Druggist Claims Threat

The druggist was represented in court by attorney Carl M. Felker who told the court "the matter arose rather innocently." He explained Lorenzen had given him the barbiturates on a weekend without a prescription to "tide him over."

He said the victim came back early the following week still without a prescription and threatened to expose the pharmacist if he didn't give him more.

Lorenzen told authorities he has lived under a cloud of "implied blackmail" for more than a year.

In presenting the state's case, Blockett said Lorenzen had been extremely cooperative, had withheld nothing and first volunteered information about the situation to the state drug inspector on Sept. 10. He had never been in trouble before.

Roseburg police and the office of Sheriff Ira C. Byrd worked together on the investigation.

Ike's Attitude Rapped, Defended In Schools Mess

NEW YORK (AP)—Gov. Averell Harriman says President Eisenhower has hurt rather than helped integration in Southern schools.

The governor's Republican opponent in the gubernatorial race, Nelson A. Rockefeller, says Eisenhower has conducted himself commendably, and shown real courage in the segregation controversy.

They aired their views Friday night before a Harlem audience, speaking from the same platform at an outdoor street rally.

"The President of the United States must bear a heavy responsibility for the reluctance to move toward school integration in Arkansas and Virginia," declared Harriman.

He said Eisenhower should have "given the responsible groups in the South willing to move ahead the support which only the prestige and the power of his office could provide."

The President's failure to exercise leadership has created a vacuum into which bigots and demagogues have moved," Harriman said.

Rockefeller departed from his prepared text to defend the President.

"Who got the troops to Little Rock?" he asked. "That takes courage in this country."

He added that the Republicans are "proud of the fact that under President Eisenhower the first civil rights legislation since Reconstruction days was passed by this session of Congress."

Imports Of Potatoes May Be Restricted

WASHINGTON (AP)—Restrictions may be imposed on the import of potatoes next month to help stabilize prices for U. S. producers.

The Agriculture Department said Friday it is considering the restrictions, similar to those imposed in the past when U. S. production was excessive. The restrictions probably would become effective Oct. 13.

Imports of round white and red skin varieties would be limited to U. S. No. 1 grade or better, 2 1/2 inches minimum diameter and 4 inches maximum diameter. Long varieties like Russet Burbank would have to meet requirements of the U. S. No. 2 or better grade, 2 inches minimum diameter or 4 ounces minimum weight.

A subsidy program diverting domestic surpluses into animal feed and other by-products already has been established by the department.

Warrant Issued For Man Charged In Shooting Boy

SALEM (AP)—A warrant was issued today for the arrest of a Salem man whose 22 calibre rifle bullet pierced a school bus windshield and injured a 9-year-old boy Thursday afternoon.

A complaint charging violation of a state law against shooting across a public highway was filed in the justice court at Stayton. A warrant was then issued for the arrest of M. H. Stewart of Salem.

The boy, Dale Lingenfelter, 9, fourth grader at the Victor School near here, is in school today wearing a bandage over his eye. His physician said that there were numerous small stipplings over his nose and cheek from tiny fragments of shredded metal. One tiny piece of metal penetrated the inner corner of one of his eyes.

Principal, H. D. Harp of Victor School said the bus was going west of Union Hill Road, 2 1/2 miles west of the school. The bullet struck the hood of the bus, ricocheted through the windshield and sprayed the Lingenfelter boy with glass.

Soviet Denies Knowing Of 11 Missing Airmen

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet government has denied any knowledge of what happened to 11 crewmen missing from a U. S. Air Force plane that crashed in Soviet Armenia.

A Soviet note made public today said a U. S. statement that Russian fighters intercepted the plane was "provocative in nature." The Kremlin accused Washington of trying to justify an "intentional violation" of the Soviet border.

The unarmed C130 Hercules transport plane crashed Sept. 2 after disappearing on a flight inside Turkey adjacent to Armenia. The Soviet government said earlier six bodies were found in the wreckage but gave no indication of what happened to the other 11 men aboard.

probably the second largest in the state.

Peterson, talking off the cuff at Friday night's banquet, said that up to a few years ago, the western states were relatively free of animal diseases. It was fairly easy to control ailments that can cut millions of dollars out of the economy.

Livestock Hazards Up

"But this isn't the case any more. The airplane and other forms of fast transportation, the increasing movement of the population, places Oregon livestock in ever increasing danger," Peterson said.

He added that an active and alert veterinary force is needed to prevent the spread of animal diseases and to protect the industry from great economic losses.

"We live animals, or we wouldn't be veterinarians," Peterson said. "Sure, we can make a lot of money if animal got sick. But we prefer a sound and healthy program for the state."

Timber Tax Valuation Boost Faces Protest

1958... resulted in timber "being assessed at values not uniform or proportionate to values on other properties in the county."

In its objections the Roseburg Lumber Co. alleges the respondent's order, whereas it applies to timber of the petitioner, "is null and void."

The petition adds further that valuation described by the commission "is not uniform with other classes of property in that rate of assessed value to true cash value," that Douglas County timberland value "is not rateable, equal and uniform with timber in other counties of the state," and "fair market value... is not in excess of figures adopted by the county Board of Equalization."

The company further adds that "no order, rule or regulation has been made (by the commission) for determining the method to be followed in the appraisal of timber."

Douglas County values, after an inventory of standing timber made during the period of 1949 to 1954, were assigned a true cash value in 1955.

This year, Assessor Morris Bowker, at the behest of the state commission, raised valuations 50 per cent. This was overruled by the county Board of Equalization and dropped 13.3 per cent. The suit orders the state commission to return its value to the level set by the assessor.

Sub-Alpine Timber Bids Scheduled In Roseburg

PORTLAND (AP)—The Forest Service today called for bids to log 10 million feet of sub-alpine timber in the Cascade Mountains.

The Forest Service said bids will be received at its Roseburg office until Oct. 28 to the tract on the Wadsworth Park area of Douglas County.

The successful bidder will be permitted to build a small sawmill on Crescent Lake, said regional forester J. Herbert Stone.

It is the largest such tract of timber ever to be offered for sale in the Northwest. Most of the timber will be manufactured into pulp and paper.

Oregon's Tourist Take This Summer Said \$150 Million

PORTLAND (AP)—Tourists spent \$150 million dollars in Oregon this past summer, the state Highway Department's Travel Information Division reported Friday.

Directors, meeting here, elected Frank Hawley, publisher of the Klamath Falls Herald and News as chairman, to succeed William Tugman, Redport publisher.

The report on tourist travel also said:

The average expenditure per tourist this year was \$6.16, compared with \$5.30 last year.

Some 1,800,000 out-of-state cars visited Oregon, each carrying an average of 3.2 persons and remaining in the state for four days.

Tourists traveling by car spent 125 million dollars and those traveling by train spent 15 million.

The Oregon Caves, Crater Lake National Park and the Astoria-Megler ferry showed an increase in tourist patronage. Other park and historic areas reported a 5 per cent decline in tourists.

Former Riddle Woman Passes

Mrs. Eliza Ellen Smith, 92, pioneer resident of Oregon and former resident of Riddle, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Bessie May Staley, in Portland Friday.

She was born July 3, 1866, in Humboldt County, Calif., and came with her parents to Douglas County as a child. She made her home in the Riddle area until about 14 years ago, when she moved to Portland. Her husband, Jackson Lee Smith, preceded her in death on Feb. 2, 1950.

Mrs. Smith was a member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Surviving are five children, Mrs. Lottie Viola Kirkendall, Saginaw, Ore.; Mrs. Elbel Grace McCum, Medford, Vernon W. Smith, Riddle, Mrs. Bessie May Staley, Portland, and Floyd Lee Smith, Roseburg; 12 grandchildren; and several great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary Monday at noon, with the Elder W. R. Riston, of Roseburg Seventh-day Adventist Church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in the family plot in Riddle Cemetery.

visiting that Russia would turn over to U. S. authorities the bodies of six American fliers in the wreckage of a U. S. Air Force C130 transport that crashed on Russian soil near the Turkish border on Sept. 2.

Another Demand Due

State Department officials said the new note gave no information on the fate of 11 other airmen who were aboard the plane. The note denied that the aircraft was intercepted by Soviet planes.

Officials said the United States undoubtedly would send a new note requesting information on the 11 men unaccounted for and renewing a demand for return of the plane.

In general, the Khrushchev letter on the Formosa situation was characterized here as covering familiar Soviet policy in support of Red China.

It was considered notable mainly for its tough tone and the specific warning that if the United States did not withdraw its forces from the Formosa area it risked "expulsion" by Red China.

The main immediate effect seemed to be to harden the deadlock between the United States and the Communist bloc over the Formosa issue.

"We stand fully by the side of the Chinese people's government and the Chinese people," Khrushchev said. "We have always supported their policy and shall continue to do so in the future."

"Blackmail" Claimed
He said neither Red China nor the Soviet Union would be intimidated by what he called "nuclear blackmail." And he said Red China would never accept "the severance of its very own territory" nor the concentration of U. S. armed forces in the Formosa area.

"Interference in the internal affairs of China must be brought to an end once and for all," Khrushchev said.

Object: Baseball matrimony. The Rainiers have been literally drooling for Hutch ever since Connie Ryan was fired as field manager at the end of a disastrous Pacific Coast League season which brought a last-place finish.

It was the former Franklin High School phenom, Hutchison, who steered Seattle to its last PCL pennant in 1955 and then went back to the big leagues for three seasons at the helm of the St. Louis Cardinals.

The Cards, who have had a disappointing
