The ocean is fair to good for salmon. Angling in rivers is spots, but fair to good in Tillamook Bay, lower Nehalem and Yaquina Bay. Angling is fair in upper McKenzie and Willamette, poor at Lookout Point Reservoir and slow at Clear Lake.

Southwest
Trout fishing is fair on the North Umpqua. Some sea-run cutthroat and salmon are in the lower Umpqua. The Winchester Bay fishery is over. Steelhead fishing conditions are excellent on the Rogue from Grants Pass to Gold Beach. Trout fishing is good in the upper Rogue. The general trout season closes Oct. 5 in the Rogue Basin.

Powers, a native of Chillicothe, Mo., was sentenced to 10 years in prison by an Army court-martial after his plea of guilty to a desertion charge. Confinement was reduced to six months on review, however, and will be further reduced next week when about four months of the six-month term will be remitted.

or turkey, but old standbys such as spiced steak, rack roast, leg of lamb and frying chicken are comparatively rare. Southerners' meat is on the bargain list in some places.

The U.S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries looks for a generally high level of supplies of fresh and frozen fish and shellfish this month. Shellfish should be in good supply.

Several varieties of cheese are in good supply now. Many of the famous foreign types of cheese now are manufactured in this country under scientifically controlled conditions.

Egg prices are off 2 to 10 cents a dozen in many places. Best bets in vegetable bins are cabbage, potatoes, endive, escarole, peppers, spinach, tomatoes (especially the plum type), brussels sprouts, radishes, chard and the so-called cooking greens such as collard and kale. Celery, iceberg lettuce, sweet potatoes, snap beans, eggplant, cucumbers, squash and onions also are good buys.

Barlett pears join apples on the best buy list among fruits. Prunes and Concord grapes are good buys.

Remanufacturing Plant Is Destroyed By Fire

FOREST GROVE (AP)—Fire destroyed the Gales Peak Lumber Co. remanufacturing plant here Wednesday.

The source of the flames was not determined at once. Gearhart Bendix, who operated the plant, said the loss was \$75,000. Insurance covered part of it, he said.

The plant lost its head rig in a 1954 fire, and had operated as a remanufacturing plant since then, employing 10 men.
