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Space Rocket Booster Said Possible Within One Year

DETROIT (AP)—A model team of rockets with power enough to boost a one-ton capsule toward Mars could be within reach in little more than a year.

That's the prediction from the men who make powerhouses for most of the major U.S. military missiles.

Scientists at Rocketdyne Division of North American Aviation, Inc., are working on two contracts for huge rocket complexes of 1 to 1 1/2 million pounds thrust.

Either could boost a Mars-bound space bullet or land a 2,000-pound package on the moon.

Would Be Short Cut

Spokesmen for Rocketdyne, here for a meeting of the American Rocket Society, told newsmen that the latest contract announced last week by the Army, would be a sort of short cut. It calls for clustering several rocket engines like those that power U.S. 1,500-mile ballistic missiles such as the Thor and Jupiter.

It is the basic Rocketdyne engine that powers most of the U.S. missiles in operation or nearing operation. The engine develops 150,000 pounds of thrust. Ten of these in a proper cluster could develop 1 1/2 million pounds of thrust.

The other contract for a Thor rocket engine at Rocketdyne was let this summer by the Air Force. It calls for developing from scratch a new rocket engine with

Roseburg police cited a 15-year-old youth Sunday for violation of Oregon's basic traffic law after the car he was driving hit a parked vehicle on SE Jackson St.

The driver was Scott Lloyd Crenshaw, R. 1, Roseburg. His learner's permit was only two months old.

Police reported he was driving south on Jackson when he apparently went out of control and hit a 1956 parked sedan. Crenshaw said he "glanced around" just before the collision.

Damage to the parked vehicle was estimated at \$500, and \$250 to the Crenshaw car. The accident occurred about 6:30 p.m. Sunday.

TANKER RELOADED

PORTLAND (AP)—A tanker finally made it to Portland's upper harbor after a Monday after a few hours ground in the Willamette River.

The tanker W. H. Berg was en route to the Portland General Electric Co. diesel power generating plant to unload 77,500 barrels of oil. Rivermen said the tanker was drawing 29 feet of water, and the channel depth was 28 1/2 feet at low tide.

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Labor Party Leader Strikes At Ike's Policy

LONDON (AP)—Socialist opposition leader H. G. Gaitskell said today that U.S. involvement in a war with Red China over the disputed offshore islands would likely undermine the North Atlantic Alliance.

Gaitskell, in a major opposition policy statement, claimed that complete obscurity surrounded the position of the British government in the Far East crisis and declared this is endangering the Western Allies.

The leader of the Labor party, which opposed Britain's intervention in Egypt two years ago, claimed "the Quemoy situation has opened up a great gulf between official American policy and public opinion in Britain and Western Europe."

Takes Issue With Ike

Gaitskell, addressing a Foreign Press Assn. luncheon, took issue with a statement by President Eisenhower in his nationwide broadcast last week that if the United States intervened to defend Quemoy this would not be for Quemoy alone.

Said Gaitskell: "No one really believes that the evacuation of some islands four miles from the China coast can possibly be relevant in a military sense to the defense of Formosa which is 80 to 100 miles away."

McMillan Supports U.S.

The opposition leader's statement followed Prime Minister Macmillan's refusal Monday to tell the United States Congress under no circumstances would Britain ever try to defend Quemoy.

Macmillan interrupted his vacation to answer Gaitskell's proposal. He told the Labor leader in a letter the British government strongly supports "our American friends" in the Formosa Strait crisis.

President Okays Lemley's Demise

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP)—President Eisenhower today approved retirement from active service for U.S. Dist. Judge Harry J. Lemley. It was Lemley's decision granting a delay in school integration at Little Rock, Ark., that led to an overruling go-ahead by the U.S. Supreme Court.

The summer White House announced that Judge Lemley requested retirement for reasons of impaired health. He is past his eligible retirement age—70 years.

Eisenhower's approval of retirement is retroactive to Sept. 5, the date the judge requested that he be relieved.

The President wrote Judge Lemley thanking him for his years of service as a member of the federal judiciary. Eisenhower also expressed hope that relief from active duty will lead to improved health.

Lemley was appointed to the federal bench May 11, 1939.

WASHINGTON (AP)—India today signed an 85-million-dollar loan agreement with the World Bank for the development of the government-owned railway system.

Two private banks participating in the loan to the extent of half a million dollars each are the First Pennsylvania Banking & Trust Co. of Philadelphia, and the New York agency of The Chartered Bank with headquarters in London and operations in India.

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Steelworkers Give McDonald Vote Of Confidence

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—United Steelworkers delegates turned to convention business today after giving a vote of confidence to David J. McDonald, the union president.

The vote, accompanied by a demonstration, was carried without dissent. Opponents of the incumbent leadership remained silent.

Donald C. Barick of McKeesport, Pa., leader of the rebel group, described the demonstration of support for 55-year-old McDonald as a rehearsed farce.

"The rank and file is damn mad about the way this thing has been rigged and by the time we get through with McDonald he'll be a mighty sorry boy," Barick said. His group called itself the Dues Protest Committee.

Supporters Of McDonald

Supporters of McDonald cited him as a labor statesman who had brought great gains to the 1,200,000-member U.S.W.

The show of confidence in McDonald began with the reading of a resolution and developed into a parade of hundreds of placard-carrying delegates marching with band music to the stage to shake his hand.

The vote marked the third time in the opening session of the U.S.W.'s convention that expected opposition to union policy failed to develop. The others were on convention procedure.

Orlando Negro Enters Florida School Of Law

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP)—George H. Starke, an Orlando Negro, registered as a University of Florida law student today. He is the first of his race to be admitted to the school.

There was no disturbance as Starke, a business administration graduate of Morehouse College in Atlanta, slipped in a side door of the law school.

He took his place with white students waiting to register and was given a welcoming handshake by David Levy of Jacksonville. Levy is a campus leader and a former editor of the Florida Alligator, the university newspaper.

Starke, an Air Force veteran, is the son of Dr. George H. Starke, Sanford physician, and Mrs. Mattie L. Starke, librarian at Jones High School for Negroes, Orlando.

Some 50 white students were seated in the same room with Starke as registration got underway. None occupied places immediately beside him.

Starke's enrollment follows a federal district court ruling last June that Negroes may not be barred from university graduate schools because of their color.

Richard Hamblen Escapes Injuries In Car Accident

Richard Hamblen, 27-year-old Sutherlin resident, escaped a one-car accident early this morning with minor injuries at the Sutherlin turnoff from Highway 99.

State police reported his 1953 sedan was crumpled like "tin foil" when it hit a light pole on the left side of the access road.

Hamblen received a bruised shoulder and lacerated nose in the crash. He was released after treatment at a Roseburg hospital.

His car was "smashed and torn," the door ripped off, windshield knocked out and the motor lammed back against the firewall, police said. There was no apparent reason for the 1:45 a.m. accident. It was reported.

Grace Kelly's Father Names Union In Suit

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—John B. Kelly, father of Princess Grace of Monaco, has filed a \$100,000 suit against a union local. The suit alleges the union, in a pamphlet, questioned Kelly's honesty.

The millionaire contractor filed the suit Monday in Common Pleas Court against Local 1, Bricklayers, Masons and Plasterers International Union.

"If these press reports are based on facts," the note said, "Japan will be involved in American aggression against the People's Republic of China whether Japan likes it or not."

The note played on Japanese fears that this country might be open to reprisal attacks should the United States use its bases here to reinforce its troops in any shooting war with Communist China over the Nationalist-held offshore islands.

Flames Run Through Vacant Factory Building

PORTLAND (AP)—Flames ran through a vacant factory building at SW Front and Hall streets today, causing damage estimated by Jack Farber, fire investigator, at \$30,000.

The building was part of the plant in which Irwin Fireman Manufacturing Co. produced engines for Liberty ships in World War II. Fire swept through it in 1944, causing \$2,500,000 damage. That still is the record loss in a Portland fire.

FIFTH GENERATOR

PORTLAND (AP)—The fifth generator now is producing power at The Dalles Dam.

A sixth is to be installed next month.

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Reuther Still Ready To Strike; Offer Presented

DETROIT (AP)—United Auto Workers President Walter Reuther said today the union definitely will strike the Ford Motor Co. Wednesday if no contract settlement is made before then.

Reuther was asked about the chance of a postponement as he entered another bargaining session with Ford.

"The strike deadline stands," he declared. "We have no intention of postponing it, but we are still hopeful we can reach an agreement."

Ford, General Motors and Chrysler

Ford, General Motors and Chrysler yesterday made contract proposals to the union calling for a three-year agreement.

Reuther, who has personally taken part in the Ford talks the past week, described the Ford offer as "deficient in many respects." But he made counter proposals at a bargaining session last night and said the offer provided a basis for further discussion.

Reliable sources said the proposals included:

- 1—Continuation of extra payments when the cost of living goes up.
- 2—Extension of company-financed Supplemental Unemployment Benefit payments from 26 to 29 weeks with an increase in the \$25 maximum paid under the old contract.
- 3—Increase in pensions for retired workers from \$2.25 per month for each year worked to \$2.40.
- 4—Additional pay for skilled workers.
- 5—Continuation of the annual improvement factor under which workers receive a yearly increase of six cents an hour or 2 1/2 per cent of their hourly wage.

National Forest Sale Goes Above Appraised Price

An Umpqua National Forest timber sale Monday brought just \$30 more than the appraised price on 21,200,000 board feet. Umpqua Plywood Corp., Roseburg, was high bidder with a total bid of \$135,880.

The timber, located on 635 acres 59 miles northeast of Roseburg, on North Umpqua Ranger District, was appraised at \$135,850. The block contains 18,100,000 board feet of Douglas fir and western white pine, appraised at \$6.35 per thousand; 1,900,000 board feet of sugar pine at \$9.05 per thousand, and 1-200,000 feet of western hemlock and other species at \$3.19.

Umpqua Plywood bid \$3.15 per thousand board feet on the hemlock and other species group and the appraised price on Douglas fir, white pine and sugar pine.

There were five other bidders: E. T. Cone Logging Co., Roseburg; Pacific Plywood Co., Dillards; Holm Bros. Lumber Co., Glide; Douglas Veneer Co., Roseburg; and Douglas County Lumber Co., Roseburg.

The big Portland local of the Teamsters Union voted overwhelmingly for the contract Monday. Floyd Mendenhall, local secretary, said city pickup and delivery drivers were for it 3 to 1 and long-haul drivers by what he called a big majority.

Earlier, Medford, Eugene, Roseburg and Grants Pass drivers put their okeh on the proposal worked out by negotiators in San Francisco.

Monday night, other locals approved. At Pendleton, officials said it was by "a large majority."

Salem unionists vote Wednesday but individual members said today they thought the ballot would be favorable.

Wilford Long, representing the Truck Operators League of Oregon, said employers were voting as a unit in the 11 Western states and he declined to say the result of the vote cast at a Portland meeting Monday. Before the meeting, however, he said he assumed the employers would approve the offer which their negotiators had made.

Russians Agreeable To Talks To Avoid Surprise Attacks

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union has agreed to exploratory talks with the West on ways to prevent surprise attacks. An agreement by experts on a workable system could lead to political discussions on establishing safeguards against another Pearl Harbor.

In answer to a series of notes from President Eisenhower, the Kremlin agreed to meet in Geneva. The Soviet note handed to U. S. Charge d'Affaires Richard H. Davis proposed that eight-nation talks begin Nov. 10.

The meeting would follow the precedent of technical talks that ended Aug. 21 with East-West agreement on ways to police a nuclear weapons test ban. The United States, Britain and the Soviet Union are to begin political negotiations on an actual ban in Geneva Oct. 31.

The two related aspects of easing world tension, by possible nuclear weapons test ban and safeguards against surprise attack, contribute to Soviet Premier Khrushchev's on-again off-again drive for a summit conference. At the same time, they represent the type of thorough preparation that the United States insists must precede any meeting by heads of government.

Nationalists Get Supplies To Quemoy

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Nationalists got more supplies to the beleaguered Quemoy by plane and ship today, the Defense Ministry announced.

It was the third straight day the Nationalists supplied Little Quemoy by air. Seven cargo planes made the latest airdrop, the ministry said.

An LST—Landing Ship, Tank—rammed ashore on Quemoy and unloaded all its cargo in 20 minutes, the ministry reported. This would indicate the cargo may have been taken off the ship in amphibious vehicles.

The Nationalists succeeded in a ship landing on Quemoy Sunday after a week of failures.

Try To Crack Blockade

The new ship run to Quemoy came as the Nationalist reported they were working new attempts to crack the Red artillery blockade of the offshore islands.

New speedup methods of unloading Nationalist planes and ships at Quemoy and the parachuting of supplies to smaller islands near Quemoy were reported. More effective ways to get supplies through the curtain of shells are being sought, Premier Chen Cheng told parliament.

Four members of Parliament spearheaded a strong clamor in Taipei against the U.S.-Chinese Communist talks which began in Warsaw Monday and recessed until Thursday.

The talks are intended to ease Formosa Strait tension, possibly bringing an end to the bombardment of the Quemoy which began Aug. 23. But the four prominent legislators said the talks might adversely affect the morale of nationalist troops and civilians.

Governor Says Linfield Scientists Discover New Source Electrons

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Robert D. Holmes was conferring with defense officials in Washington, D.C., today, telling them about a new electronics discovery made at Linfield College.

The governor hopes it will be the basis of an electronics industry in Oregon.

Scientists at Linfield have discovered a new source of electrons, the governor said.
