle Creek eleven has at ends seniors Glen Bell and Lloyd Harkey. Bell weighs 165 and Harkey 152. At tackles, in addition to Klimback, are Dick Lowell, a senior weighing 158 and

The backs are Charles Henderer and Ray Hoffman. The two tackles are David Adams and Don Wheatley and the end is Joe Whitlow. Two one-year lettermen give the Viks a veteran backfield. Bud Bishop and Jerry Ross collected their first awards last year.

The line also is experienced, with

Willford Lee, at 169 also a senior.

Guards Return
At guards, the Viks have seniors Ron McKnight and Rick Cearley. McKnight weighs 169 and Cearley 155. The center spot may be handled by senior letterman Bill Calhoun, a 158-pounder.

Another transfer, a non-letterman, is Mike Crowley from Ashland. Crowley weighs 140 and is an end. Non-lettermen expected to see action are two big tackles, Tom Byford scales 240 and Larry Root, 210. Byford is a senior and Root a junior. A third inexperienced tackle is sophomore Don Wolgast, adding his 185 pounds to the Viking cause.

JV's Turn Out
The Viks also have several sturdy underclassmen who have had one year of JV play. They, also, could keep the Myrtle Creek club in the battle for the league title in the event the veterans should falter.

The Vikings open the season Sept. 12, travelling to Myrtle Point. Saturday night, the club will engage in an inter-squad game giving Juelke and his assistants Andy Ulland and Dick Froman an opportunity of seeing the club under game conditions.
