## Eagles 12, Powers 0

The Yoncalla Eagles posted their first win of the 1958 football season Friday by downing the Powers Crusaders 12-0 in a non-counter tilt played at Powers.

In gaining the win, the Eagles also regained some measure of respect after having been humbled by the Crusaders last year. The two teams met in the Class B quarter-finals in 1957, with Powers winning easily.

This time, Rod Anderson's Eagle piled up a total of 291 yards gained while holding the Crusaders to just 11. First downs favored the Eagles 14-5.

Yoncalla scored its touchdowns in the second and fourth quarters. The initial score came through the air as Ron Revelle passed to Ken Bowman from the Powers 13.

The Eagles had begun a drive on the Cruiser 35 and used 12 plays punching out the needed yardage.

The fourth quarter tally capped a 41-yard drive which required eight plays. The drive included a pass play good for 29 yards and a first down on the Powers one.

Olan Wiley pitched a perfect strike to end Jim Booth and Wiley then carried in to the score.

Bowman was the big ground gainer for the Eagles, with a 118 total and another was Doug Holman with a 108 total. Outstanding in the line on both offense and defense were tackle Ron Curtwright, center Bill Snyder and guard Phil Edin.

**Houston Has Definite Plan For Big Time**

FIFTH IN SERIES HOUSTON (AP)—Businessmen hoping to bring major league baseball to Houston say they have a definite plan that will be developed only on an orderly basis.

"We have applications on file with both the National and American leagues but the proper time for formal appearances before the leagues will come when we have our own house a little bit more in order," said Craig Cullinan Jr., head of a syndicate seeking the franchise.

Cullinan's group spearheaded a successful campaign that saw Harris County residents on July 26 approve a 20-million-dollar revenue bond proposal for a county stadium and sports center. Cullinan, however, emphasizes that much preliminary work still must be done.

"The way I look at it is that the major league people have a right to expect that we prove to them that we mean business," said Cullinan, an heir to an oil fortune.

"We intend to do that and right now we face a double-barreled situation—getting sufficient leases to support the stadium and getting the stadium built."

"The new County Board of Park Commissioners already has architects and engineers at work studying possible sites and developing other studies," he said.

Bush Stadium, home of the class A Texas League Houston Blue Sox, seats only 12,000 and its parking facilities are limited.

Houston frequently has been among the leaders in minor league attendance in this year is expected to be only about 120,000 compared with 152,000 a year ago.

Major leaguers in Houston would play before fans from throughout the giant industrial area that dots the upper Texas Gulf Coast. Houston is the heart of the area and has an estimated 910,000 residents. There will be nearly three million within a radius of 150 miles of the new stadium.

Major league baseball would receive sharp competition from such other athletic events in Houston as collegiate football and boxing.

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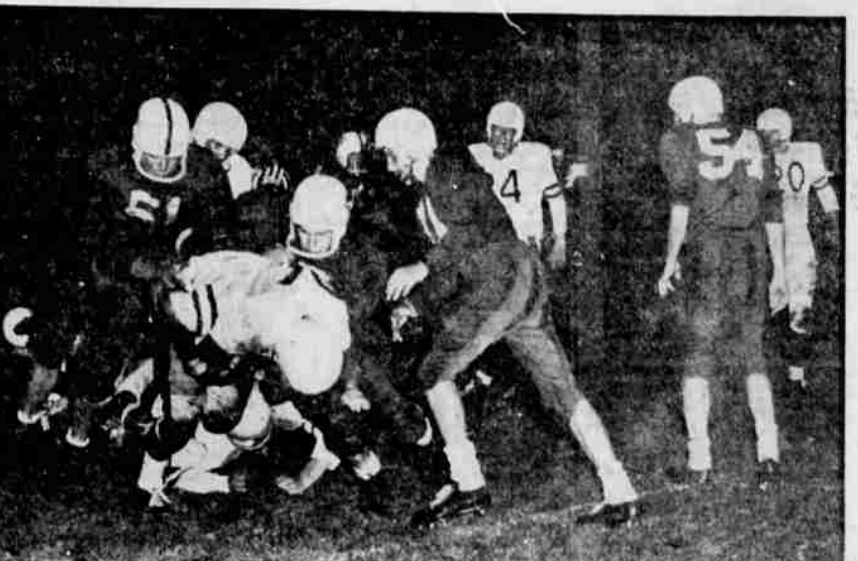
