

Calm Robber Gets Away With \$5,000 From National Bank

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Asst. Vice President Monroe W. Long looked up from his desk at the Cheltenham National Bank and saw a tall slender man walk casually through the door.

The man was wearing white gloves and a checked lumberman's shirt. He had a white handkerchief tied about his face and a pistol in his hand.

It was five minutes before closing Wednesday. Some six customers were in the suburban bank.

The man paid no attention to them. Without a word or a threatening gesture, he walked among the customers to the counter.

He vaulted the counter and walked into the cage of teller Anna Kirk. From his pocket he took a large paper bag, and, standing beside Mrs. Kirk, he started taking money from her cash drawer.

Presses Alarm Buttons

She pressed an alarm button. A bell clanged outside the building. The robber took no notice; never even looked up, she said. Outside, passers-by crowded excitedly around the bank door.

The man—about 30, long, said later—went to a second teller's cage, then a third, each time filling his bag from the cash drawer, never seeming to hurry.

Finally, he vaulted the counter again and only then did he quicken his pace. That seemed to arouse the customers. One of them threw a marble pen and pencil stand. It missed the robber by a foot, smashing the glass of the swinging door.

The robber pushed through the crowd on the sidewalk. They gave way. But Thomas Rezan, 21, an electric company meter reader, ran toward the man as if to tackle him. A woman school crossing guard screamed: "He's got a gun. Don't bother him; some of the children might get hurt."

The robber hastened to a car parked at the curb, fumbled with the door lock, got in and drove off. He hadn't said a word. The car was found an hour later in a parking lot. It had been stolen, police said.

Later, after the FBI arrived, an agent said the robber got away with about \$5,000.

Body Of Missing Child Found In Wilderness

IRON MOUNTAIN, Mich. (AP) — The body of 4-year-old Kenneth Scott, missing four days in Michigan's Upper Peninsula wilderness, was found today a mile from where the boy wandered into the woods.

A helicopter pilot from K. I. Sawyer Air Force Base at nearby Marquette spotted the child's body in heavy brush southeast of the hunting camp where he vanished Sunday.

A ground party recovered the body. Cause of death was not known immediately. The child was wearing only thin clothing. He had wandered off in near-freezing weather.

The tragic find ended a search that had drawn more than 1,100 police, volunteers and National Guardsmen into the bear-infested forest 30 miles east of Iron Mountain.

Atty. Dana Latham New Commissioner Of Internal Revenue

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For years, Atty. Dana Latham has wished, along with other Americans, that the federal government would do something to simplify its tax laws.

He's going to get a chance to minimize any confusion. He has accepted President Eisenhower's invitation to become commissioner of internal revenue.

He will be administrative head of a vast network of tax offices and can make recommendations of his own, as well as review those of others to the secretary of the Treasury.

"The goal should be for simpler, more uniform tax laws," the 60-year-old lawyer and tax expert said. "There have been improvements since the 1934 codification of tax laws. Nevertheless, with new legislation being added all the time, tax statutes still are confusing."

Latham will withdraw from the law firm of Latham and Watkins, with which he has been associated for 25 years, and as soon as he can close out his personal affairs he will go to Washington. His appointment is subject to confirmation by the Senate.

He will succeed Russell C. Harrington, a Rhode Island accounting executive, who is retiring to private life.

Roy Davis Rites Are Still Pending

Funeral arrangements are pending for Roy Harry Davis, 73, a well-known Glendale area man who died Monday of a heart attack at his home in Wolf Creek.

He was born Feb. 18, 1883, in Neilsville, Wis. and moved to Wolf Creek 42 years ago.

He is survived by his wife, Maebel Wolf Creek, and a son, Sherwood L. Davis, who is serving with the Air Force. Final arrangements for services are pending arrival of the son.

UAW Strikes General Motors After Deadline

factor was tied up for 113 days in a dispute over wages.

Reuther's UAW settled with Chrysler and Ford on a pattern calling for increases of 24 to 30 cents an hour over the three-year life of the new contracts. The pact also provided increases in supplemental unemployment pay and severance pay for workers who lose their jobs because of plant shutdowns or transfers.

No New Offer

Seaton was asked if GM planned any move in the final hour of bargaining. "We see no necessity for a new offer when we've already made one exactly like that of Ford and Chrysler, which the union said was good for the UAW and good for the nation," he replied.

Both GM and the UAW conceded that the GM bargaining picture is complicated in the industry because the company has many more plants and thousands more workers than either Ford or Chrysler, other members of the industry's Big Three.

Seaton said that GM's output is so diversified, ranging from automobiles to refrigerators to electric locomotives, that there are thousands of pay scales. The union has insisted that the wage rates of an assembler, for example, should be uniform in GM plants but Seaton declared the types of work are so varied, it would be impossible to adopt a standard rate.

The United Electrical Workers, who have 20,000 members in GM plants, also went on strike with the UAW today.

GM deals with 17 other unions in addition to the UAW and the IUE.

Like other auto makers, it is just getting rolling on production of 1959 cars.

The UAW strike plan will go into operation at the beginning of the third week of the strike and will cost the union an estimated \$8,274,000 a week. Strike benefits will run from \$12 for a single person to \$22 for a family man.

There were no reports of any incidents as workers walked off the job and set up huge picket lines around many GM plants.

Hatfield Accuses Gov. Holmes Of Disregarding Law

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, Republican candidate for governor of Oregon, Wednesday accused his Democratic opponent Gov. Robert D. Holmes of disregarding the law.

Hatfield said in Portland, where he and Holmes both appeared on the same platform, that he was the only member of the board of control who complied with a law requiring board members to visit all state institutions every 90 days.

Holmes said the law was ridiculous and he didn't have time for such trips.

Hatfield, speaking at a GOP gathering at Baker Wednesday night, said he was shocked by Holmes' statement. Hatfield said state officials should uphold the law at all times, not just when the laws suit them.

In Portland Holmes said he would recommend a bonding program rather than a direct appropriation to finance the state proposed 156 million dollar institution building program. He said he thought it was unfair to burden taxpayers today for a program that will continue for years. He also said he doubted that there could be a tax cut.

Replying to a question, Hatfield said he favors federal aid to education but fears federal control if such a program gets too big. Holmes said he favors more federal aid and has no fear of losing control.

Georgia-Pacific Reports 5-Cent Hourly Pay Raise

PORTLAND (AP) — A 5-cent hourly pay increase for some 3,000 International Woodworkers of America employed by Georgia-Pacific Lumber Co. was reported this week.

This is 2½ cents under the boost approved recently by major employer groups and both the IWA and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers. However, Georgia-Pacific had granted another 5-cent increase last year while the employer groups did not.

The Lumber and Sawmill Workers are still negotiating with Georgia-Pacific. Earl Hartley, executive secretary of the union's Western Council, said it was probable that settlement would be made on the same basis as that of IWA.

Nationalist Flying Boat Missing Off Matsu Isles

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — A Chinese Nationalist flying boat carrying 11 persons, including four U. S. servicemen, was missing today on a flight from the offshore Matsu Islands.

The plane disappeared shortly before sunset Wednesday. Almost 24 hours later Nationalist search planes and two U. S. destroyers had failed to find a trace. Officials speculated that the slow-flying plane had encountered bad weather. They said there was no sign of Communist fighters in the area.

The four U. S. military men aboard are connected with the U. S. military advisory team stationed on Matsu. Their names were withheld.

Names Of Two Businesses Filed With County Clerk

The names of two new businesses were filed Wednesday with the Douglas County clerk, one to operate at Canyonville and the other in Roseburg.

Perry Broadwater of Canyonville filed a certificate for Broadwater Machine Works which will repair machinery and handle related enterprises.

In Roseburg, a service station known as Derrick No. 1 was listed by O. J. Van Horn, 4303 NE Stephens St.

Cecil Earl Warner Fined For Disorderly Conduct

Municipal Judge Randolph Slocom fined Cecil Earl Warner, 44, of 2033 SE Douglas Ave., \$25 Wednesday after the section hand pleaded guilty to a disorderly conduct citation.

He was picked up by Roseburg police and booked early Wednesday morning in the downtown area. Warner was committed for five days in the jail in lieu of the fine.

President Eisenhower Adds Corn-Picking Contest Visit To Growing Plans For Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower today added an appearance at the National Corn-Picking Contest in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Oct. 17 to his growing pre-election travel plans.

The White House said it is probable—though still not definite—that he will campaign in New York City Oct. 12.

A top-level Republican powwow in the White House next Monday also was announced. Twelve GOP leaders will lunch with Eisenhower to devise means of snapping the Republican congressional drive out of what the President has called apathy.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty told reporters that additional speeches may be scheduled within the next few days, giving Eisenhower a bigger role in the Republican effort to recapture control of Congress.

To Extend Trip

In order to visit Cedar Rapids, Eisenhower will extend a previously announced Western trip. It had been scheduled to start with a visit to Los Angeles Oct. 20.

Instead, Eisenhower will leave Washington Oct. 17 with Mrs. Eisenhower. They will visit the corn-picking competition at Cedar Rapids that day, and the President

will at least say a few words, Hagerty said.

The Eisenhowers will move from there to Abilene, Kan., to visit the Eisenhower Museum established in the President's hometown.

Then, for the first time since his heart attack three years ago, the Eisenhowers will make a two-night stay in Denver, Colo., home of Mrs. Eisenhower's mother, Mrs. John S. Doud.

The President has been through

the mile-high Colorado capital since his heart attack there but did not leave the airport.

Fly To Los Angeles

After spending Saturday and Sunday nights in Denver, Eisenhower will fly to Los Angeles Monday morning, Oct. 20, to deliver a television speech over a regional network. This will be followed by another television broadcast Tuesday Morning, Oct. 21, in San Francisco.

Heading back East, Eisenhower will make a Chicago address the night of Oct. 22.

Hagerty said he may soon announce "some political activity" in New York on Columbus Day, Oct. 12, when Eisenhower will attend a wreath-laying ceremony at Columbus Circle and lay the cornerstone of the 20-million-dollar Interchurch Center in the Columbia University area.

Benson Claims Farmers Never Had It So Good

SALEM (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson said here Wednesday night that the farmer never had it so good.

And, the secretary added, the farm policies of the Eisenhower administration are responsible for the change for the better. The very people who calling for his scalp a few months ago are "now coming around to have their pictures taken with me," Benson said.

He addressed a reception of party workers at Republican campaign headquarters here. Earlier in the day he arrived in Portland by plane to a news conference that he expected farm voters would help the GOP cause in the November election.

At Salem Benson said he favored farm commodity supports "as long as they are handled sensibly." He called for the elimination of acreage controls and all other controls over agriculture.

He denied charges that the family-type farm is disappearing. He said that families now own 96 per cent of the nation's farms—the same proportion as 30 years ago.

The secretary will speak at a noon luncheon meeting at Salem. This evening he will drive to Eugene where he will address another GOP rally.
