NEW TRACK Surface Set For UO Test

EUGENE (AP) — Track and field stars may soon find themselves running on a new track surface—rubber and asphalt.

University of Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman says he has perfected the mixture and it may go into mass production next spring.

Bowerman, who has been working with the surface for five years, says "It's comparable to the best cinder tracks and infinitely better. There are no maintenance problems."

Fifty schools have already installed asphalt runways of varied mixtures but Bowerman says this is the first surface which will withstand weather.

He is already filling orders for runways for the field events but the product is being manufactured from a test machine. Several schools are interested in using the surface for entire tracks, he added.

The material for the runways is placed down cold "like a rug" after being manufactured at the plant, the Oregon coach continued. He added that a machine would be required to surface tracks.

Bowerman said the material could be used for both indoor and outdoor tracks, playgrounds and even do-it-yourself patios and feeder areas for cattle.

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Casey Sees Hurlers' Tiff

Spahn, Burdette Will Be Tough To Defeat, Quoth Yankee Bard

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Manager Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees figures the 1958 World Series which opens here today will be a pitchers' series.

"That Spahn wins 20 games for nine years," said Casey, "and who's going to tell me how to beat him? Who knows how?"

"A man wins 20 for nine years has to be a great pitcher and one who knows how to pitch to right-handers and left-handers. So what good is it if you put in all right-handed batters against him or not?"

Starters Tabbed

Warren Spahn, the Braves' ace who won 22 this season, matching Pittsburgh's Bob Friend for the National League high, was the Milwaukee starter today, Whitey Ford (14-7) Stengel's choice, making it an all southpaw opener.

Law Burdette will start for the Braves in the second game.

"Take Burdette," Stengel said. "He makes everybody but the manager wrong because he wins 20 games over in that league this year, and he's only lost three since the All-Star Game."

"A lotta people tell me Burdette wasn't really a great pitcher and the way to beat him is don't put any left-handers against him. But his manager pitches him three times in the last Series, and who is it who beats us? Burdette. Beats us three times and we get beat."

"All those people tell me how Burdette can be beat, but I notice nobody's been able to do it yet over in that league."

Tells of Yanks

Stengel then touched on his Yankees.

"We won the pennant because early in the season we got some rain and you think that might hurt us, but it helps us because I can pitch my two best, Ford and Turley, in almost all of those early games."

"And while I'm at it, Turley is my pitcher tomorrow in the second game. He won 21 for us and he was great."

Rob Turley, a right-hander, was the only consistent pitcher the Yankees had, and he went into a late slump. Whitey Ford began strong but of late has been hampered by a sore elbow.

Roseburg Works On Offense In Preparation For Axmen

Roseburg Indian offense received the most attention in the Tuesday practice session, as the Tribe prepares for the second trip of the year Friday.

This week, the South Eugene Axemen are the target for the Tribe as the Midwestern League action begins for the Roseburg eleven.

Although their season mark is 0-3, the Axemen club is still a tough eleven, as scouting reports will attest. South Eugene is a big team and can match the Indians man for man in the weight department.

Passing Sharpened

The Indians ran over most of their standard plays Tuesday, and Tribe passing was given a good workout. Second unit quarterback Larry LaRoque was throwing strikes in this phase of the work-outs against a hard-charging defensive unit.

The Indians will attempt to record their first win over the Axemen in the history of grid play between the schools. Last year, the Tribe fell before Charlie Warren and company 20-0 on Finlay field.

Tackles Lend Weight

For the Axemen, two heavy tackles give them plenty of beef up front. John Buffington (220) and John Reed (215) are both one-year veterans. The Axemen also have two large guards in Phil Newman (180) and Steve Whitright (190).

In the backfield, South Eugene has fullback Jack Calvin (175), and at halfbacks Jim Muhr (170) and Wally Larson (150).

Last year, in the game at Finlay field, the two teams tried a total of 26 passes between them. The Indians connected on four out of 11 and the Axemen hit six out of 15 attempts. In 1957, the battle was a test of defense, with the Tribe gaining a net yardage of 100 and the Axemen 147. In this game, the Indians were also troubled by fumbles. Five times the Tribe bobbed the ball and four times the Axemen recovered.

PORTRAIT OF HANEY

Modern Baseball Bosses Claimed Better Equipped

MILWAUKEE (AP) — This may sound like sacrilege but Fred Haney, who served his big league apprenticeship under Ty Cobb, is convinced the modern players are better than the old ones.

What's more, it is the 60-year-old Milwaukee pilot's contention that the managers of Cobb's era would be unable to cope with the present-day athletes.

"I'm convinced the players today are better," Haney said.

"They're a different type. This is an era of specialists. It's not like the old days when a manager played his first nine men until one got hurt, then he'd substitute until the regular recovered. We carry 25 players and each one serves a definite purpose."

Cooler Head Needed

The managers of 30 and 40 years ago would not have had the patience it requires to handle the present crop of players, Haney thinks.

"The thinking of the players is different."

"The manager has to go along with the transition or he couldn't manage."

Haney credits two men for teaching him practically everything he knows about managing — Ty Cobb and Branch Rickey. He played under Cobb at Detroit from 1922 through 1925, and he managed seven years for Rickey, four at Hollywood and three at Pittsburgh.

Browns First Job

He got his first manager's job in 1935. Four years later he was called up by the last-place Browns. He raised them to sixth but was fired in 1940. He was winning pennants regularly in Hollywood when he was called by Rickey to take over the young, untutored Pirates in 1953.

When they began to come out of the woods, Rickey fired him and he caught on with the Braves as a coach in 1956.

"What I learned from Cobb and Rickey was to stand by me when I faced the opportunities and pressures in Milwaukee," Haney said.

"Cobb and Rickey have forgotten more baseball than most of us will ever know."
