Democrats Turn Out Strong In Primaries

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Arizona, Colorado, Utah, and Washington.

These were the major results: 1. Sen. Spessard Holland defeated former Sen. Claude Pepper in the 38-year-old liberal's bid for a return to the U.S. Senate in the Florida Democratic primary, equivalent to election in that state.

2. Gov. Ernest McFarland of Arizona was en route to clearing the first hurdle in his attempt to return to the Senate by rolling up an early 2-1 lead over Democratic National Committeeman Stephen Langmade. McFarland's November opponent would be Republican Sen. Barry Goldwater, the man who ousted him in 1952. Goldwater was renominated without opposition.

3. Two senators — Arthur Watkins (R-Utah) and William Proxmire (D-Wis.) — handily beat back intraparty challenges but may be faced with serious trouble in November because of heavy vote totals polled by the opposition parties in the primaries. Watkins will be pitted against Democrat Frank E. Moss and former Gov. J. Bracken Lee, running as an independent. Proxmire, who was named to GOP Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's seat in a special election last year, will see a six-year term against Roland E. Steinle, nominated without opposition by the Republicans.

4. Rep. Coya Knutson (D-Minn.), 9th dist., the lady legislator who defied her husband's demand that she give up politics and come home, was locked in a tight struggle with Marvin Evenson in Minnesota's 8 Senate seats.

Tuesday's contests involving 8 Senate seats, 38 House berths and 7 governorships completed the 1958 primary elections except for Georgia and Rhode Island.

Georgia comes up today, holding a Democratic primary for governor and 10 House seats. Rhode Island has a split deal primary—the Democrats holding their next Wednesday and the Republicans Sept. 25.

A roundup of other major primary contests Tuesday: Vermont — Rep. Winston L. Prouty won a decisive victory over former Gov. Lee Emerson in their race for the Republican nomination for the Senate seat being vacated by Sen. Ralph E. Flanders. Prouty had the backing of Flanders.

Massachusetts — Sen. John F. Kennedy and Gov. Foster Furcolo won Democratic renomination without contest. Republicans tapped Statehouse Speaker Charles G. Gibbs to be substitute candidate for governor in place of Atty. Gen. George F. Engdahl, who died 10 days ago.

New Hampshire—Wesley Powell finished ahead in a five-man race for the GOP gubernatorial nomination, but a recount appears a splitting 537-vote margin over former Gov. Hugh Gregg. The other three candidates lagged far behind. On the Democratic side, Bernard Boutin outdistanced John Shaw in the governor's primary.

Colorado—Gov. Steve McNichols won Democratic renomination without opposition and State Rep. Palmer Burch had clear sailing in gaining the GOP assignment to oppose McNichols in November.

Washington — Sen. Henry M. Jackson won a hands-down triumph over Mrs. Alice F. Bryant in the Democratic primary. William B. Bantz has no foes in his bid for the Republican senatorial nod.

The group attended the international conference of the society meeting in conjunction with the Scandinavian Musical Educators' Conference at Copenhagen. Sessions continued for a week. Myrtle Creek Defers Action On New City Hall

Wanting more time to study plans and specifications for the new city hall, the Myrtle Creek City Council Tuesday night decided to take another look at them next Tuesday. If everything appears in order, the job will be let for bids at that time.

At the same session, the council will award a contract for wiring the building for the new chlorinator for the water system. This had originally been scheduled for Tuesday's meeting, reports News-Review Correspondent Ruth Evans.

The council awarded the gasoline contract to Shell Oil Co., which offered regular gasoline for 25.1 cents per gallon. The contract takes effect Oct. 1. Only other bidder was Standard Oil offering the fuel for 25.6 cents.

A mutual fire aid agreement with other central Douglas County cities was signed by the council. Under terms of the agreement, fire departments will send equipment to the assistance of communities battling blazes.

A property boundary dispute which has tangled a piece of city property and some owned by Dr. Richard Williams remains knotted. A proposal by Williams was presented to the council but was turned down. He offered to make a trade in order to settle the problem, but the council declined and made a counterproposal. Williams hasn't said whether this meets his approval.

Reds Keep Up Bombardment Of Tiny Island

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — Bad weather kept Chinese Nationalist supply ships from trying to reach Quemoy today but didn't stop the Communist bombardment of the offshore island.

It was the second straight day that inclement weather in the Formosa Strait halted movement of ammunition and other supplies under U.S. naval escort to the beleaguered outpost.

In Taipei, sharp resentment was stirred by the proposal of Sen. John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.) that the United States persuade the Nationalists to withdraw from the Quemoy and Matsu islands during the projected U.S. diplomatic talks with Red China.

An official of Cabinet rank who would not be quoted by name said, "We'll never abandon Quemoy and Matsu. No matter what happens, we'll hold on and fight for them. We've made our position clear time and again and it's unchangeable."

Jumpoff Points

The Nationalists regard the offshore islands as jumpoff points for the invasion they say they will launch someday to retake the mainland. Giving up the islands would imply giving up the dream of reconquest.

Red artillery opened against the Quemoy at midnight and by 9:20 a.m. had battered them with 4,618 shells, the Nationalist Defense Ministry said. The fire landed in short but savage barrages on Quemoy, Little Quemoy and the Taitan islands.

The heaviest bombardment was trained on Quemoy's Satao beach, the island's best landing point. No supplies are known to have reached the besieged island since Red shells blew up an ammunition ship on the beach Monday.

The Defense Ministry refused to confirm or deny reports that supplies were being parachuted to the islands at night.

The U.S. 7th Fleet, which has been escorting national ships to the three-mile limit off Quemoy, was bolstered by the arrival of a third cruiser, the Los Angeles, to join the Columbus and Vice Adm. Wall M. Beakley's flagship, the Helena.

News Conference

The Laconia Citizen story said its information came "from a Washington officeholder, quite friendly to Gov. Adams" who asked that his identity not be disclosed.

Coya Knutson's Opponent Concedes Defeat In Vote

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Congresswoman Coya Knutson's opponent conceded defeat today after a down-to-the-wire battle for the Democratic nomination that uncovered a statewide Democratic show of power in the Minnesota primary.

Returns from 444 of 641 precincts in the 9th District gave the 43-year-old ex-schoolmarm 14,748 votes to 12,243 for Marvin Evenson, who campaigned with the support of Mrs. Knutson's husband.

Border Patrolmen Intercept Forces Headed For Cuba

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Border patrolmen, customs and FBI agents, sheriff's deputies and city police intercepted an expeditionary force headed for Cuba early today and arrested more than 30 uniformed men.

Charles E. Wyatt, supervising agent in charge of customs at Miami, said he had reports 31 men were arrested; but 34 were held in jail and one was hospitalized with superficial wounds.

Agents fired several shots in the air to halt the expeditionary force aboard the motor vessel Harpoon when it attempted to outrun a border patrol vessel and leave the harbor at Port Everglades.

"They put up resistance, but did not return the fire," Wyatt said. "They threw munitions overboard, jammed the engine and tried to sink the vessel."

Wyatt said the activity had been under surveillance for several days and it definitely was intended for Cuba, where rebel forces have been battling the government of President Fulgencio Batista for many months.

The boat was owned by Capt. Bill Wright, about 60, who escaped, Wyatt said.

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raise of 25 cents an hour. The wage offer now will have to be ratified by members of both unions. Affected are about 25,000 IWA members and about 50,000 men who belong to the LSWU.

The wage offer was made by the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, the Willamette Valley Operators Assn. and the Plywood Operators Assn.

To Set Pattern It was expected, though, to set the pattern for later union negotiations with several large companies, which bargain independently, including the big Weyerhaeuser Timber Co.

The LSWU strike had affected operations at the Valsert Lumber Co., Pope and Talbot Co., mills at St. Helena and Oakridge, Ore., and at Port Gamble, Wash.

International Paper Co. at Vaughn, Ore., and Longview, St. Regis Paper Co. at Glenwood and Klickitat, Wash., and Hines Lumber Co. operations at Baker, Bates, Sebec, and Hines.

The present base wage scales of the unions are \$1.93 an hour. Earlier, the LSWU announced it had reached accord on new contract terms with the Simpson Logging Co. in both Oregon and Washington.

Terms of that agreement, however, were not disclosed.

13 Servicemen Killed In Crash

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Thirteen servicemen were killed yesterday when an Air Force C-47 transport plane carrying 20 persons faltered at 800 feet on take-off, plunged to the ground and burned.

The Air Force first announced that 12 of 19 aboard the craft had died. While probing through the twisted wreckage early today, Air Force investigators found another body.

The seven survivors, all treated at the Elmendorf AFB hospital and all reported in satisfactory condition, were identified by the Air Force as: Capt. Robert L. Taylor, Lt. Col. William W. Cowan, Capt. H. J. Schwartz, Capt. R. G. May, J. Rudi and A. C. Ernest, M. Conrad, S. St. L. D. Arner, A. J. C. W. ner, all stationed at Elson AFB, Fairbanks. Their home towns were not available.

The names of the 12 killed were not released.

Hot, Dry Summer Brought Record Number Of Persons To City's Swimming Pool

The long, hot summer saw 42,984 swimmers taking to the water at the Roseburg municipal pool. They paid \$5,000.84 for the privilege of cooling off.

This evidence of an "unusually hot summer" was revealed in a report given to the City Council this week. The attendance set a record for the pool, according to Robert Harris, park commission chairman.

July was the big month for the pool which opened June 14 and closed Sept. 3. That month, 12,682 persons used the pool in the afternoons and 6,456 evenings. August saw 10,811 daytime swimmers and 4,584 in the evening.

Popularity Continued Despite the mid-month opening, June did all right. There were 5,834 paid admissions during afternoons and 2,443 evenings. Popularity of the pool didn't diminish until the closing days which saw only 219 swimmers using the facilities.

The park and recreation commission activities report notes that the Roseburg swimming team which was organized and trained at the pool competed in five meets. Two of them, a regional and a statewide, were held at the Roseburg pool.

Peewee baseball at Finley field opened July 15 and closed Sept. 1 with an attendance of 352 boys per day for 65 days, or a total of 390 hours.

The nine-hole golf course at Stewart Park opened about June 20 and closed Sept. 2. Although rough and unfinished, it attracted 953 players who paid \$973 in greens fees. The concession netted \$1,124.71, of which the city received five per cent or \$56.24.

Ball Park Finished

The baseball field at the park was completed in time for five American Legion games, the report points out. Stands with a total seating capacity of 1,643 are being completed and are slated for painting this fall.

The field has been regraded and will be seeded to give it a wall-to-wall carpet look," the commission informed the City Council.

The report concluded with the statement that the tennis courts on NE Commercial Avenue have been resurfaced and a new fence built.

The officials will spend the weekend in Roseburg and will enplane Monday morning for Baker, where they will undertake further inspection.
