Sports Webfoots Fly To Norman For Sooner Game

EUGENE (AP) — The Oregon football team flew from Eugene today heading for Norman, Okla., and the nation's top-rated football team, Oklahoma.

Oklahoma is the solid favorite for the Saturday game with nearly everyone but Coach Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma.

He warned that Oregon will be as tough as any team Oklahoma faces this season, and said he feared the Oregon defense, which gave up only 30 yards on the ground to Idaho in Oregon's only game to date, a 27-0 victory over Idaho.

Heating Bills For Nation's People To Mount As Costs, Transportation Charges Rise

NEW YORK (AP) — Some 46 million homeowners in the United States are facing up today to another economic fact of life — from now on the heating bills will start to mount.

Higher prices this year are likely in many areas as production costs and transportation charges rise. And the chances of price wars benefiting home owners grows slimmer as more factories reopen and eat into fuel stocks.

But the householders' struggle to get up the approximately five billion dollars to meet this winter's heating bill is relatively mild compared with the battle among the various types of fuel striving to get a bigger share of the home owners' outlay.

Claim Biggest Share
Fuel oil dealers claim the biggest share now — almost half. But natural gas has cut in rapidly on this since the war and now heats around 13 million homes for more than 1 1/2 billion dollars. Coal still holds a market of nearly three million homes and has new heating gadgets out to entice the home owner.

OUCG Forced To Curtail Its Activities Some

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Unemployment Compensation Commission is being forced to curtail its activities slightly, John A. Norton, commission administrator, said today.

He said the reason is that the federal government, which pays administrative costs for the program in all states, has cut down on its administrative grants to the states.

Norton said the commission's budget for the fiscal year which began last July 1 is \$3,521,728. However, the commission had expected \$3,600,000 more than that.

The result is that the commission is having to curtail its employment service activities, including counseling, occupational tests, school programs, and aid to the handicapped.

It will result in elimination of some part-time and temporary employees.

Jim Shoulders Shoots Into Competition Lead

DENVER (AP) — Jim Shoulders, all-around rodeo cowboy champion the last two years, has shot into the lead in this year's competition.

The Rodeo Cowboys Assn. announced Thursday Shoulders, from Henryetta, Okla., has 22,948 points one for each dollar of prize money won in RCA-approved rodeos. The latest standings do not include results of the current New York rodeo.

Benny Reynolds of Melrose, Mont., held second place with 22,355 points while the erstwhile leader, Guy Weeks of Abilene, Tex., slipped to third at 21,899.

EXPLOSION KILLS 36

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — The explosion at Podvis coal mine Thursday took at least 36 lives and the fate of 20 more miners is still unknown, Belgrade radio said today.

An official announcement said the blast trapped 188 miners in the 2,000-foot deep pit near the Bulgarian border and only 132 were rescued.

I am sending you a knife made by your Co. as you will see it is broken. It broke while I was wiping it off after skinning a bear. I had very little pressure on the blade when it happened.

My reason for sending the knife back is not to have it replaced but for your Co. to examine it to see what is wrong with it. I think it had a flaw in it where it broke.

My guiding partner & I have used every good knife on the market today, costing up to \$24.00. However your knives are so much better as far as skinning is concerned that other good knives do not compare in anyway. We hunt seal for hides & bounty when we are not guiding. Other so called good knives will skin one seal at the most. This knife skinned eleven (11) with out being sharpened. We have skinned one large brownie & not had to sharpen, whereas other knives have to be sharpened as much as four times on a big bear.

Just wanted you to know you are the first Co. that ever made a real knife. I have purchased another one to use but would like to know about the one I am sending down to you.

I know that lots of people use a knife for a pry & to open cans. However this one broke just as I have told you in the letter.
