U. S. Studies Cease Fire Offer Of Reds

Proposal Welcomed, But Reaction Cautious By Officials Of U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States today formally welcomed Red China's offer to cease fire in the Formosa Strait and indicated U. S. convoys will stop if the shooting stops.

The cautious U. S. reaction was voiced in a statement by Christian R. Hertz, acting as secretary of state in the absence of Secretary Dulles.

Hertz said the offer "seems to move in the direction of a cease fire" despite heavy propaganda against the United States.

The Peiping broadcast of Sunday was being carefully studied by the United States in close consultation with Nationalist China, he said.

Hertz said the United States hopes the Red offer to suspend bombardment of Nationalist-held offshore islands "forebodes a permanent cessation of their armed attack."

"Should this prove to be the case, there would seem to be no further necessity for the convoy of supply shipments to the offshore islands," Hertz said. "This question is being given careful consideration."

Nationalist China Denounces Truce

TAIPEI (Tuesday) (AP) — Nationalist China today denounced the Communist proclaimed seven-day truce in Formosa Strait.

The guns were silent and the nationalists reported record amounts of supplies were poured, under American escort, into the hitherto-blockaded offshore islands.

But government spokesman Sampson Shen called the Communist cease-fire a "diabolical piece of treachery" and "a lull before a new storm."

He also declared the Nationalists were standing firm against a Communist call for direct negotiations with the Reds to settle the current 45-day-old crisis.

The Red Chinese cited "humanitarian considerations" in announcing a seven-day halt to the artillery fire that has battered Quemoy since Aug. 25. They invited the Nationalist Chinese to send fresh supplies to the offshore island, but specified the shipments must be made without U. S. convoys.

They called also for direct peace talks between the two Chinese factions, but advised the Nationalists to beware of Americans.

At about the same time, Russian premier Nikita Khrushchev declared Russia would intervene if the United States were to attack Red China.

Ella Dunbar Residence Is Damaged By Fire

Sub Seawolf Surfaces After 60 Days Trial

(AP)—The atomic submarine Seawolf surfaced 15 miles south of Bock Island at 11:45 a. m. (EDT) today, ending a record 60 days under water.

She surfaced to the surface of Long Island Sound in calm seas for her 116-man crew's first contact with the earth's atmosphere since she submerged Aug. 7.

The hatches were open. Two or three men stepped out, breathed deeply and waved.

Nearby another submarine, the Nautilus, was standing by and radioing congratulations.

Among the first to step out for a breath of fresh air was the Seawolf's skipper, Cmdr. Richard B. Lanning.

Logs 13,700 Miles

The Seawolf had logged more than 13,700 nautical miles in the ocean depths, traveling nonstop with a 200-mile radius for the two-month period.

Cmdr. Lanning radioed the Navy

Son Of Drain Couple Aboard Sub Seawolf

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Oregon men are among crew members of the atomic submarine Seawolf, scheduled to get their first breath of air on the surface today after 60 days submerged.

George W. Wright, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira P. Wright of Drain, is chief intercom communications technician.

David E. Newkirk, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Newkirk, McNary, electronics technician, first class.

In advance of his return that he considered "this voyage as a proof of feasibility of protracted flights in 'inner space'."

The Seawolf's endurance of the deep far surpassed all previous submarine records. The previous one—31 days, 3 1/2 hours—was posted last May by sister nuclear submarine, the Skate.

This auxiliary submarine rescue vessel Skylark, loaded with newsmen and photographers, sailed out 40 miles from New London, Conn., to see the historic surfaceing in crisp, breezy weather. Several Navy helicopters and a blimp hovered overhead.

Previously today Burdette beat the Yankees in four straight series games and had he won today he would have set a series record.

Democrats Predict Win In Hawaii Election

HONOLULU (AP) — Democrats are predicting a major victory in Hawaii's November election on the basis of candidates, showing in Saturday's primary. Republicans are optimistic, too.

Incumbent John A. Burns was Democratic candidate as the territory's 1st U. S. Representative. He better than a 2 to 1 margin. He will be opposed by Farrar L. Turner, unopposed for the GOP nomination.

Incomplete returns Sunday showed Burns with 43,000 votes to 15,000 for Honolulu Mayor Kenneth E. Young. Republican Turner had 12,000 votes.

The Territorial Legislature has been controlled by Democrats since 1954 after more than 10 years of Republican domination.

One Hunter Shot To Death, Dozen Others Suffer Wounds

One hunter was shot to death in the first weekend of Oregon's buck deer season.

Another died of a heart attack. A number—perhaps more than a dozen—were wounded, and at least one got back only after a search party located him.

A Medford teenager was the first gunshot victim. He was Frank Elmer Lane, 14, who was killed in an accident near Medford a few hours after hunting season opened Saturday.

State police said that a gun held by a hunting companion, Earl Thomas Dalton, 14, also of Medford, accidentally discharged as the youths were resting in the woods. Lane was wounded in the abdomen and died shortly afterward.

Police said Dalton told them that he was checking the safety catch on his rifle when it suddenly fired.

Orrell Oliver Standard, 69, was the first heart seizure victim of the season. Standard, his wife and son, Glen, were climbing a mountain while on a hunting trip south of Bonanza. Standard said he felt ill and they returned to the car. He died en route to a Klamath Falls hospital.

Non-Fatal Wounds

Three hunters suffered non-fatal gunshot wounds in Southern Oregon Sunday.

School At Clinton, Tenn., Dynamited; Classes Continued

CLINTON, Tenn. (AP) — The principal of integrated Clinton High School, which was wrecked Sunday by three bombs expertly tossed in early morning fog, said today classes will be resumed Tuesday.

W. D. Human said classes will be held in the undamaged gymnasium, the National Guard Armory and church school facilities until Thursday. After that, he added, the entire student body of 650 white and 11 Negro pupils will be transported by bus to a vacant school building in nearby Oak Ridge.

Eight Negro girls, five of them walking from their homes here and three others arriving from rural areas by bus, were seen entering the gymnasium for today's student assembly.

Officials tentatively estimated damage to the bombed building at \$300,000. The rambling brick structure was built in 1927. Sixteen of its 20 classrooms were reduced to rubble by the explosions.

Clinton, a town of 4,000 population, is 20 miles northwest of Knoxville.

Machineguns, Dynamite Rock Lebanon's Capital

BEIRUT (AP) — Machineguns, dynamite and dynamite explosions rocked Beirut today as the militant Christian Phalangist party made a desperate attempt to enforce its political demands on Lebanon's new pro-Nasser Premier Rashid Karami.

Four men were reported killed in clashes between security forces and Phalangists. Fighting took place near the capital's port area on the way to Damascus.

The Phalangists are attempting to enforce a cease-fire in Beirut with the Syrians. They are supporters of former President Chamoun.

The U. S. Army, meanwhile, continued its withdrawal preparations, waiting for the transport ship to arrive. The date of its arrival was not disclosed.

Klamath Falls, was the most seriously hurt. He was accidentally shot in the chest by another hunter, Burt Moore of Lakeview, according to the report of Lake County Dist. Atty. Sullivan Herndon. Richardson was reported in critical condition.

Mike Shreeve of Medford suffered a self-inflicted pistol bullet wound in the thigh while hunting near Bly.

Carl Webb Jr., Lakeview, suffered a flesh wound in the right ankle when he was shot by another hunter in the Gearhart Mountain area.

On Saturday, Einor Fred Mickelson, 16, of Bridal Veil, was hit in the leg by a bullet which had passed through a deer. The accident occurred in the Tillamook Burn.

Glenn Wayne Morris, 19, of Rogue River was wounded in the arm Sunday as his brother Joe was removing a .22 caliber rifle from their car.

Walter Mallette, 32, Central Point, was wounded in the hip and was treated at a Klamath Falls hospital.

William H. Stewart, Portland, was treated at a Heppner hospital for a minor bullet wound which police said came from Stewart's revolver. It apparently fired while still in the holster, they said.

Charles Henry Worthington, Portland, was hit in the arm by a hunter's bullet near Fossil. State police said he apparently was in line of fire across a saddle from where another hunter shot at a deer that leaped up. He was taken to Providence Hospital, Portland.

Don Shimmer, 20, of Portland disappeared early Saturday in the Tillamook Burn. Searchers reported late this morning finding him in what one of them called the deepest canyon in the area. He appeared to be in good condition.

In addition to these mishaps, a youth was killed in an automobile accident just south of the Oregon-California border Saturday. He was Byron Wilson, 15, of Dorris, Calif., a student at Portland's Hill Military Academy. He was crushed when a jeep in which he was a passenger on a hunting trip overturned.

Four people died in single-car accidents in Oregon over the weekend.

A car-truck collision claimed another life.

Two prospectors were thrown from their Jeep 32 miles south of John Day when the driver lost sight of the road because of dust from a car ahead. One of them was killed.

A woman driving alone was killed when her car rolled over south of Pendleton. Police said they had no early clue to the reason the car left the highway.

A child died under the wheels of a car being backed from the driveway of her home at Creswell.

A man drove his car into a bridge abutment in Portland and was killed.

These were the victims: George Boyd Reed, 46, John Day prospector, was riding with John Peter Nutson, also of John Day, when their Jeep overturned Saturday evening. Reed was killed.

Nutson, unhurt, said he could not see a curve because of dust from another car.

Mrs. Amber M. Williams, 43, of Pendleton, was alone in her car when it left the highway Saturday night four miles south of Pendleton. She was thrown out and killed by the rolling car.

Richard Ford, 35, Portland, was killed and his wife was seriously hurt in the crash of their car into a bridge abutment in east Portland Saturday night.

Two-year-old Linka Skochenko was on the driveway at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Skochenko, Creswell. A car backed down the driveway Sunday and crushed her.

Sator Lohr, 35, Ontario, died in the collision of his car and a truck 20 miles east of Vale Saturday.

Adding to the toll of highway accidents was the death Sunday at Astoria of Nester Kiske, who had been injured in a Thursday mishap.

The Associated Press count of highway deaths in Oregon stands at 328 for the year and 8 for October.

Penniless Engineer Found; Faces Suit Over Invention

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A penniless engineer has returned from a hobo jungle to continue work on an invention that may end plane collisions and earn him a fortune.

Elmer C. Meukel, a self-taught electronics whiz, came home to his wife and three children Sunday three months after hitting the hobo trail to escape the pressure of mounting bills.

Only slightly less eager than his family to welcome the 41-year-old Meukel back were the officers of the Polaris Engineering Co. of Los Angeles. They say the government is willing to spend five million dollars to develop his invention.

"We're ready to go to work on it right away," said Ben Radatz, president of the firm. The device is designed to detect an oncoming plane and automatically divert the aircraft to avoid a collision.

Tracked By Reporter

It was the company's report of the apparent success of Meukel's invention that started the search for him last Sept. 24. A newspaper reporter finally tracked him down in Reno, Nev.

Meukel, who learned engineering through correspondence courses, said he abandoned his family in a fit of despondency last June after efforts to peddle his motion-detecting device proved unsuccessful, leaving him broke.

"I couldn't stand seeing any more bill collectors come around," he explained. As for why he didn't write all the time he was gone, "I didn't want to write when I didn't have anything to offer."

Meukel said he rode freight cars, hitchhiked and visited relatives before finally settling down in a hobo jungle on an island in the Truckee River at Reno.

Upon his return Meukel learned that another engineering firm, Compaco, Inc., has filed suit for a million dollars damage, claiming Meukel's invention infringes on patents they hold for such a device. Meukel said he was certain his invention was entirely original.

He figures his contract with Polaris should bring him about \$35,000 a year if the device works and is successfully marketed.

As he quoted the figure he tight-

ened his arm around his wife Jean. She squeezed him back.

"The money isn't important," she said. "The main thing is you're home."

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Paralyzing Effect Noted In Pontiff

Condition Continues Grave, Despite Stamina; Last Rites Are Given

CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy (AP)—Pope Pius XII suffered a stroke today. A medical bulletin tonight said the Pope's condition later "appreciably improved."

The 82-year-old pontiff was stricken at his summer residence here.

The stroke was said unofficially to have had a paralyzing effect, at least partially. Tonight's medical bulletin made no reference to this condition, however.

The Pope's great stamina, which brought him through a grave illness in 1954, asserted itself again.

Mgr. Angelo dell'Aquila, substitute secretary of state, visited the Pope a few hours after the stroke and reported a slight improvement in his condition. He emphasized, however, that his condition continued grave.

Uncion Not Given

Infants at the press office in Vatican City said Extreme Unction, the church's last rite for the dying, had been given the Pope. Here at Castel Gandolfo Msgr. dell'Aquila said that to his knowledge Extreme Unction had not been given.

The Pope weakened suddenly during the night after showing improvement from an attack of gastritis, complicated by hiccups. The hiccups that had bothered him for several days vanished.

Then at 8:30 a. m. he suffered a circulatory cerebral attack, a bulletin from his physicians reported.

Unofficial sources said the Pope was paralyzed and could not be moved from his summer palace to Vatican City, where facilities for treatment are better.

Dr. Antonio Gasbarrini, a specialist from Bologna, was called to the Pope's bedside. This underscored the gravity of the condition.

Cardinals Would Select Successor If Pope Succumbs

VATICAN CITY (AP) — In the event of Pope Pius XII's death, the College of Cardinals will select a new Pope.

Among the possibilities are: Msgr. Giovanni Battista Montini, 61. He has served as a secretary of state at the Vatican and as archbishop of Milan.

Gregory Peter Cardinal Agagianian, 62, pro-prefect of the Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, the Soviet Union. Cardinal Tisserant of Chicago was to have filled. He is Patriarch of the Armenians.

Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, 74, dean of the College of Cardinals. Cardinal Agagianian was born in what is now the Georgian Republic of the Soviet Union. Cardinal Tisserant was born in France.

Msgr. Montini is the only one of the three listed above who is Italian, as have been all the Popes of the last 400 years.

Italians since 1946 have not had a majority among the cardinals, but it is still generally expected at the Vatican that an Italian will become the next Pope.

All forecasts must be qualified since the College of Cardinals, when it retires to the Sistine Chapel to select a new Pope, can choose anyone it desires.

There are 53 cardinals, and their average age is 72. It takes a two-thirds vote, plus one, of those present to elect a Pope.

President Appeals For Increased Loans

NEW DELHI (AP) — President Eisenhower appealed today to the 66 member nations of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund to increase their contributions to the two financial organizations.

"A constructive increase in their resources would greatly enhance their usefulness to the free world community," Eisenhower said in a message read at the opening of the annual conference of the fund and the bank.

The monetary fund maintains a pool of dollars and other currencies from which members may borrow when foreign fluctuations bring their foreign currency reserves to dangerous lows. The World Bank makes loans for development projects, especially to underdeveloped countries.

Mark Hatfield, Republican candidate for governor, charged in a
