Greeks May Set Up Cyprus Government In Athens, Report

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The newspaper, Vradyni, which supports the Greek government, said today a "Free Cyprus" government may be set up in Athens.

The newspaper said two Turkish Cypriots would be given the posts of undersecretary in education and interior ministries if such a government is formed and that it might be recognized by the Athens government.



An official of Archbishop Makarios' household in Athens denied the newspaper report.

The report followed the disclosure that Makarios, exiled Greek Orthodox leader of Cyprus who has waged a bloody fight for union with Greece, had prepared a message calling on the Cypriots to "react by all means at their disposal" against a British partnership plan for the island.

Woman Named Luck Gallops To Win On 140-Mile Run

ROOSEVELT, Utah (AP) — A determined 32-year-old mother of three named Luck galloped to victory in a 140-mile horse race today because she wanted to "teach them a lesson once."

Mrs. Dorothy Luck of Roosevelt, Utah, crossed the finish line half a second ahead of Bryan Brantner of St. John, Utah. She rode her 7-year-old thoroughbred at a full gallop for the final five miles to win \$3,000 first prize money.

Indian Claims Commission Work May Prove Long

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress can put down its "future" book that it will extend the work of the Indian Claims Commission, now scheduled to terminate in 1962.

Two simple statistics make this obvious.

In 11 years since its creation, the commission has resolved 141 claims. It still has 852 claims pending.

Even that item of 141 dispositions is somewhat misleading. Actually 32 of those were withdrawn by the claimants.

Whiteside Pleads Innocent In Case

WASHINGTON (AP) — Miami lawyer Thurman A. Whiteside pleaded innocent today to charges of corrupt influence, but his defendant, former Federal Communications Commissioner Richard A. Mack, did not appear for arraignment.

Mack's counsel told U.S. District Court the former commissioner, who resigned under fire at a congressional investigation, is under treatment in a Miami hospital.

Judge Burnis S. Matthews set Whiteside's trial for Jan. 6. She gave Justice Department attorneys a week to check up on Mack's physical condition.

Indictments against the two men grew out of the award of television channel 10 in Miami while Mack was a member of the commission. Mack acknowledged receiving financial favors from Whiteside, but both men denied any improper influence on Mack's official conduct.

Oregon City Veteran Dies At VA Hospital

Thomas P. Kelly, 62, of Oregon City, died at the Veterans Administration hospital in Roseburg Thursday morning.

Cooper of Gladstone, Mrs. Alvin Peters of Willamette, and Mrs. Dale Rowlette of Oak Grove; one brother, Charles Handley of Tigard; three sisters, Mrs. Katharine Johnson of Clackamas, Mrs. Annie Delsman of Ashland and Sister Mary Basil, North Bend; 12 grandchildren and several great grandchildren.

Graveside funeral services will be at 1 p.m. Monday at the Veterans Administration cemetery, Roseburg, with the Rev. Adrian Sharkey of St. Joseph's Catholic Church officiating. Gantz Mortuary, Myrtle Creek, has charge of arrangements.

Report Claims Armed Band In North Nicaragua

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — The government press office today said National Guard troops had been sent to northern Nicaragua to check reports an armed band had crossed from neighboring Honduras.

There were no other details identifying the armed band. Earlier this week reports heard in Tegucigalpa, capital of Honduras, said a liberation movement had been launched by Gen. Ramon Raudales against the government of President Luis Somoza. The radio versions reportedly came from stations in Nicaragua.

Employers Must Continue Paying 2.7 Per Cent Tax

SALEM (AP)—Oregon employers will continue to pay the 2.7 per cent payroll tax rate during fiscal 1958, the state Unemployment Compensation Commission announced today.

This rate went into effect last April 1 when the unemployment trust fund fell below the 31 million dollar "floor" because of the impact of heavy unemployment. Last year, the payroll tax rates were as low as 3 of 1 per cent, with the average tax being 1.2 per cent.

Hatfield Blames Politics For State Police Hassle

LA GRANDE (AP) — Secretary of State Mark Hatfield said Thursday that the current controversy over administration of the state police might have been stirred up by politics.

Several Democratic legislators have called for a change in the administration because of what they said was a policy of requiring traffic patrolmen to issue a specified number of tickets each month.

CORVALLIS (AP) — P. M. Brandt, head of the dairy department at Oregon State College for 40 years, died today after an extended illness. He was 70.

In addition to heading the college department from 1917 until retirement in 1957, he was active in community life. He was mayor of Corvallis in 1933 and 1934 after serving as a member of the City Council from 1924 to 1933.
