

Kremlin Reacts Sharply To Rejection Of Note

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Glendale School Board Describes School Goals

At a recent meeting, the Glendale School Board made its written philosophy of education a part of the school policy.

The board also has written an athletic policy which states that athletics are to take as little of school time as possible, that no more than two games will be played in any one sport in a school week and if at all possible, no football and basketball games will be played during the week. Night games are encouraged in baseball.

The board approved an excuse absence being granted for religious training if it was not over one afternoon a month, if the student is on a list presented by a minister, if the parent has signed for the student and if there are not too many to cause interruption of classes.

Due to conflicts with the regular meeting date, Oct. 9 was set as the night for the next board meeting. If none of the members have to work, the meeting will be Oct. 11.

Teamster Union Officials Put On Derogatory List

WASHINGTON (AP) — The names of a dozen present and former Northwest Teamsters officials, about whom the chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Labor said they had been derogatory to the union, were released Saturday.

The names were included in a list of 141 which chairman John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) attached to a statement he issued urging the removal or resignation of Teamster president James R. Hoffa.

The list was headed: "Teamster officials about whom testimony has been adduced relating to improper activities."

Northwest men listed were: Frank W. Brewster, Seattle, chairman, Western Conference of Teamsters; (Brewster no longer holds this post); Clyde C. Crosby, international organizer for Oregon, Portland; Richard Klinge, Local 690, Spokane; Nugent La Poma, Local 174, Seattle; Frank Malloy, Local 223, Portland; Reginald Mikesell, Local 501, Joint Council 37, Portland; Albert J. Ruhl, Local 690, Spokane.

Those designated as no longer connected with the union included: Dave Beck, former international president; Dave Beck Jr., international organizer; Norman Gersert, international organizer; Terry McNulty, Local 174, and John Sweeney, Western Conference of Teamsters, all of Seattle.

Concerning the list of former Teamster officials, McClellan said that "in not one case was the removal of this person from the Teamsters Union attributable to any act of Mr. Hoffa."

Criticism Issued Through Tass News Agency

MOSCOW (AP) — The Kremlin reacted sharply today to President Eisenhower's rejection of Premier Khrushchev's warning on the Far East crisis. It said the rejection shows American authorities don't want to "listen to the voice of reason."

The abrupt return of the Khrushchev note was held to show that American circles give little consideration to "popular demand for putting an end to the policy of saber rattling which is carrying the world to the brink of war."

Diplomatic observers commented that shortened tempers in both camps threatened to plunge Soviet-American relations to a new low.

The Soviet government issued its criticism through the official Tass news agency after Khrushchev's Sept. 19 note — labeled unacceptable at the White House because of its strong terms — was turned back to the Foreign Ministry by a U. S. Embassy messenger.

Had Warned Eisenhower

Khrushchev had warned Eisenhower to withdraw U. S. forces from Formosa immediately or risk their forcible expulsion by Red China. He called for American recognition of the Peiping regime.

The rejection, which the White House based on consideration that the note was intemperate, abusive and personally insulting to the President, also drew a denunciation from Red China.

Moscow radio quoted today's edition of the Communist party newspaper Pravda as saying rejection of the Khrushchev note was "a violation of the generally accepted rules" of diplomatic relations. "The organizers of military provocation could not help seeing the tremendous influence this document (the Khrushchev letter) had on the minds of men," Pravda added.

(Pravda said ruling American circles were "particularly annoyed" because Khrushchev had declared the United States would have to get out of Formosa and the offshore islands or be driven out by the Red Chinese.)

"Whether they like it or not, however, the aggressors really will have to get out of the Taiwan Strait area of their own free will or else they will be made to get out," the paper declared.)

INDUSTRY DESTROYED

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — Communist shells have destroyed one of Quemoy's proudest industries, a plant making kaoliang, a potent liquor which Americans call white lightning.

During World War II, when gasoline was scarce on the China mainland, experimenters found you could drive a car with it. The plant at Quemoy was built a few years ago at a cost of \$40,000.

Mormon Elder Drifts To Hawaii Aboard Raft Lohi

HONOLULU (AP) — An adventurous Mormon elder and his three young crewmates who drifted to Hawaii from California aboard the raft Lohi IV—flew here today from the island of Maui.

Skipper Lee Vere Baker, 42, boat-builder from Petaluma, Calif., near San Francisco, will be reunited with his wife Nola and three children, who are flying from the mainland.

The raft arrived off Maui Saturday afternoon after a 60-day voyage from Long Beach, 2,100 miles to the east. When Baker and his bearded crew and their dog Targor were sighted, they were down to their last four cans of spinach and tomatoes.

The raft was towed into port at Kahului by a tuna boat. All the mariners were in good condition. Asked what his trip proved, Baker told newsmen: "The Coast Guard put it very nicely when they congratulated us on proving Hawaiians thousands of years ago came from the Americas, the same way we did."

With Baker were Larry Foglio, 31, a UCLA psychologist; Don McFarland, 27, University of New Mexico student; and Ed Kekuala, 27, a Brigham Young University dental student.

Earlier attempts by Baker to drift to Hawaii had failed.

Temporary Fish Trap Is Ready At Oxbow Dam

PORTLAND (AP) — Salmon swarming up the Snake River may begin to get by the Oxbow Dam blockade in numbers today, a federal fishery expert said here.

Stanley G. Jewett Jr. of the Fish and Wildlife Service said Idaho Power Co. officials advised him that a temporary fish trap may go into operation at the dam.

Fish will be attracted by river current into the trap, then lifted by an elevator arrangement into tanks, which will be carried on trucks to Brownless Dam. There the migrating salmon will be released for the rest of their journey to spawning grounds.

Jewett said the trap should be able to handle large numbers of fish, compared to the meager number now being caught by dipnets for transfer to trucks.

Workmen still are rushing repairs to the permanent fish trap at Oxbow Dam. A concrete wall in the trap cracked late in August, knocking it out of operation. No definite date has been announced for completion of the repairs.

French Commies Win Support From Khrushchev

PARIS (AP) — French Communists have won direct support from Nikita Khrushchev in their campaign against Premier de Gaulle's proposals for a new French constitution.

The Soviet Premier-parity boss professed in a declaration broadcast Sunday by Radio Moscow to see the danger of a Fascist dictatorship arising from the move to strengthen France's government.

His blast came as De Gaulle stumped eastern and northern provinces on behalf of the constitution, up for a vote Sunday. There was scattered violence in widely separated areas.

Study Of Press Photography In Courtrooms Asked

EUGENE (AP) — A comprehensive study of press photography in courtrooms was urged here this weekend by Glenn R. Jack, Oregon City attorney.

Jack, speaking Saturday at an annual meeting of Oregon newsmen, said he believes such a study is prerequisite to an informed opinion regarding the merits of Canon 35, the American Bar Assn. policy that holds news photography in courtrooms should not be permitted.

Jack said that Canon 35 presupposes "what we think would happen." What is needed, he said, is a study of "what did happen" in instances where courtroom photography has been permitted. Jack said it is his personal feeling that photography "can't help but modify" courtroom proceedings, even though newly-developed fast film makes it possible to take indoor pictures without flashlights.

He said courtroom photography would undoubtedly have some effect on witnesses, jurors, litigants and attorneys, and that if this in turn would have "even the slightest" effect on the outcome of a trial, Canon 35 is valid.

Jack's talk concluded a half-day session devoted to news problems that was attended by representatives of member newspapers in the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Assn.

The newsmen elected West Sullivan, news editor of the Oregon Statesman, Salem, as chairman of next year's session. He succeeds Eric Allen Jr., managing editor of the Medford Mail-Tribune, who presided Saturday.

Faubus Gets Hand Shakes, But Opinions Of Governors Differ Over Integration

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Arkansas Gov. Orval F. Faubus ploughed through the crowd.

It was slow going. People kept pressing forward to shake his hand, both men and women, from many parts of the South.

They were saying: "Fine work, governor. . . . Wait to tell you how proud I am. . . . Don't you give in, governor. . . . Well, thank you very much," he kept repeating as he headed for the door.

This took place at a dinner, preceding the opening of the Southern Governors Conference.

Gov. Opinion Changes

But in another room of the high-ceilinged mansion, Kentucky's Gov. A. B. Chandler was saying:

"It won't take very long for a public sentiment to build up to a point where they'll have to get those schools open. I think it will build up rapidly. People in those places are already having second thoughts, so that the schools are closed."

Faubus has closed the high schools in Little Rock, Ark., to keep Negroes from enrolling. Chandler brought about integration in Kentucky and he is proud of the way it was handled.

Which man represents the South's feeling? It is hard to say. Perhaps each represents different phases of its many sides.

Integration is not on the conference agenda. But when the 14 governors get through trading notes, an accurate picture could emerge.

More Willing To Talk

Chandler said, for example, "They're a lot more willing to talk about it this year. That's a sign in itself."

Chandler said he thinks a change of heart is taking place now that Southerners confront the fact of shuttered schools in Arkansas and Virginia.

But Mississippi's Gov. James P. Coleman doesn't see it that way. "Our people are overwhelmingly in favor of the closing of the schools. That includes the Negroes because in Mississippi the Negroes don't think it any badge of shame to have and operate their own schools."

A member of a state delegation, who asked not to be identified, said, "Sentiment against integration is harder now, and it's going to get still harder, whether the schools stay closed or not."

Most of the governors were not talking yet.

Nationalists Increase

Isle Forces 25 Per Cent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nationalist China apparently has increased the size of its forces on the offshore islands by more than 25 per cent since last spring.

At that time, Chiang Kai-shek was estimated to have approximately 75,000 regular army forces manning garrisons on Quemoy, Matsu and the smaller islands in both areas. Today's estimate is slightly over 100,000.

The estimate for Big Quemoy is 80,000 soldiers. The total civilian population in that island is believed to be about 40,000. Quemoy is the focal point for Communist attack, hammered daily by siege guns from the nearby Red mainland, with the primary purpose of attempting to stop or seriously restrict arrival of supplies.

Graham Claims Christ Answer To World Crisis

CHARLOTTE, N. C. (AP) — "Christ is the answer to the world's crisis," including the current racial strife," said Charlotte-born Billy Graham, who opened a four-week crusade here yesterday.

The 34-year-old evangelist spoke to an integrated overflow crowd of 14,375 in the city's four-million-dollar coliseum, which he dedicated three years ago.

He hopes to draw 250,000 into the big dome in the 25 meetings he has scheduled.

This was his second revival effort among his home folks since he began as a boy evangelist nearly 20 years ago. At the end of his sermon, 390 people, including a few Negroes, answered his call for a "decision for Christ."

Graham, whose opening sermon subject was "Christ's Answer to the World's Dilemma," said social problems in the nation "cry out for God's help."

Reuther Attacker Would Stop If Charges Proved

WESTPORT, Conn. (AP) — Joseph P. Kamp has asked a bipartisan group to decide whether he should continue to distribute his published attacks on labor leader Walter Reuther.

The 58-year-old Westport pamphleteer, in a telegram sent last night to the Fair Campaign Practices Committee, said he would stop distribution of the booklets if the committee finds truth in "the false and irresponsible charges against me."

Reuther has called Kamp a "hate-monger," and Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler has asked the committee to censure the booklet about Reuther, named "Meet the Man Who Plans to Rule America."

Republican National Chairman Meade ALCORN has repudiated the publication, which was reported to have the backing of several wealthy Eastern Republicans.

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
