Traffic Accidents Result In Injuries To 6 Persons

Six persons suffered injuries over the weekend in highway accidents in the Roseburg vicinity, Sheriff Ira C. Byrd reported today. None of the injured was seriously hurt. Four persons suffered injuries in a crash at 2:25 p.m. Saturday between a pickup truck and a 1954 sedan on Garden Valley Rd. at Jones Rd. intersection. The pickup, driven by C. C. Lawrence, 69, of Rt. 2, Roseburg, was entering the highway when the car driven by Wilbur Rogan, 21, of Rt. 2 came around a curve, police reported. Sheriff's deputies reported Rogan tried to hit a barrow pit to avoid the collision, but couldn't turn in time. His car smashed into the side of the Lawrence vehicle which was knocked 57 feet down the road and into a culvert. Timothy Oakley, 4, of Glenn St., Roseburg, suffered a broken arm and was hospitalized along with Eddie Ware, 22, of rural Roseburg, who suffered a cut lip and multiple bruises. They were passengers in the Lawrence vehicle. The driver was treated for shock and a cut over his right eye. Rogan suffered lacerations to his right hand. Both vehicles were extensively damaged. At 7:40 p.m. Saturday Mrs. Leona May Link of Lookingglass Rd. was treated for apparent neck and back injuries after the car in which she was riding was hit from behind by another vehicle on 99th St. south of the city. She was a passenger in a station wagon, driven by Ken W. Barney, 36, of Winston, along with three other persons. The sheriff's office reported Barney's car was overtaken from the rear by a 1951 coupe driven by John McDowell, 37, of Dillard. He had just turned onto the highway from Tipton Rd. and was going about 20 miles an hour, he said, when the McDowell vehicle hit his car. About the same time Saturday night, Chester Dale Cook, 41, of Myrtle Point, was hospitalized in Roseburg after his motorcycle went into a spin and crashed on Highway 42 west of Camas Valley. Sheriff's deputies reported Cook was not seriously injured, and was released from the hospital that night after treatment for bruises and contusions to his arms and body.

Linklater said he will ask the Washington County grand jury to investigate the home's security standards for its inmates. The request for the probe, he said, started from the case of an escapee from the home who admitted setting a \$50,000 fire in a church here. That inmate, the district attorney said, has escaped from the home 25 times in the past 5 1/2 years.

Grandma Moses Spends 98th Birthday At Home

EAGLE BRIDGE, N.Y. (AP)—Famed painter Grandma Moses, feeble and suffering from arthritis, spent her 98th birthday Sunday carefully guarded from the public. Grandma was taken to an undisclosed spot for the day. Lloyd Moses, a son, said it was done to protect her from excitement and from the curious who might try to visit her. Anna Mary Robertson Moses—Grandma's real name—gained world renown in her late years with paintings of scenes in this rural area close to the Vermont state line where she has lived all her life.

White Students Return To Class At Van Buren

Tension eased somewhat today in the South's explosive school integration process. White students who boycotted the Van Buren, Ark., High School last week in protest against enrollment of 13 Negroes re-entered school today. The Negroes remained away pending court action started by the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People to have the Van Buren School Board cited for contempt. The NAACP charged the board failed to protect Negro students. An NAACP attorney who filed the contempt proceedings indicated he would ask for immediate action on the petition. Nashville, Tenn., city schools began their second year of integrated classes today with three new Negro first graders. This gave the white schools 18 Negroes in first grade classes and 15 in the second grade at seven schools. There were no disturbances at the integrated schools today.

Hears Protests

In Virginia, a U.S. district judge arranged to hear protests by parents of 30 Negro pupils whose applications to enter Charlottesville schools were rejected. The judge also may sign an injunction restraining the Warren County Board of Education from refusing 22 Negroes admission to a white high school.

Great Britain, Iceland Dispute Effects Noted

SEATTLE (AP)—The dispute between Great Britain and Iceland over fishing rights may have important ramifications for North-west fishermen, Rep. Thomas M. Pelly (R-Wash.) warned Saturday. Action by the U.S. State Department, at this time may be tantamount to a "sell out" of U.S. interests, the congressman charged. "According to information reaching me through what I consider to be reliable sources, our State Department, while outwardly supporting historic fishing rights, is quietly preparing to make so-called concessions amounting to a sell-out of our fishing industries," Pelly said. Pelly said the State Department is urging Britain to use caution in the dispute and pointed out that if Iceland enforces a 12-mile limit, Canada probably will do likewise. Sixty per cent of the Puget Sound catch, Pelly said, is taken within 12 miles of Canadian shore and enforcement of the 12-mile limit would prove disastrous to U.S. fishermen.

Knife And Fork Club Suspends Operations

The Uniqua Valley Knife and Fork Club has suspended its operations for an indefinite period and has canceled this year's schedule of speakers and meetings due to lack of sufficient members. Officers said there were about 165 couples in the organization during its first three years, but membership has dropped in the last two years to such an extent that it is financially impossible to continue the program. The women have been the club's fifth year if it had continued. Dues already paid for the 1958-59 season will be refunded in the next few days, officers said. Directors said they expect to attempt a reorganization in a year or two.

Man's Beaten Body Taken From Willamette River

PORTLAND (AP)—The body of a man who had been beaten to death was recovered from the Willamette River here Sunday. Police said the man, Robert LeRoy Thompson, 24, apparently had been drinking with nine other men under a bridge here Saturday night when the fight started. They said Thompson had been slugged over the head several times, dragged to the water and tossed in. At the scene a blood-stained club and a broken, blood-smeared wine bottle were found. Police brought several men in for questioning. Thompson was a native of Adrian, Wash., who had been living in the waterfront area of Portland recently.

Indian Held After Wife Dies From Head Blows

THE DALLAS (AP)—A 55-year-old Warm Springs Indian was held in jail today after an autopsy disclosed his wife had been killed by blows on the head. Dist. Atty. Harry Hogan said the man, Douglas Jack admitted hitting his wife, Ethel, 50, over the head with a wine bottle in a drinking bout Saturday. Hogan said he is preparing a charge against Jack.

Singer Demonstrates He's The One And Only

WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Returning to his native Poland for the first time in 19 years, operatic tenor Jan Kiepura crossed two iron curtain frontiers yesterday without a passport. At the East Berlin airport the singer reported that his passport had been stolen. The authorities told him he could not continue his trip. "But I am Jan Kiepura," said the singer. "It is only you who tells us, please prove it to us," the official replied. "I can sing to you," said Kiepura, and did. The official let him pass.

Retired Man Found Dead In Hotel Room

Wilbert Oscar Patterson, 76, resident of a Roseburg hotel, was found dead in his room early Saturday afternoon by a hotel employee. City police and a coroner's party who investigated said Patterson was the apparent victim of a heart attack. He had been dead about 24 hours when found by Grace Hull, 828 SE Jackson St., a maid at the hotel. The victim's sister, Mrs. Sadie Haddell of Long Beach, Calif., was notified. Mrs. Hull called another maid and desk clerk George Jackson when she found Patterson lying across the bed in his room. His physician told Police Chief Vernon M. Murdoch Jr. that he had been prescribing drugs for the victim for a heart condition. Patterson was a retired railroad worker. He was born Sept. 11, 1881, at Lima, Ohio, and was married Dec. 10, 1910, to Mabel Good at Salt Lake City. She died in 1956. They came to Roseburg in 1922, and he made his home here since, except for a short time in California. Patterson was a past grand of the Odd Fellows Lodge and belonged to the Union Encampment and Riverside Grange. He had been an Odd Fellow for more than 40 years. Another sister, Mrs. Lulu Jones, Lima, Ohio, also was notified. Funeral services will be in the chapel of Long and rr Mortuary Wednesday at 11 a.m. with the Rev. Dr. Eugene Gerlitz of the First Baptist Church officiating. The body will be taken to Eugene for cremation and rites at Rest Haven Memorial Park.

Sutherland Schools Note Increase In Enrollment

An increase in school enrollment at Sutherland was apparent last week. At the end of the second day, 1,193 students had enrolled, compared to 1,175 last week. Registrations included: First six grades, 685; junior high school, 165; and high school, 343. There was 105 sophomores, largest class in the high school. Enrollment in the high school was expected to pick up after older students ended summer jobs. The Sutherland faculty was completed with the hiring of Donald Person to teach vocal music and English in the high school, according to correspondent Mrs. Sue Siskstrom. Person has a degree in music from the University of Portland. He recently returned to Oregon after spending considerable time in Europe. He formerly taught at Gates and St. Helens.

The performance was being televised nationally on the Ed Sullivan Show on CBS. Trenkler, 41, of Milton, Mass., was shot by St. Clare's Hospital where X-rays disclosed the fracture. He was not admitted to the hospital. The ice skating clown lost his grip while swinging through the air on a wire and flew into the stands. A spectator, Mrs. Emma Ratte, of Jersey City, N.J., suffered a slight arm cut when one of Trenkler's skate blades struck her as he came down in the aisle near her seat.

District Judge Reported Near Death In Accident

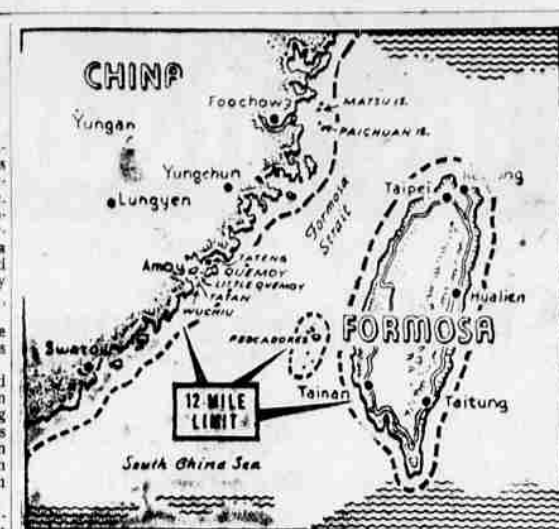
WOODLAND, Calif. (AP)—U.S. District Judge Samuel Driver of Pasco, Wash., was reported near death Sunday night from injuries received in a highway accident Friday. The 66-year-old Eastern Washington jurist was hit by a car when he left his own automobile and started across an arterial highway on foot to inspect a cornfield. The judge's son, Garth, who came to the Woodland Clinic Hospital from Washington, said his father has only brief flashes of consciousness. Airman Gives Up World Flight

BASTIA, Corsica (AP)—An American pilot attempting a round-the-world flight in a small plane decided today to give it up and fly home on a commercial airliner. Capt. Charles F. Banfe Jr., a 38-year-old Pan American World Airways pilot from Palo Alto, Calif., abandoned his try for a world record after his single-engine plane crashlanded in a Corsican vineyard Sunday night. Banfe said the fuel line went wrong as he headed toward Rome for his first stop since taking off from Idlewild Airport in New York at 10 a.m. Saturday. He said the plane was not seriously damaged. The British foreign office said today it "welcomes the readiness of the government of the People's Republic of China and the United States to resume their discussions on the issues involved in Formosa Strait. But government officials, conscious of threats to such key British interests as Hong Kong, were still highly concerned at the dangers of large-scale conflict. One experienced diplomat commented: "The resumption of the talks—if arranged—should not be taken automatically to foreshadow a settlement. "The factors that created the recent tensions still exist."

Red Chinese Reopen Bombarding Of Quemoy

(Continued From Page One) escorting ships remained some seven miles off the Communist mainland. Peiping radio charged the American ships with violating Chinese waters and broadcast a "serious warning" from the Foreign Ministry. The warning was repeated again today. The furious air battle took place Sunday over the Formosa Strait, 23 miles east of the Tanghai base at which the Communists recently based 50 MIGs. Gen. Curtis LeMay, U. S. Air Force vice chief of staff, who arrived on Formosa, personally congratulated the Nationalist fighter pilots when they returned to Taoyuan air base south of Taipei. Verbal Attacks. Peiping radio kept up a steady stream of attacks on what it called "American military provocations" and reported rallies denouncing American moves in the Far East. Three million Chinese reportedly demonstrated in Peiping and a million in Shanghai. The Soviet Union, which has promised more aid to Red China in case of war, joined in the warnings. Moscow radio charged U. S. Secretary of State Dulles with trying to plunge the world into a nuclear war and warned that Red China has friends whose nerves and muscles are in excellent shape. The United States continued to strengthen its forces in the area. The 45,000-ton aircraft carrier Midway joined the 7th Fleet, and the Navy announced the 33,000-ton carrier Essex was due in a week or two and the 65,000-ton carrier Ranger around the end of the year. That would give the atom-armed fleet a total of seven flat-tops. In southern Formosa, U. S. and Nationalist Chinese Marines launched a mock invasion today in combined amphibious maneuvers involving 8,000 to 10,000 men. Peiping radio said they were preparing to attack the mainland.

Board Asks \$5 1/2 Million For Oregon Tech Plans

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Board of Education wants a \$5 1/2 million dollar building program started at Oregon Technical Institute in Klamath Falls. The recommendation will be made to the Oregon Legislature. As a Saturday meeting, the board said the money would be used to construct a dormitory, cafeteria, family housing unit, administration center, allied arts building and science and engineering building.

Miss America Advises Caution About The Future

NEW YORK (AP)—Mary Ann Mobley launched her glamor year as Miss America 1959 today on a note of caution. "A girl never knows" about the future, she said, as she listed as her biggest ambition the completion of her college education. The cinderella choir singer from Brandon, Miss., who won the Atlantic City beauty pageant Saturday night, said she will go back to school at the end of her reign, even if Hollywood or Broadway should open an opportunity for acting. A practical princess, Miss Mobley said a girl still has to be educated for that uncertain future "even if she's fortunate enough to get married." The 21-year-old college senior displayed a flair for tact and regal poise in answering the barrage of questions sent her way as she held her first big-town press conference. She wore the strapless, pink nylon tulle bouffant evening gown of the pageant finales for the session and obligingly accompanied photographers to the roof of her hotel for pictures. She sipped orange juice as she pondered queries. Her winsome smile left her face fleetingly when she was asked about racial integration. "I think that's a very difficult problem," she replied. "I don't have any ideas on how to solve it." Miss Mobley said President Eisenhower and other national leaders are "better qualified to seek solution of what she called "an unfortunate situation for both parties concerned." Another question concerned the writings of William Faulkner, Mississippi-born Nobel prize winner. Committee Wants Teeth In Tax Law

DEPOE BAY (AP)—The Legislative Interim Taxation Committee intends to put teeth into the personal property tax law. The committee, meeting here to try to draw up final recommendations for the next Legislature, said it favors a bill that would impose a 10 per cent penalty on anyone failing to file a personal property tax return on time, and a 25 per cent penalty for failure to come within 90 per cent of taxable value on a merchandise inventory. Under the present law a penalty for failure to file a return is applied only after the tax assessor issues a warning. The committee said its proposed bill also will call for taxation of mobile equipment, in addition to the \$25 plate fee now paid.
