Steelworkers Suspend Rules To Air Charges

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—The United Steelworkers today suspended rules of its ninth constitutional convention so it could take up immediately constitutional matters and bring a summering fight to the floor.

David J. McDonald, president of the 1,200,000-member union stepped to the stage of the convention and said "I accept the challenge."

McDonald said if there is anyone in the convention opposed to the present leadership they will be given a chance to speak.

The statements were directed to members of a dues protest committee that has been speaking out against the U.S.W. leaders outside of the convention hall.

Holt Lumber Puts New Dry Kiln In Operation At Plant

Something new in the way of lumber dry kilns is in operation at the Paul B. Holt Lumber Co. at Dillard.

The kiln, which is 35 by 60 feet in outside dimensions, has a capacity of 100,000 board feet of lumber. The appealing feature to lumbermen is its cost—about one-fourth that of others, according to Holt.

The hot air dryers were developed by Diamond Lumber Co. at Tillamook where experiments were carried on for about five years. Holt's dryer was purchased from Diamond Lumber which turns them out in pre-cut form. The Douglas County installation is the third one in the state outside of the developing firm's plant.

Built with exterior grade half-inch plywood, the building stands on a concrete slab. Overall cost was about \$20,000, Holt said.

Heat is supplied by an oil burner of commercial building size. The hot air blast is picked up by two large fans which circulate it through the stacked lumber. Every 15 minutes, the fans automatically reverse to change the direction of air flow. Temperature inside the structure is about 145 degrees and it takes four days to dry western hemlock, the material Holt presently is drying.

Enthusiastic about the kiln, Holt says it "proves out" the company probably will expand its drying operation—a new venture for Holt. Under construction alongside the dryer is a 40-by-64-foot dry shed for storing kiln-dried material.

Christmas Seal Sales Instruction At Meeting Here

Instructions in the conduct of this year's Christmas seal sale will be given in a Thursday meeting sponsored by the Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Assn. in the Elks Lodge.

Mrs. Edward Tauscher, executive secretary of the association, said it may turn into a regional conference. Christmas seal volunteers from Curry, Lane, Josephine and Klamath counties have been invited.

Douglas County has had a decentralized sale, with 23 area chairmen handling all details of the sale in the various communities.

Mrs. Tauscher said the meeting will be instructional and will deal with fundamental techniques of the sale as well as publicity and promotional methods before and during the campaign period.

Eighteen of the Douglas community chairmen have served in the past, and five will be new. Mrs. William Hutch again will serve as county chairman.

Jean LeVe, state seal sale chairman, and Mrs. Don James, state public relations chairman, will be here from Portland to help Mrs. Tauscher conduct the institute.

The morning session will start at 10 and last until 11:30. Luncheon will follow, and the afternoon meeting will be between 1 and 2 o'clock.

Teamster Board Sets Convention For February

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate Rackets Committee investigator testified today more than half of the votes that elected James R. Hoffa as president of the Teamsters Union were cast illegally.

Pierre Salinger, the investigator, said he could prove—by the union's own constitution—illegality of 26.2 per cent of the votes for Hoffa at an international convention in Miami last October.

The monitors promptly announced they would seek a court order to halt the move and to give them more authority in ordering what they consider needed reforms in the scandal-ridden union.

To End Monitoring.

Hoffa, announcing the board's action, described it as an effort to end the monitoring. He said he expects little or no opposition to his re-election as president.

Salinger based his charges of illegality in voting on the union's constitutional provisions governing election of delegates. Those provisions, he said, require that delegates be elected directly at membership meetings, or appointed by executive boards of locals with prior approval of the locals.

He noted the constitution also provides for selection of delegates after issuance of a convention call but 30 days in advance of the convention.

On the basis of those provisions, he said, only 48 per cent of the votes for Hoffa were legally cast and 56.2 per cent were definitely illegal.

Hoffa's election was attacked in court last fall as rigged—a situation that led to the monitoring. Chief monitor Martin J. O'Donoghue, after the call for the new convention, said the Teamsters have not taken enough steps to clear up corruption to justify another convention so soon.

Seating Red China Big Test For U. N.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The U.N.'s powerful Steering Committee today faced up to its first major test—the question of seating Red China—after the election of Lebanon's pro-Western Charles Malik as General Assembly president.

Debate over the Red China issue undoubtedly will drag in the dispute over Nationalist China's offshore islands in the Formosa Strait.

The United States was confident the U.N. will follow past procedure and vote to shelve the Peiping issue for another year. The Americans have made plain they are determined to prevent Red China from "shooting its way" into the U.N.

The Assembly opened Tuesday electing Lebanon's foreign minister, Malik, as its president.

Malik's 43-31 first-ballot victory over Sudan's nationalistic Foreign Minister Mohammed Ahmed Mahgoub, supported by all the Arab League states but Lebanon, was seen as a triumph for the United States and its allies.

Temporary Steelhead Angling Closure Lifted

The closure on steelhead angling on the North Umpqua River below Winchester Dam was lifted early this week after repairs to the dam and Game Commission fish counting station.

Jim Vaughn, regional administrator for the Game Commission, said the closure was in effect since Sept. 2 for about a half-mile below the dam to protect steelhead congregating in the river.

The reservoir behind the dam had been drawn down while California Oregon Power Co. and the Game Commission completed repairs, and the fish ladder was inoperative.

Seven Richfield Dealers Will Attend Conference

Seven Richfield Oil Corp. dealers from Roseburg will be represented Thursday night in Eugene at a fall planning conference, according to R. H. Gladwill, Richfield's Roseburg agent.

A total of 74 dealerships and agencies will take part in the conference at the Eugene Hotel. Ray D. Peterson and Robert F. McLeod of Richfield's Oregon Marketing Department will head the session, Gladwill said.

sales system rests both with the commission and the O.L.B.C. Van Bergen stressed the point that the O.L.B.C. is "no position to ignore violations." He said he believes proprietors and employees of establishments serving liquor should make it a point to acquaint themselves with the primary "dangers" involved in liquor sales: Sales to minors and intoxicated persons and operation of a disorderly house.

"Payment (for licenses) by the licensee is in effect recognition of these limitations," he added. Licensees should strive to attain a level of operation whereby they can be proud of their establishments, said Van Bergen.

The O.L.B.C. official said the state, in turn, will continue to offer "full cooperation" in solving the various problems of operators.

Dufek said it is up to proprietors themselves to reverse the downward trend of liquor sales which has been apparent since 1940.

He said industry people should "spread the truth" about effects of liquor consumption on health to their customers and personal friends.

Trucking Resumes To West Wednesday After 37-Day Tieup

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Long haul trucking operations in the West resumed Wednesday after a 37-day tieup which ended Tuesday.

A formal announcement of approval of a master agreement, and a number of supplementary local agreements, was made Tuesday by top union and management negotiators.

The spokesman, Elmer Mohn, president of the Western Conference of Teamsters, and Robert Cutler, El Paso, Tex., chief management negotiator, praised the conduct of both employees and Teamster members during the tieup.

"The negotiations were tough, but they were carried out on a very high plane," said Cutler. "It was a satisfactory conclusion for both sides."

The master agreement covering 20,000 drivers for 1,200 firms in the 11 western states was to be signed Wednesday.

The strike-lockout began Aug. 11 with the walkout of Central Valley (Calif.) Teamsters. They struck for wage parity with San Francisco truckers. Operations elsewhere closed, employers saying a strike against one was a strike against all.

The agreement provides for a three-year contract with raises to a standard scale of \$2.47 an hour throughout the West by May 1960. Long haul drivers will get three annual wage increases of 10 cents an hour. There are fringe benefits and cost-of-living provisions, also.

WCA Pilots Ready To Strike Tonight In Contract Rift

SEATTLE (AP)—Charges and countercharges flew thick and fast Wednesday as 88 West Coast Airlines pilots prepared to strike at 11:30 p.m. in a contract dispute involving WCA's new F27 turbo-prop airliners.

In Chicago, the Air Line Pilots' Assn. issued a statement by President C. M. Sayen which said:

"The company's attempts to force pilots, under threats of discharge, to fly the company's new turbine-powered F27 aircraft for which no rates of compensation, rules or working agreements have been established left no alternative (but to strike)."

In Seattle, Nick Bez, president of WCA, said Sayen's allegations were not true.

"There were no threats of discharge," Bez said in a statement. "Pilots who had previously been scheduled to take training flights Tuesday morning were asked to do so, and the flights were made."

"Our offer of rates of pay for the new Fairchild F27 is identical to those increases already agreed upon by Pacific Air Lines, the only local service carrier which has concluded an agreement with ALPA for F27 rates of pay to date."

"Our offer is \$241 a month more than our pilots receive presently for flying the Douglas DC3."

ALPA set the 11:30 p.m. Wednesday strike deadline after the union and management broke off negotiations Monday night. No new meetings were scheduled.

West Coast pilots, who fly WCA planes into 44 cities in Washington, Oregon and Idaho, now receive about \$1,066 a month.

West Coast planned to put the new F27s into service Sept. 18.
