

Americans, Chinese Nationalists Hold Battle Maneuvers

Invasion Beach Fangliao, Formosa (AP)—American and Chinese Nationalist Marines stormed ashore here today in a battle-ready amphibious war game. The exercise is being staged only a little more than 100 miles from the Quemoy Island front.

Under protective guns of the U.S. 7th and Chinese fleets, seven waves of troops, tanks, guns and heavy equipment struck shortly after dawn on a 2,000-yard front against a mythical enemy entrenched near the southern tip of Formosa.

Vice Adm. Wallace Beakley, U.S. 7th Fleet commander, watched the long-planned operation—called by Peiping radio a provocative maneuver—from his flagship, the heavy cruiser Helena.

About 1,500 Chinese and American observers watched this first combined amphibious operation by the two nations.

The attack unfolded in the early dawn. More than 20 ships wheeled into line for a simulated broadside bombardment of an enemy force entrenched in strength 25 miles south of Kaohsiung.

U.S. Marine Fury jets screamed over the dark sands at daybreak in low strafing sweeps during the exercise.

Nose Of British Rocket Recovered Near Target

CANBERRA, Australia (AP)—Supply Minister Athol Townley announced that the nose of Britain's Black Knight rocket was recovered today at almost exactly the spot for which its landing had been predicted.

The rocket, with which Britain hopes to put an earth satellite in orbit, was successfully fired Sunday night in south central Australia.

Townley gave neither the specific altitude the rocket reached nor how far it traveled.

Father Watches As Children Hit By Lightning

BIG BEAR LAKE, Calif. (AP)—Lightning crackled down from a sudden storm and killed two children and injured a third while their father, former All America football player Bob Reinhard, watched helplessly from a skiff on the lake.

A moment after the tragedy Sunday the storm ended and this lake resort in the San Bernardino Mountains was bathed in sunshine.

The lightning bolt exploded into a plywood shack on the lake's shore where the three youngsters had ducked out of the downpour.

Reinhard, one of the University of California's greatest linemen and later a professional star with the old Los Angeles Rams and Los Angeles Rams, was fishing on the lake with his fourth child, Robert 10.

Reinhard rowed ashore and hurried to the splintered and still smoldering shack. He bundled the three children into his station wagon—without realizing that two were dead—and drove to a nearby hospital.

Lawrence, 7, and Trudy Lee, 13, were pronounced dead on arrival. Their sister, Diana, 14, was badly burned about the neck and reported partially paralyzed. Her condition was listed as critical.

Reinhard, manager of a Los Angeles automotive works, had been vacationing with his family at the lake for two weeks.

Icelanders Vow Not To Retreat From Demands

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP)—Premier Hermann Jonasson told a news conference today they will never retreat from Iceland's decision to maintain a 12-mile territorial limit.

Since Sept. 1, British trawlers, guarded by frigates, have been fishing within the 12-mile limit. Six small coast guard vessels have been harrying British trawlers and interfering with their fishing.

Britain contends Iceland's extension of her territorial waters to 12 miles is an encroachment on the open seas. Iceland says she extended the limits and barred fishing in the zone to preserve breeding grounds and safeguard her chief economic asset.

Jonasson read his statement, his first since the new limit went into effect.

"More than 1,000 years ago," he said, "our forefathers crossed the ocean, facing many difficulties to settle in this country. We learned to meet all difficulties with unflinching endurance."

Looking up from his text and raising his voice, he declared: "There are, in spite of everything, many fighters for justice in the world, and they have sharp pens and powerful words."

Elwin King reported on the flood control meeting and stated that plans are to clean existing channels, build reservoir and construct new channels where necessary in the entire Sutherlin water shed.

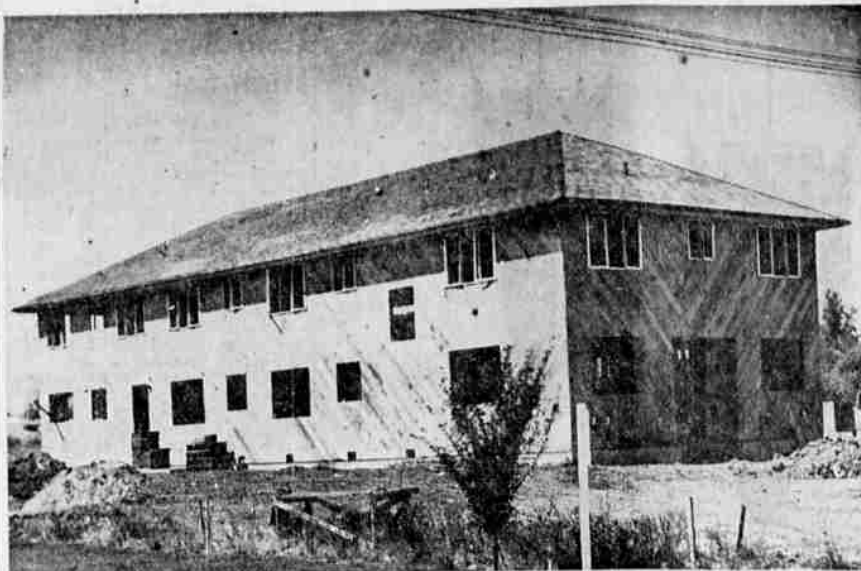
Mr. Edwards, an attorney from Eugene, explained existing water laws and said forming a water control district is the next step.

Police said a black eye, bruised nose and bent eyeglasses made it appear she had been beaten. Missing were her cash box and her automobile.

The car was found today at SW Front and Hall St. Fingerprint experts went to work on the vehicle.

Detectives said a friend of Mrs. Balfour told them that the missing man was at the service station Monday, the day before Mrs. Balfour last was seen.

Police were called to the place Friday when neighbors remarked on her disappearance. Her fully clothed body was found on a bed.

The coroner's office said the cause of death should be determined soon as a result of the post-mortem examination.

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Navy-Marine Stadium Fund Drive Over Top

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP)—The Navy announced Saturday its drive to raise three million dollars for a huge Navy-Marine Corps memorial stadium is over the top.

The Naval Academy Athletic Assn. said a total of \$3,100,000 had been received by Aug. 29 for the 29,000 seat double-deck structure, under construction in West Annapolis.

It is to be completed for the opening of Navy's 1959 football season.

The association said Navy and Marine Corps personnel, including both active and retired members, contributed \$1,700,000.

An additional \$800,000 came from public donations. The NAAC, a non-profit organization which finances the Navy sports program, had made an original donation of one million.

Congress does not provide funds for such athletic facilities at the service academies.

Nadler Locked In Two Ties On TV Quiz Show

NEW YORK (AP)—Teddy Nadler, top money winner in TV quiz show history, is locked in two ties on CBS' "The \$64,000 Challenge."

Next week Nadler, who has won \$253,000, resumes a contest on British kings and queens with Sir Kenneth Guinness of London. They tied at \$18,000 Sunday night.

Nadler also was held even by John Feltham, an elementary school teacher from Huntington Station, N.Y.

Feltham and Nadler, a former St. Louis civil service clerk, are tied at \$8,000 on baseball questions. This match also will be resumed next week.

The 23-year-old actress met Distel on the Riviera this summer. Brigitte was divorced last December from Roger Vadim, who directed the films that made her famous.

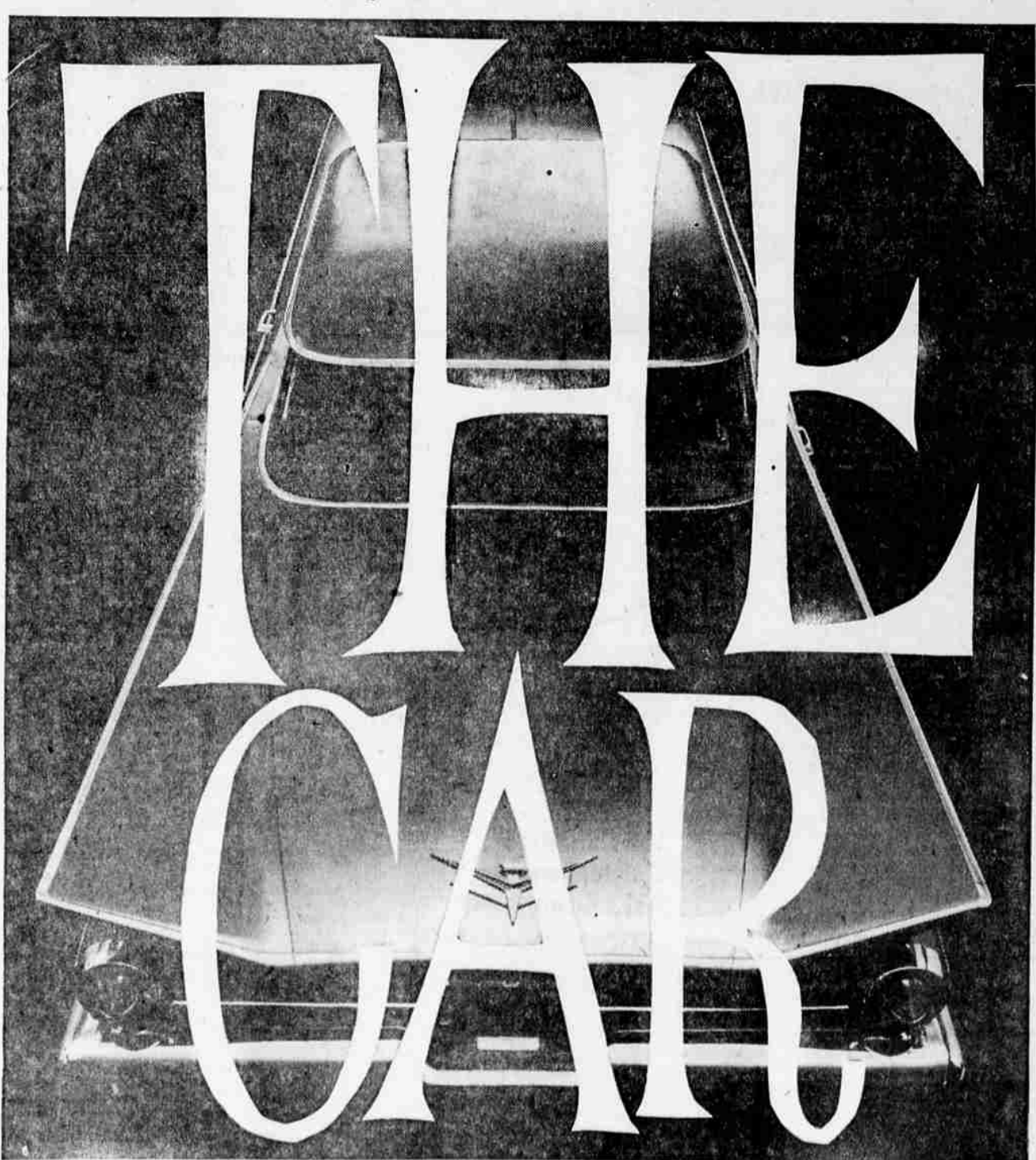
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
