

Oregon Highway Jobs Bids Total Below Estimates

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Highway Commission opened bids today on 18 projects, with the low bids totaling \$5,370,759.

That brought smiles to the highway engineers, because the bid total was 16.8 per cent below their estimates.

The commission, which has almost exclusively used asphalt for paving highways in rural areas, opened a bid for using concrete to pave the North Albany-Lebanon Road section of the new Pacific Freeway. The low bid of \$1,683,464 was submitted by Roy L. Houck and Sons, Salem.

Engineers said the bid is favorable. They will study the project to determine whether they should use more concrete in the future.

Concrete costs about twice as much as asphalt. But it doesn't cost anything to maintain concrete, while the maintenance cost for asphalt is \$1,000 per mile on a four-lane route.

Josephine County—Build two structures at junction of Pacific and Redwood highways at Grants Pass. Tom Lillebo, Reedsport, \$669,093.

Cosco—Grade and surface 1.8 miles of Bullards Bridge-Bandon section of Oregon Coast Highway

near Bandon. C. R. O'Neill, Creswell, \$279,664.

Malheur—Grade and pave 10.7 miles of Gwynn undercrossing, Jonesboro and Tunnel-Namoff sections of Central Oregon Highway. Twin City Construction Co. and Clarence Braden, Pasco, Wash., \$782,571.

Morrow—Level and oil 9.31 miles of Bomber Range Road, 5 miles east of Boardman. Dorman Construction Co., Vancouver, Wash., \$87,008.

Multnomah—Widen and construct roadbed on 67 miles of the Beaverton-Hillsdale and Pacific Highway West on Barbur Blvd.

Worldwide TV Hookup By Sputniks Predicted

LONDON (AP) — A Russian radio commentator today predicted a worldwide television hookup by means of Sputnik transmitting stations.

The Sputniks would have to be motionless in relation to the earth but this could be achieved if they made one revolution of the globe every 24 hours.

Nikolai Potitsayev said a satellite 21,000 miles out in space would view nearly a third of the earth's surface. Three such satellites at equal distances would cover the whole world.

Trading Stamps Increase Costs, Dealer Claims

SEATTLE (AP) — Trading stamps increase cost of merchandise an average of three per cent and are "a menace to the consumer," an officer of the Washington State Food Dealers' Assn. said here.

The criticism came from R. A. Campbell, association secretary and treasurer, who addressed more than 1,000 retail food dealers at the group's convention.

Campbell said the association would oppose any attempt in the next Legislature to authorize redemption of coupons with premiums.

Campbell also advised food dealers to tighten their security system to cut losses from shoplifting and bad checks.

"Winter — when women carry umbrellas and wear bulky coats — is the time when shoplifting reaches its peak," said Campbell. The sack dress, he added, has been a boon to shoplifters.

Much shoplifting, he reported, is by women of middle-income groups who want delicacies in their cupboards. They are afraid husbands will accuse them of extravagance — so they steal.

Britain Ready To Talk Of Cyprus Independence

ATHENS (AP) — British Prime Minister Macmillan told Archbishop Makarios Tuesday Britain is willing to consider his independence plan as part of a final settlement of the Cyprus dispute.

But Macmillan said the independence proposal falls outside the scope of the immediate problem of setting up an interim arrangement for restoring order and developing representative institutions.

Makarios, exiled Cypriot leader, sent a personal message to Macmillan Sept. 27.

The independence plan reversed the stand of Greek-speaking Cypriots that Cyprus must be permitted to unite with Greece. It was accepted Monday by Greek Premier Constantine Karamanlis.
