Brighter Economic Picture Seen In Figures Supplied By Employment Service

A general brightening of Douglas County's economic picture in August is reflected in figures supplied by the Oregon State Employment Service.

Job placements made through the Roseburg office in August exceeded those of both July and August of 1957. And new claims activities decreased.

Meanwhile, reports from several local merchants also indicated an increase in retail sales, said the state agency. This rise came despite problems stemming from labor difficulties in the transportation industry, noted the service.

A slight increase also was noted in construction activities. The City of Roseburg issued only 17 permits but the valuation was \$38,429—an improvement over last month as well as a year ago.

Labor In Balance

Labor supply and demand appears to be somewhat more in balance than in the recent past. But the service further noted that possible job shortages might occur in the skilled and semi-skilled occupational categories.

Some job openings are expected to be created this month as students who have been working during the summer return to school. An adequate supply of workers is available for the prune and walnut harvests, which will commence.
